


A Year of Time - Steven B. Cloud

Even though thinking on the subject of time may prove discomforting, it is not a bad idea - especially at the beginning of a new year.

As we look into 2022, we look at a block of time. We see 12 months, 52 weeks,

365 days, 8,760 hours, 525,600 minutes, 31,536,000 seconds. And all is a gift from God. We have done nothing to deserve it, earn it, or purchased it. Like the air we breathe, time comes to us as a part of life.

The gift of time is not ours alone. It is given equally to each person. Rich and poor, educated and ignorant, strong and weak - every man, woman and child has the same twenty-four hours every day.

Another important thing about time is that you cannot stop it. There is no way to slow it down, turn it off, or adjust it. Time marches on.




A discussion group based on 'The future we choose' by Christiana Figueres and Tom Rivett-Carnac

'A cautionary but optimistic book about the world's changing climate and the fate of humanity, from Christiana Figueres and Tom Rivett-Carnac—who led negotiations for the United Nations during the historic Paris Agreement of 2015.

The authors outline two possible scenarios for our planet. In one, they describe what life on Earth will be like by 2050 if we fail to meet the Paris Agreement's climate targets. In the other, they lay out what it will be like to live in a regenerative world that has net-zero emissions. They argue for confronting the climate crisis head-on, with determination and optimism. *The Future We Choose* presents our options and tells us what governments, corporations, and each of us can, and must, do to fend off disaster.'

I have found this book an inspiring and challenging read – rather than just feeling overwhelmed by the climate crisis, I am now fired up to do my bit!





How do questions about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage fit within the bigger picture of the good news of Jesus Christ? What does it mean to live in love and faith together as a Church?

'Living in Love and Faith' is a Church of England initiative that has come about because 'there are disagreements among us about same sex relationships and the Christian understanding of marriage as the Church of England has received it. There are also disagreements about pastoral practice in relation to gender identity, sexuality and relationships ore generally.'

Baptisms


Jago Alan Eric LEIGH-WOOD Jago was christened at St Mary and St Edburga, Stratton Audley on Saturday 27th November.

Jago had been into the church on a number of occasions as part of the Little Lambs group. At 16 months old, he had a lively interest in wanting to explore the building and join some of the other children in doing some colouring, though was less taken with the baptism itself!

Jago is the second child of Janine and Dickon who live in the village. Janine runs a catering business with her brother, and Dickon juggles being a sustainability consultant with doing a lot of building work on their cottage.

The service got off to a bit of a late start, partly because the two godfathers, travelling together, had been misinformed as to the start time – however they were with us by the time they were needed! Jago's godparents are Olivia Lee, Andora Whitfield, Joby Rimmer and Steve Doble. Olivia lives in the States, and the date of the christening was arranged for that weekend so she could be present. Andora used to live in the States but now lives in Scotland!

As part of the service, Jago's big sister Cressida, who is 6 years old, stood in the pulpit and sang 'The Owl and the Pussycat' – she had done a lot of practising and did brilliantly. One of Jago's cousins read 'If' by Rudyard Kipling, and one of his godparents, Joby Rimmer, read part of psalm 139. We sang three hymns: One more step along the world I go, Lord of the Dance, and Sing Hosanna. And everyone was invited to write their own prayer for Jago's journey through life, which were collected, put in a small suitcase and given to the family to keep.



After the service everyone went back to the family home and the celebrations continued. It was the first time that Janine and Dickon had been able to collect all their friends and family together since the start of the pandemic, so there was a lot of catching up to do – as well as enjoying a glass of something and tucking into the rather good spread.

Undeterred by the traumatic experience of having water poured over his head by the vicar – which he was definitely not pleased with - Jago happily returned to Little Lambs ten days later. We look forward to welcoming him and his family to many more services and events in the coming years.

Funerals

Jacqueline Morrow 12 February 1955 to 12th November 2021

Jacqueline was born in Belfast, her family's home just two miles away from Paul Morrow's family home. They attended the same grammar school, and for some subjects, the same class. Their first date, aged 16, was on 3rd December 1971. Jacqueline didn't actually make the first move, but she made it quite clear to Paul that if he were to ask her out, she would say yes.

