

#### **Ministers Letter**

Whether a holiday is good, bad, or indifferent, with luck it will provide at least one unexpected surprise that gives a thought-provoking memory to take home. My summer holiday in County Durham did not let me down in this respect. I didn't expect a visit to Castle Auckland, the former home of the Prince Bishops of Durham, to offer more than a pleasant hour or so wandering through the rooms followed by a walk in the surrounding Deer Park. However, on entering the former dining room, the surprise struck. The walls are hung with 13 large life size (in a seven foot frame) rectangular paintings. I thought at first that they had a 'Russian' feel to them, but on reading the information provided on a touch screen, discovered that they were a set of paintings by Francisco de Zurbarans, a Spanish painter (1598 to 1664). The set of paintings is entitled "Jacob and his Twelve Sons". It is based on the 'Blessings of Jacob', in chapter 49 of the book Genesis. Each man is painted wearing the headgear of his station and carrying some emblem of his office as described in the Genesis passage.

It is not just the paintings themselves which have such an impact but the story behind their purchase. Robert McManners (Chairman of Bishop Auckland Civic Society)\* writes of them: "brought there by Bishop Richard Trevor, it is no accident that these images have silently pleaded their case from the walls of the Long Dining Room for the last two and a half centuries – a case for religious, ethnic and social tolerance as relevant today as it was then. Their significance lies not just in the quality of the art but in the prominent visual statement that is being made by their display."

The background to the purchase of the paintings by the then Bishop of Durham was this. In 1755 a Bill was passed in Parliament to allow the integration of immigrant Jews through naturalisation. It was an unpopular Bill but one which Bishop Trevor promoted. Two years later it was repealed and this event may have led to Trevor's purchase of the Zurbarans paintings thus enabling him to continue publicly to demonstrate his stance. He was able to buy them all, except for the picture of Benjamin (on which he was out-bid). Nothing daunted, he commissioned (at considerable cost) a portrait artist, Arthur Pond, to paint an exact copy so that he would have a complete set to hang. The Bishop also arranged for the re-design of the Long Dining Room so that it would become a fitting place for the display of the paintings.

Good to know that in 1755 one of the most influential and powerful Bishops of the Church took a stand and was prepared to 'put his money where his mouth was'! Sad to think that in our day there is as great a need as in 1755 for religious, ethnic and social tolerance. We naturally fear, are suspicious of. 'difference', those 'not like us', however many times we may have heard the exhortation to "put to death, therefore, whatever belongs to your earthly nature", or read the words of the letter to the Colossians, (Chapter 3, verse 11) "Here there is no Greek or Jew, no circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all, and in all". It is said that "familiarity breed contempt"; it's all too easy to take for granted that one has "put to death one's earthly nature", is un-prejudiced. Thank goodness for unexpected holiday surprises to jolt one into questioning assumptions!

#### One more step along the road we go...

So it is 19<sup>th</sup> July – 'freedom day' and the end, at least for a moment, of lots of the restrictions that we have all lived with over the last 16 months. But in Cherwell, 481 people have tested positive in the last seven days, an increase of 174 over the previous week. And whilst thankfully there have been no Covid related deaths in that same period, 27 people were admitted to hospital, an increase of 8 on the previous week.

So whilst we are making some small changes within our church services, we are not throwing caution to the wind! Underlying our decisions is a concern to keep us all as safe as we sensibly can.



**Hymns**: we will start to sing these within our services, with the exception of Cottisford where we will continue to listen to hymns and, when weather permits, sing our final hymn outside.

Hand sanitiser: we will continue to offer this at the door and before communion

**Masks**: the ministry team will wear masks inside the church, except when sat in their seats or leading worship. We would encourage you to wear a mask when entering and leaving the building, but you may, if you would like, take it off once seated. (Or keep it on, your preference).

**Social distancing**: when inside the church, we would encourage you to ensure 1-2 metres between you and any one else that you are not on close terms with, both when seated and when moving around the church or talking with others.


**Communion**: for the time being we will continue as we have been doing. So communion will be brought to you in your seats. We will not yet be reintroducing the common cup but will receive bread only. The person presiding will wear a mask both to prepare the table and to distribute the bread. The bread will remain covered during the prayer of consecration.

**Sharing the peace**: for the time being, we will continue to share the peace non verbally - by waving, nodding, smiling, bowing – but not by shaking hands or hugging.

**Refreshments**: these can now be served at the end of a service, outdoors if it is at all possible. We will ask that the person preparing them does so after sanitising their hands and whilst wearing a mask. Cups and plates will be thoroughly washed afterwards, and where a church does not have proper facilities, they will be taken home so that this can happen.

And with all of this, please be very sensitive to others who may be feeling much less confident about the lifting of restrictions than you. They may not tell you directly that you feel too close to them, so you will need to use your best observational skills – someone stepping or leaning away from you is a sure sign!!

And if you are one of those feeling less confident, please take whatever measures you feel you need to. Most of us are not very good at saying 'I'm sorry, would you mind moving a little further away', but there is no shame in doing so! Neither is there any shame in wearing your mask throughout the service, not taking part in the singing, or not accepting any refreshments.



And of course, it may all change.

#### Children and Families Worker Post

After much consideration, we have sadly decided to make our 'Children and Families Worker' post redundant. This reflects that many of our parishes are under more pressure financially as a result of the pandemic. Most have been unable to hold any fund-raising events for well over a year, and the limited numbers at services and at weddings and funerals have meant smaller than usual plate collections.

Additionally, the Children And Families Worker has been unable to carry out many of the activities that would normally be their 'bread and butter' – the weekly visits to Fringford Pre-school, the monthly 'Funday Schools' at Finmere and Fringford Primary Schools, Messy Church and the Shelswell Family Service have all been 'on hold' and it is not known when we will be able to restart them. Our Children and Families Worker has been faithfully producing a weekly online offering for younger children: 'Wellies and Wiggles', but as we continue to emerge from the pandemic, fewer people appear to be engaging in the online activities, so this does not seem a good long-term use of resources.

Making the post redundant will enable us to slightly reduce the contributions that parishes need to make to the Benefice, which will be welcomed. We hope that members of the Ministry Team, with the assistance of volunteers, can continue to run Little Lambs and Muddy Church (or something similar). And at some point in the future, maybe we will be able to reinstitute the post, but not for the time being.

So very sadly Jen Capron Iddon stepped down from the role on 12th July. She has held the post from 1<sup>st</sup> September 2019, and it is really unfortunate that she had only been with us a short while when we went into lockdown. Bringing with her lots of relevant experience, Jen has always approached her work with enthusiasm, and has contributed lots of good ideas in the planning of our children's work. During lockdown, she set to and adapted to producing 'Wellies and Wiggles', and was hoping to launch another online offering: 'Growing with God', live streamed from her allotment with the help of Incy, the rather friendly spider she had created.

Jen is not saying 'goodbye' to the Benefice though. She feels that she and her boys found their spiritual home with us. So I am pleased to say that she plans to continue to be involved in Muddy Church and various other activities. I am also delighted that she is one of those who will be confirmed at Fringford Church by Bishop Gavin on Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> September.

So thank you, Jen, for all you have contributed to the Benefice as Children and Families Worker, and we are really glad that you and the boys are going to continue to be friends of the Benefice.

Yvonne 'Bonnie' Dyson 4<sup>th</sup> May 1932 – 7<sup>th</sup> June 2021

Bonnie was born in Liverpool and nicknamed after her grandfather's racehorse Bonnie Bright Eyes - the nickname lasted 89 years as did the bright eyes!

Bonnie had an unsettled childhood - the family moved several times, she spent the war years on an isolated farm on the Isle of Anglesey, followed by a move to Gt Yarmouth after the war, all of which left her with a strong desire which shaped her adult life to make friends and put down roots.