In October 1973 Paul left to study at Leeds University. They soon decided a long-distance relationship was not for them, and finding work in Leeds, Jacqueline joined him there in January 1974. Paul's first job after graduation was in Stockport so they were back to a weekend relationship for a year until they got married on 4th August 1978, aged 23.



Eight months after they married, Paul made one of only two life changing decisions without consulting Jacqueline. Having heard that he successfully gained a more senior post with Unigate Dairies, which would involve them moving to London, Paul immediately phoned the estate agent and put their house on the market. Jacqueline came home from work to find a "for sale" sign in the front garden. Her reaction ensured that it would be another 24 years before Paul made another large decision without consulting her

Shortly after moving to London, they bought a house in Crawley, Sussex. The next five years saw them sitting beside each other every day as they drove to and from London where Jacqueline also worked as an office manager. After nine years living the 'double income no kids' lifestyle, they agreed to start a family. After miscarrying, Paul and Jacqueline decided that daily commuting to London for a fairly stressful job was not wise and she stood down from paid work. Their first son, Niall, was born in Crawley in 1987, and Conor came along in 1992, by which time they had moved to Southport in Merseyside. For the next 20 years Jacqueline devoted herself to raising their two sons and supporting Paul in his career. In due course she returned to work as a teaching assistant, firstly in Launton primary school and then in the English Department of Bicester Community College.

In 1994, Paul joined Bakels, and the family needed to move again. Paul was busy planning the relocation of Bakels from Slough to Bicester, so it was down to Jacqueline to choose the house they were to live in. This was their fifth home in 15 years. The boys were seven and two. The evening they moved Jacqueline told Paul "you can now go wherever you wish, but I am staying here" and there she stayed, and there she died.

2003 was Paul and Jacqueline's 25th wedding anniversary, and the year Paul made the second big decision without consulting Jacqueline. Whilst in Malta on business, Paul visited the construction site for an interesting sounding development. He immediately put in an offer on the one remaining apartment available for sale. On returning home, he told Jacqueline that they were buying an apartment in Malta, an island she had never visited. Initially she was less than enthusiastic, but when she saw the apartment for herself, she was smitten. They spent a lot of very happy times there over the following 17 years.

Jacqueline and Paul both enjoyed their year as Master and Mistress Baker for the Worshipful Company of Bakers. More than once, after she had attended - and clearly had a very good time - at an event organised by the City Consorts Group, Paul had to tell her to leave her car at the train station and wait for him to pick her up.

This year Jacqueline and Paul spent their 43rd wedding anniversary in August in Northern Ireland, where Jacqueline was able to catch up with her brother. In September, they spent two weeks in Malta. Although Jacqueline was complaining about gall stones, they were able to eat and drink in their favourite restaurants and have dinner with friends, not knowing what the coming weeks would bring. On returning, Jacqueline saw the consultant who arranged for a gall bladder operation. On further investigation it was found that she had cancer. Her condition deteriorated quickly and she died at home on 12th November - just 24 days after her diagnosis.

Her funeral was held on Friday 3^{rd} December at Banbury Crematorium. Those present included family and friends from Northern Ireland and various parts of England as well as from locally, colleagues of Jacqueline's from her time as a teaching assistant, Liverymen of the Worshipful Company of Bakers and colleagues of Paul's. Paul and Niall both gave tributes to Jacqueline, Keith Houliston read 'That'll do' by Randy Newman, and Jacqueline's brother Michael Artt read Ecclesiastes 3: 1 - 8 (For everything there is a season...)

As Paul said, he and Jacqueline lived several lifetimes in their 50 years together. A forthright person with a good sense of humour, she played a full part in village life and will be greatly missed. Our thoughts and prayers are with Paul and her sons.

CHURCH CARBON FOOTPRINT TOOL DATA UPDATE

One in 14 Church of England churches are now reporting 'net zero' carbon emissions, according to the latest data from the Energy Footprint Toolkit (EFT).

The number of churches edged upwards from four per cent to seven per cent between 2019 and 2020.

General Synod has committed the Church to achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2030. The scope of this aim was detailed in 2020, and the EFT enables measuring the emissions of all buildings in scope.

Dr John Thompson, Bishop of Selby and chair of the Net Zero Carbon Sub-committee group, said:

"The rise in numbers of net zero churches reflects that more and more parishes are utilising pre-approved renewable suppliers and addressing the big and small measures which can be taken to reduce carbon impacts.