Bonnie met her husband Peter at the sailing club in 1952. It wasn't a whirlwind romance although Bonnie knew that Peter was the one! They married in 1959. There is a well worn phrase in the family - "It took me longer than I thought!" It applied to almost everything Peter did but thankfully Bonnie had endless patience.

They both had the same goal in life - to put down solid roots and live the stable and settled life they had both longed for as children. In 1961 they moved into the bungalow Peter had designed, and created a happy and settled life for their two children, Jenny and John.

By 2011 and having managed on her own for nearly 10 years, Bonnie realised that it was becoming too much for her and made the move to Finmere to join Jenny and her family. She found leaving her friends in Norfolk really hard but she was welcomed into the local community and church and made firm friends in the Tingewick table tennis club too.

Bonnie always said she hadn't achieved a great deal in life, although she was very proud of her family. However she had quite a few achievements under her belt: during the 50s, she was responsible for training all new switchboard operators joining the post office across East Anglia; she played Table Tennis at County level: she toured Denmark with the Pakefield Singers choir and led the Gardening Club at John Lewis, Norwich when they won an award for their exhibit at the Chelsea Flower show.

Bonnie loved music, gardening, sailing of course - and she loved people - she was gentle, kind and generous of spirit, offering support and constant loyalty. She had a light-hearted outlook on life and a good sense of humour. Her greatest love was her family and her grandchildren - at times in recent years she found living with the interests of two teenage boys a bit of a challenge but she loved all her grandchildren with a passion and found her time with John's daughters offered her a different outlook on life more in keeping with her own, which gave her a special bond with them

Bonnie died peacefully on 7<sup>th</sup> June after just a few days in hospital. Her funeral was held at Aylesbury Vale Crematorium on Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> July. John and Jenny had chosen some lovely readings and poems. We listened to a recording of 'You raise me up' sung by The Treorchy Male Voice Choir, and 'The Swan' from Saint-Saens' Carnival of Animals performed by Sheku Kanneh-Mason – a piece which Bonnie was delighted to have learnt to play herself on the piano and which reminded her of evenings moored in quiet corners of the Norfolk Broads with Peter, watching the swans, moorhens and grebes. The readings included 'If I should go before the rest of you' by Joyce Grenfell, Ecclesiastes 3: 1 – 8 ('To everything there is a season…), Alfred Lord Tennyson's 'Crossing the Bar' and 'The Peace of Wild Things' by Wendell Berry.

Bonnie was a lovely kind person and we will miss her. Our prayers are with her family at this difficult time.

#### SHELSWELL GARDEN CLUB



On Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> July we held a Zoom meeting with Pip Beasley. She is a renowned florist and has worked in Floristry for many years. She is a Senior RHS judge and is leading the Winchester Flower Festival later this year.

Her talk was entitled 'Garden Snippets' and concentrated on garden plants and flowers for using as cut flowers and arrangements as well as how to look after them, and an array of plants, trees and shrubs that you might just like in your garden. The talk was beautifully illustrated. Pip showed us many varieties of colourful Cornus as well as Spring plants which can be used in arrangements such as Cyclamen, Hellebores and Heuchera. She suggested using several shrubs for using in arrangements such as Pittosporum, Skimmia, and Hebe. The climbers she recommended were Passion Flowers, Honeysuckle and Jasmine (although she warned it could be a 'thug'). She suggested growing annuals such as Poppies, Calendula and Allium and felt that Roses are always welcome. These are just a few of her numerous suggestions!

Another hint was to look in charity shops for vases! She approved of using sachets that are attached to bunches of cut flowers and using 'Quick Dip' to keep cut flowers fresh.

She had some wise words around buying just what you need or growing it yourself and suggested that a regular monthly visit to nurseries is a good way of seeing what is growing at that time. She left us with "grow what you love and what you want to see".

We did look for a garden to visit but instead have something a little different next month. We will be zooming with **Ben Cross** as he walks us round his Nursery which specialises in **Alstroemeria**. His nursery is Crossland's Nursery, and he is passionate about the importance of British Flowers. It should be interesting! That is **Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> August at 7.30pm**.







# The Fourth of the Village Articles Fringford

Fringford is an ancient site and seems to have been inhabited for most of the past two thousand years. The name is thought to mean 'ford of the people of Fera', a Saxon tribe or family group, who were here well before the Norman Conquest.

In recent years evidence has been found of Saxon and medieval settlements in Farriers Close. St Michael's and all Angels Church stands on the site of an early wooden building but the earliest part of the present church dates from the early 12<sup>th</sup> century. The church was largely rebuilt in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, when the village was dominated by a series of well-connected, wealthy rectors, who made substantial contributions to the church and parish.

Late 19<sup>th</sup>-century Fringford is forever associated with Flora Thompson, who worked in the village Post Office from 1891 to 1897, after she had left school in Cottisford. In her trilogy *Lark Rise to Candleford* she largely bases Candleford Green on her memories of Fringford in those years. The TV series (2008-10) based on the trilogy contributed to a significant rise in the number of visitors to all three Lark Rise villages, Juniper Hill, Cottisford and Fringford. In 2010 a plaque was put up in Fringford church to commemorate Flora's time in the village.

In the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries the village was dominated by the Trotman and Harrison families, the squires of Shelswell. In 1844 it was reported that 'Nearly if not the whole of Fringford is the property of JHS Harrison Esq.' Shelswell House was abandoned in the 1960s and finally pulled down in the late 1970s.

In the 17<sup>th</sup> century the population was about 130 but by 1801 it was 252. It reached its peak of 479 in 1871, but by 1901 had fallen to 335. In 1951 there were still only 331 inhabitants. Since then the population has nearly doubled to 602 in 2011.

As with other villages in the benefice, the population was largely dependent on agriculture. In the 19<sup>th</sup> century there were seven farmers and up to 1939 this level remained much the same. Today the only large-scale farmer is David Taylor at Waterloo Farm, who, unlike his father and grandfather, farms some 2,000 acres with just two helpers and some very large machinery.

The Old School was built as a National (i.e. Church of England) School in 1866 by the rector, Henry de Salis, on land leased from John Dewar-Harrison. This was the site of the 16<sup>th</sup>-century North Manor and later of the parish Poor House. After the school transferred to the new site in 1973, the building was used as a Victorian Study Centre. It was sold in 2004 and converted to a private house. The school continues to flourish with over 100 pupils and in 2003 the Shelswell Playgroup relocated from the Old School to a new building on the school site.

The classic setting of a medieval village grouped round the Green survives. The surrounding farmhouses, Laurels, Green and Hall Farms, all date from the 16<sup>th</sup> century or earlier. Hall Farm was owned for some 400 years by the Addington family, and was only sold very recently. Dr Anthony Addington (1713-90) was doctor to William Pitt the Elder (The Earl of Chatham) and to George III during his 'madness'. He was the only doctor to predict the king's recovery from what is now known to have been porphyria His son, Henry (1757-1844) became Speaker and later Prime Minister (1801-4) and the first Lord Sidmouth. The village still has a thriving pub, the Butchers Arms, and a lovely cricket ground. A number of 17<sup>th</sup>- and 18<sup>th</sup>-century buildings survive, including the impressive Old Rectory, the Old Forge, and the Old Bake House with the former village pond. There are also two rows of 17<sup>th</sup>-century thatched cottages on Main Street.