"This is a positive early step in our ambitious journey to a wholly net zero carbon Church by 2030.

Among the churches with net zero carbon, just under 80 per cent were using wholly renewable electricity tariffs.

The Anne Robson Trust is a pre-bereavement charity that passionately believes that No one deserves to die alone. We work alongside NHS hospitals to train Butterfly Volunteers, who sit with end-of-life patients in order to provide company and comfort to people in their last days and hours of life. However, due to COVID restrictions the volunteers were forced to withdraw from the hospitals, and in response to this, we decided to set up a free, *National Helpline* so that we could continue to offer comfort and support where needed. As restrictions have lifted the volunteers are gradually starting to return to hospitals and in addition the introduction of the helpline is showing to be a valuable resource for anyone in the community to access support from the comfort of their own home.

The helpline is for anyone who is struggling to cope with a *terminal diagnosis or the imminent death of someone they care about.* Whether they are family members, friends, neighbours, work colleagues, or even a member of the care staff who may just need someone to talk to; we understand the pressures of working and caring for people who are end of life. We are fully committed to ensuring that people facing end of life and their families have access to as many layers of support as possible.

The Anne Robson Trust is funded entirely by donations from their supporters.

offers vital support, advice, and a 'listening ear' to those facing the end of their life, or the loss of a loved one.

We believe having somewhere to turn to can be a lifeline to many people when they need help.

SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

At our December meeting we concluded our theme of poems connected with the Zodiac with the signs Sagittarius and Capricorn.

We began with the poems *Capricorn* by Alastair Walker and *The Goat and I* by Robert Service.

Ode to Winter, by Gillian Clarke, the lyrics of the song *Autumn Leaves*, *London Snow* by Robert Bridges, Shakespeare's *Blow, blow, thou winter wind*, *Christmas Carol* by Ted Hughes and *A Robin* by Walter De la Mare conjured up the season and its weather.

The Major-General's Song from Gilbert and Sullivan's comic opera The Pirates of Penzance was included as a humorous reminder that the first public performance of the work was on 30th December 1879, and the words of *The Skye Boat Song* commemorated the escape of Bonnie Prince Charlie from Benbecula to Skye in December 1746, when he was fleeing from government troops after the failure of the 1745 Jacobite rebellion.

Three works linked with the religious aspects of the time of year were - the words of the 15th century German hymn *Lo, how a rose e'er blooming, The Journey of the Magi* by T.S. Eliot and *Song for a Winter Birth* by Vernon Scannell.

The session ended with 19th Christmas Poem, by Wendy Cope – a secular poet's account of her publisher's seasonal demands, set to the rhythms of the old traditional rhyme, Christmas is Coming.

In January 2022 we will be starting on a whole new year of various themes. The first one will be Travel. Our meeting will be on Tuesday January 13th in Stoke Lyne and will begin at 10.30.

Our December meeting, in Cottisford, focused on the novel *Islands of Mercy*, by Rose Tremain. Its settings, in Victorian Bath, London and Borneo, allow Tremain to address a host of issues relevant to the mid-19th century. The state of medicine, imperialism, curiosity about other lands and cultures, Darwinism, lesbian love and the position of women, are all dealt with via portraits of a vividly-realised cast of characters. These include a society doctor and his daughter, her would-be husband, his plant-collector brother and a female painter.

There was a lot to discuss, and some thought that the plot was too wide-ranging, whilst others enjoyed the sweep of subjects brought under Tremain's microscope. Anyone with an interest in 19th-century history should find it very rewarding.

A NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION FROM MICAH

Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousand rivers of olive oil? Shall I offer my firstborn for my transgression...? He has shown you, O mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you: To act justly and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God. (Micah 6:7-8)

I quite like olive oil; not the Popeye character but the cooking ingredient. Although I am not sure what I would do with even one river of oil, and I have nowhere to put a ram.

Still, this is one of my favourite Bible passages, and it is an ideal one for lawyers. It sums up in a very simple but helpful way what true religion should be. That makes it a good verse to start the year. The message is simple: God does not want empty promises or lip service, but our real devotion, from our heart.

What does it mean for us?

Do justly - Be honest and open in our dealings with others this year. Be dependable. We should say when things are going wrong and be appreciative when they go well. Be fair in our dealings, whether at home or at work or in church. Keep confidences and never pass on gossip.