#### Tusmore's Lady Doctor

In one corner of Hardwick's churchyard there is a group of graves of members of the Smith family, the Lords Bicester, who owned the Tusmore Estate for much of the twentieth century. Recently, whilst cutting back vegetation and turf that was overgrowing one of these, I came across this inscription:

In loving memory of
Honor Mildred V ivian Smith
Physician
OBE FRCP MRCS
Youngest daughter of the First Baron Bicester
13 November 1908 – 18 January 1995
And so through all the length of days Thy goodness faileth never

Whilst I had heard something about the family, I knew nothing about Honor Smith. So, I determined to find out more about a woman who had evidently been Tusmore's very own Lady Doctor. Women doctors were unusual enough at that time but as the letters *OBE FRCP MRCS* inscribed on her gravestone indicate, this was a doctor who stood out not just because of her gender or privileged background, but as one who had clearly achieved much in her life, having been awarded an OBE and becoming a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and a Member of the Royal College of Surgeons.



As noted in the inscription, Honor's father was Vivian Hugh Smith, who became the First Baron Bicester in 1938. He was a prominent City of London banker and had purchased the Tusmore Estate in 1929. Honor's mother was Lady Sybil Mary McDonnell, daughter of the sixth Earl of Antrim. Honor was the sixth of the couple's seven children. She was educated at home, which was not unusual for girls of her social class at that time. More unusually, when she was 17, her governess encouraged her to enter for matriculation at London University. For the next few years, Honor's life continued as expected, being presented at Court, travelling and, most importantly for her, hunting, a passion which she had inherited from her father. Aged 25, she had the chance to become Master of Hounds of the Bicester Hunt. Instead, she opted to become a medical student. This choice was seemingly influenced by her mother's close friend, Lady Barrett, who was Dean of the London School of Medicine for Women. She received a BSc in 1937 and qualified as a doctor in 1941, graduating from the Royal Free Hospital as MBBS.

Honor's first job after qualifying was at the Elizabeth Garrett Anderson Hospital in London. She then moved to Oxford to work on nerve injuries. She remained in Oxford for the rest of her professional life, next working under the famous neurosurgeon, Sir Hugh Cairns at the Radcliffe Infirmary from 1943. Here she started her lifelong body of research on meningitis, publishing many original papers. She became a consultant neurologist and established a unit for tuberculous meningitis at the Churchill Hospital, which became world famous. It is worth remembering that in the 1940s tuberculosis was a killer disease, and tuberculous meningitis was universally fatal. She held the post of Reader in Clinical Medicine at Oxford University from 1954-1961.

In 1959, she travelled to Morocco at the request of the World Health Organization to investigate an outbreak of paralysis that was discovered to be caused by contaminated cooking oil. She was appointed Honorary Consultant Neurologist to the Army's specialist neurology unit, Wheatley Military Hospital, and for her work there, she was appointed OBE in 1962.

Honor Smith was known not only for her kindness and generosity, but also for her lively, entertaining and erudite talk. She was, by all accounts, very good company and the delight of her circle. She was able to indulge her passion for hunting throughout her life. As a medical student she regularly took Wednesdays off for hunting. When a hospital consultant, she was often found in full hunting kit, when seeing patients on a Saturday. From 1950, she was a Fellow of St Hugh's College, which duties included being Garden Steward. She was also linked with Chelsea Physic Garden. After retiring in 1971, she went to live in Herefordshire, where she created a fine garden out of a wilderness. In retirement, she was also able to indulge her love of other country pursuits, especially fishing. She caught her last salmon, aged 80, at the Hirsel, the Berwickshire seat of Lord Hume, Sir Alec Douglas-Hume, the former Prime Minister. She realized, she said, that her heart was failing when she could no longer land a large fish.

She died, aged 86, having lived a full life, in the words of the hymn inscribed on her gravestone, "all the length of days". As her obituary on the Royal College of Physician's website notes, "Honor Smith will be remembered for her generous hospitality and gusto for lively conversation, as well as for her major contributions to the care of patients with meningitis."




#### **Church Services and Events**





We are also looking into the possibility of installing a waterless composting toilet for the church.



#### The Parochial Church Council







In keeping with our graveyard theme, the images above remind us of some of those in past years who have supported and helped to manage St Edmund & St George Church and Hethe Parish. The first memorial is for Isobel (Margaret) and Raymond Allen who lived in what was then "Caberfeidh" and is now the Old Stone House. The second and third images are of a seat donated in memory of Robert Morton Saner who lived in Hethe Cottage (originally Hospital Farmhouse). Robert received an MBE in the 1942 Honours for his service in the Indian Civil Service as Under-Secretary to the Government of India in the Defence Department. He later received an OBE followed by a CBE in the 1962 Honours for his service as Counsellor for Her Majesty's Embassy, Buenos Aires.

At the time that Mr and Mrs Allen and Mr Morton Saner were members of the PCC there were a total of 13 members. Meetings were often held in member's houses - the meeting of 3<sup>rd</sup> February 1987 was held in Hethe Cottage.

Do you know that Parochial Church Councils (PCCs), originally known as the Vestry, are the oldest form of local governance? They evolved from Anglo Saxon meetings of selected local people who would administer the law in their parish - both civil and ecclesiastical. They later took responsibility for supporting the poorest local people. In the early 19<sup>th</sup> Century, it is said that they "spent not far short of one-fifth of the budget of the national government itself"! If only that were true for today's PCCs!


According to Wikipedia the vestry committee were responsible for "the maintenance of the church and its services, the keeping of the peace, the repression of vagrancy, the relief of destitution, the mending of roads, the suppression of nuisances, the destruction of vermin, the furnishing of soldiers and sailors, even to some extent the enforcement of religious and moral discipline".

PCCs are now recognised as charities responsible for supporting the local clergy in the running and management of the ecclesiastical parish. Civil responsibilities are shared by the District and Parish Councils.

Our current PCC is chaired by the Revd Alice, Flora is the Church Warden, Helen Pritchard the Deanery Synod Representative, Mike the Secretary and Treasurer. There are three other members - Pauline O'Gorman, Helen Wood and June Nisbet. Six short of the membership in 1987!

The roles of PCC church warden, secretary and treasurer are vital for the successful running of our church and parish and, following over a year of unprecedented disruption, there are opportunities to serve as a second churchwarden or take over as secretary or treasurer.

# All Our Yesterdays: Parish Connections, and Original History Sources by Bruce Epps

It is very interesting to see reports from other parishes in the Benefice about various aspects of their history: to be able to read about their big houses, important and characterful families and the development of their villages. Each appears unique and yet as parishes we have a lot of "common history" which links some or most, if not all of us. In how many parishes would we find reference to the Norman lords d'Oilly and d'Ivry? How many would find Augustinian monks in their history, or Magdalen College as a land-owner? And how many would find response to the same "briefs" issued via churches (a kind of state and church sponsored charity appeal system) between the Reformation and 1826? There is a lot more that binds us historically together than the somewhat artificial boundary of Shelswell Benefice! This is a subject to which I would like to return in a future article.

In the meanwhile, I want to be parochial. Much of the general history of our parishes comes from two or three standard texts – British History Online (there is a website for most parishes or villages); and the Reverend J C's Blomfield's texts about the history of the Deanery of Bicester, and the History of Fringford, Hethe, Mixbury, Newton Purcell and Shelswell. These draw on a wide range of original material and make extensive references to their sources. At times I am slow on the uptake, and I had not thought how BHO or Blomfield had chosen their information from this deep pool of resources. My eyes were opened to what is, in fact, available when my wife, Sue, came across one such source in the Ancestry UK records for Mixbury. The document is the Parish Book, and it is one of a series of things that held at Oxford History Centre which I had intended to view when I had time: now it is online. I thought it was just a record of baptisms, marriages, and burials, but it contains much

Sue is still wading through the copperplate script at the front of it but has already come across some matters we have not seen elsewhere. First, we learnt that the Lord of the Manor in 1762, Benjamin Bathurst MP, had a vault built for his family at All Saints church. He was told that he needed a faculty to do so, but went ahead anyway with the rector, Mr Alt, turning a blind eye. There is no record of what the diocese thought. Seven years later there is a record of Mrs Bathurst paying a total of £2 for three "burials" in the vault. We will be exploring with the PCC where this facility might be.