Love mercy - Give people the benefit of doubt, do not take advantage of others and do not always criticise or complain. Accept apologies and explanations where we can, and be generous.

Walk humbly - Quietly get on with things. Do not make a big show of what we do.

Lastly, we are *required* to do these things. They are not options or choices but requirements. Like many requirements in the Bible, they are simple to understand, but not always simple to do. Happy New Year.

THE SHELSWELL BENEFICE

The Ninth of the Village Articles

Newton Purcell



Newton Purcell, 'the new tun', takes its second name from the Purcell family, who were lords of the manor for four centuries all through the Middle Ages. Its hamlet, Newton Morrell, was probably called after the Morrells, who held land in Buckinghamshire. In 1677 the manor was bought by Edward Trotman, who also acquired the village of Shelswell. It was he and his son, Fiennes, who built Shelswell House and laid out Shelswell Park, which then 'took its place among the finest gentlemen's seats in the country'. In 1782, the Trotmans sold both villages to Gilbert Harrison. His descendant, Anne, Baroness von Maltzahn, owns them today, although the 'lost village' of Shelswell had finally disappeared in the early 1600s, and Shelswell House was pulled down in the late 1970s. The civil parish of Shelswell was united with Newton Purcell in 1932.

The Purcell family built the original church of St Michael in the 13th century, and the south west doorway, with its fine carving in the tympanum, survives from this period. Most of the ancient features were destroyed when John Harrison had the church repaired and 'beautified' in 1813. A restoration in 1875-6 funded by Edward Slater-Harrison amounted to a rebuilding, leaving only the foundations of the original walls. The present doorway was moved from the north to the south side. The old pews and the gallery were removed, and the bell gable, vestry and south porch were built. At the same time, a 'heart stone', now on the north wall of the chancel, was discovered. When a man died on a Crusade and his body could not be brought home, the heart was sometimes removed and buried in the wall of his parish church. The stone is inscribed 'Hic jacet ..', 'here lies'. If we could read the name, it might be that of Ralph Purcell, who was lord of the manor in the days of Richard the Lionheart.

The most famous rector was Griff Lloyd (1805-42), who had another parish in Cheshire but would always come here for the hunting season. He was licenced by his bishop to live with Sir Thomas Mostyn, at Swift's House, Stoke Lyne, to 'look after his cousin's hounds and his morals' and he never allowed his duties to clash with hunting days! Every Sunday morning he rode to church in white breeches and top boots. On one occasion he was so keen to be off to Newmarket he forgot to remove his preacher's bands and to everyone's amusement appeared in them on the race course. Griff, who appeared in Punch cartoons, was nationally famous as 'The Hunting Parson' or more popularly as 'The Black Whipper-In'. There is almost no record of dissenters in the parish. Mention should also be made of John Meade, who succeeded Griff as rector in 1843. He resided for some 40 years and 'exercised a faithful and fruitful care of souls'. He built the rectory, completely restored the church and built the village school.

In 1738 there were just 12 houses. By 1801 the population was 93, rising to a peak of 143 in 1821. Thereafter there was a steady decline. In 1911, when Shelswell was included, there were 172 inhabitants. In 2001 the population was only 103 and by 2011 it had been merged with Mixbury. In 1899 a station called Finmere was built across from the Shelswell Arms. This closed in the 1960s but the route of the HS2 is planned to come this way. Agriculture has been almost the sole occupation of the villagers and most of them have lived in tied cottages and worked on the Shelswell estate. There have been four or five farms in the parish for most of the last 150 years. The National School was built in 1873 on land given by J.H.Slater-Harrison, and enlarged in 1898. It was reorganised as junior school in 1929, when the older children were sent to Fringford. In 1952 it was given aided status but it closed in 1957. Children went to Fringford for one year and then to the new Finmere school.



Garden Waste Collections are Changing

Between September 2021 and January 2022 Cherwell District Council will be delivering a free 23 litre silver outdoor caddy to all households in the district.

They will let us know when to expect our caddy delivery by putting a bin hanger on one of our bins a week before delivery. Once received, please start to use your caddy for food waste instead of the brown bin. They will also supply a roll of compostable caddy liners to help us get started. The food waste caddy will be collected weekly.