Second, we came across a reference to a windmill in the parish in the late 17<sup>th</sup> century. Domesday (1086) says there were two mills in Mixbury, one at Willaston (then part of the manor), and the other where we think we know the location, on a stream to the west of the village. But these, we had thought, were water-powered. The earliest references to windmills in Britain are in the late 12<sup>th</sup> century. Was there a third, probably later, mill powered by the wind?

Third, we found that from 1662 there are records of payments from All Saints church to various causes, referred to as "briefs" (mentioned in the first paragraph above). The causes included;

- Repairs of a church in Gloucestershire 1s 3d
- Redemption of captives 1692 (probably taken by Barbary pirates) 4s 3d
- "collected on a brief for the Vaudois April 19 1699 the sum of £1 15s" (The Vaudois were a group of people in Southern France who were persecuted for rejecting Roman Catholicism.)
- "For affording a bridge in Southampton."

This seemed a strange mix of "causes", although a little googling soon threw some light as to where they came from. After the English Reformation, a variety of national measures under the general heading of Poor Laws sought to alleviate the plight of poor and destitute people in local communities, supplemented by local charitable donations. But Christians had a wider conception of where charity was needed than just those who lived nearby, a mantra which still applies today. From the Reformation, people could apply to the monarch requesting him or her to authorise an appeal for donations for a "good cause", not uncommonly rebuilding a damaged or burntout church. If approved, the appeal, or brief, would be read out in churches within a particular county or area. When the collection was taken some would be allocated to the brief. The system was abandoned in 1828 when initiatives such as fire insurance became more available. Interestingly, when Kings Sutton nearly totally burnt to the ground in 1785, the initiative to compensate the victims was organised locally, not by a brief, although the appeal for help went far and wide: Mixbury contributed just over £4. Information about the Kings Sutton fire disaster and the following appeal comes from the British Newspaper Archive, another (nearly) primary source.

So, it seems its worth looking for primary sources, if you can. The oft-used general reference texts are good, but they miss some of the colour with which we can fill in a richer picture of our histories.

The book box has now re-located to the porch just inside the church. #### Memories of my childhood during the war

I was asked by Rena if I could do a piece for the Magazine of some childhood memories. I will start at the beginning of the war,- age 11, I could not understand why all the traffic lights had been reduced to a little cross. It turned out that this was because it reduced the risk of incendiary bombs. Our house had wire netting frames over all the windows so that broken glass could not fall into the house.

Very shortly after this a man arrived with a pile of gas masks with which to fit us, They made a very funny noise when you breathed out, which my brother Hugh – 18 months old found totally satisfactory. I had a sister, Felicity- 8 years younger and a brother born at the start of the war. I was very proud of being allowed to pump air into his special carry cot when there was an air raid alarm.

We lived in the path of the German bombers although they always went on to London where I occasionally saw some of the appalling damage the bombs had done as they were still digging people out of the rubble the next day.

Our house had a double peaked roof with a gulley where we kept stirrup pumps up there in case of an incendiary bomb landing on the roof. We had an enormously long ladder up there so one could quickly get up before a fire started.

Half way up the ladder was a bedroom window which was perfect access into the house for Mr Rumble our large ginger cat. One evening we came home to find an anxious silhouette against the night sky and an indignant meowing, Someone had closed the bedroom window and Mr Rumble could not get in. There was a trap door in our bathroom through which the roof could be reached. We arranged that my mother would wait at the bottom of the ladder to receive Mr Rumble and I would climb up and fetch him. I meanwhile went up the ladder and was graciously received by Mr Rumble until he realised he was going to be handed through a hole in the roof, where upon he made furious attempts to abort the whole thing. It did not help that my Mum broke into hopeless giggles. Mr Rumble eventually calmed and all was successfully achieved.