From February 2022 garden waste collections will change to a paid-for opt-in service at a cost of £40 per year. We will be able to sign up from December 2021 and those registering before 1^{st} February 2022 will be charged a reduced rate of £36. From February please do not put food waste in your brown garden waste bin, use your outdoor food waste caddy. Further information can be found on the Cherwell District Council recycling website along with a bin collection calendar.

Mixbury Book Exchange - has moved!

The books have now been moved to a table next to the organ in the church. The books have been kindly donated by one of Mixbury's Book Clubs and a few individuals, these are for the villagers to exchange a book with one they have read and replace with one of their own. Now the pandemic restrictions have eased we are no longer wrapping books in clear plastic, but there is a bottle of hand sanitiser next to them for your convenience. There is a good selection of children's books now available too. Please only leave books that are in good condition, now that the books are inside the church we can accept a few more – do not leave books in the bus shelter thank you.

All Our Yesterdays What's in a name?

When I was researching content for the 2018 draft of "Mixbury: Its History and Archaeology", I came across the name "Mixbury" in two unexpected ways. First, a horse called Mixbury ran in the Derby in 1832. It was owned by the then Lord of the Manor, Stanlake Ricketts Batson. Sadly, Mixbury could only get into the "also ran" category. Mr Batson, as far as we know, never lived in Mixbury. His main estate was at Horseheath near Cambridge, which was equipped with a racecourse!

The second discovery was that Clarks – the shoe people – made a type of shopping bag called "Mixbury Vine". When I asked their Customer Care department why they had chosen to call their shopping bag after a small village in farthest Oxfordshire, they replied as follows: "Historically all of our leather bags have names that begin with the letter "T" and any non-leather bags have names that begin with the letter "M" In terms of inspiration, we use flowers, islands, and places. It is pure coincidence that this name was picked." I have not yet got as far as asking the Japanese company, "Mikke Japan", where their inspiration came from to name a white cotton sashiko pattern kit (sold online), "Mixbury" At least we know where "Mixbury Soap" comes from. It's made by Lucy in the village!

There are, of course, several books about the origins of place names. In the 1980s Margaret Gelling, known for her extensive studies of English place names, wrote the definitive "Signposts to the Past". She supported the origins of Mixbury as coming from the Anglo-Saxon "mixen" – a dung heap – and "burgh" – a fortification: together, a fortification by a dung heap. We know where the fortification was, the site of Beaumont Castle; we're still trying to find the dung heap! In the last couple of years some villagers have suggested that there may have been confusion at the time of the Domesday Book (1086) over the translation of the word "mixen".

Mixbury in Domesday is written in Norman French as "Misseberie", which apparently suggests a meaning of "marsh", so we would be in the fortification in the marshes. That could be possible, because even now, after heavy rain we know that the stream to the west and north of the village can spill over into adjacent land, and some 19th century maps show part of the area as marshy. There is still work to be done here.

The name Mixbury seems to have found its way into people's hearts. Charles Edward Kayler, Lord of the Manor from 1903 to some-time in the 1920s, built Mixbury Hall about 1902: as far as we know it was the first time since the mid-16th century that the parish's manor house was located in the village – hitherto it was at Fulwell. His first wife Hilda was buried in All Saints'churchyard in

1914, next to the grave of their son Charles who died in 1907. When he sold his share of Mixbury he moved to Devon and there, in Torquay, he named his new house "Mixbury".

Even further afield, a branch of the Blencowe family, descended from Eleanor Hargrave Blencowe who was married to Joseph Painter – one of the 19th century movers and shakers in the parish – lived in the 1960s and 1970s at "Mixbury" in Tumbarumba in Australia. According to the "Blencowe Families' Association Newsletter" of February 2018, the first member of this branch of the family migrated from Brackley in the 19th century. As the Newsletter says, "To name the family home "Mixbury", shows a possible closer emotional attachment to that place than to Brackley".

We know of three other places which have had houses bearing the name "Mixbury". Two of them, found on the current Post Office postcode website, are in Weybridge, and Ramsdell, Tadley. The third is an address of "Mixbury, Goring-on-Thames, Oxon", which is embossed (twice) on flyleaves of a 1932 book called "A Rabbit in the Air". Discovering the attachment of the owners of these properties to Mixbury will, though, have to wait for another time.
