

MINISTERS LETTER

"I think...

The first month of the new year has flown past. Not quite the start we would have wanted thanks to Omicron, but I feel like I'm getting used to planning for any and all eventualities.

I am in my final year of Curacy now – and only God knows what is ahead for me and for us as a family. But I'm trying not to think about that all the time! Your prayers, as always, would be appreciated.

As a Curate I spend a lot of time reading, thinking and reflecting! It is all part of my learning. But last year I also spent a lot of time thinking about thinking! It started with me getting **very** annoyed listening to politicians (particularly over in America) and wondering how on earth "the church" over there was so silent when facts were being distorted and people took lying to a new level – lies about the election, voting, the insurrection etc.

And that got me "thinking" about the voices I listen to and how much time I give to hear other points of view, and how one might get people to really consider the voices they listen to and what they hear —

and to THINK about it! This led me to some online searching and I found some good debates to watch on YouTube. I watched one debate which was particularly inspiring. It was a fascinating discussion on many levels, but what was most interesting was the interaction between the audience and the speakers. It was obvious that




each speaker had their own supporters and every so often the audience would applaud, clearly demonstrating their bias or partisanship. What I found most fascinating was the response of one speaker – he kept shaking his head as the audience clapped and when he got the chance to speak, he held up his hand and challenged the audience to stop clapping and rather to listen carefully to what was being said and having listened to THINK. He said "Don't treat this debate as a cheap competition – we are desperately trying to confront serious problems." At the very end of the debate the moderator asked "What one thing do you hope that people will take away from this debate?" to which that first speaker responded "I hope that people leave this debate with a belief in the power of communication between people with different views" and

the second speaker said "I hope that we made at least some people think ... don't take the easy way out, don't just attach labels to ideologies because that is easy – THINK!"

As is often the case when one starts watching something on YouTube, I ended up going down a rabbit hole watching more videos on the topic. One rabbit hole led me to another and I came across a video by Jordan Peterson, a clinical psychologist, author and professor. In a video he was asked what he thought about God to which he responded

"I act as if God exists and I am terrified that He might."

I wonder what you think Peterson might mean by that? What might acting as if God exists involve? Why would he be terrified to find that God exists? What might that statement tell us about Peterson's image of God?



As Christians we believe that God is a God of love who reaches out to each one of us. Judy Cannato describes it like this:

Being loved disarms us, brushes away our ego defences, and then exposes us not only to the other, but to ourselves. And it is from ourselves that we most often hide our gaze. . . . Everywhere the Holy One is shouting and whispering, "Let me love you." And all that is asked of us is to receive. In reality, that is our life's work. Nothing more and certainly nothing less.

The Holy One is shouting and whispering "Let me love You."

What do you think that might mean? Perhaps something to *think* about this year.

Thursday 10th March – John Alderdice 'Pilgrimages to Holy Places'.

John Alderdice is a psychiatrist by profession, but as Leader of the Alliance Party of Northern Ireland, he played a significant role in the Talks on Northern Ireland including the negotiation of the 1998 Good Friday Agreement and was then the first Speaker of the Northern Ireland Assembly. Since 1996 he has sat as a Liberal Democrat life member of the House of Lords, and is currently Director of the Centre for the Resolution of Intractable Conflict, a Senior Research Fellow at Harris Manchester College (Oxford) and Presidente d'Honneur of Liberal International.

Lord Alderdice has spent a life-time working on understanding and addressing religious fundamentalism, radicalization, terrorism and violent political conflict in various parts of the world. More recently he has also been working on the problems of indigenous peoples and their conflicts with the incomers. In February he will be travelling to Israel (COVID allowing) to work on the conflict over the Holy Places in Jerusalem

Thursday 17th March – Eva Grosman 'A St Patrick's Day Reflection on Peace-Building in Ireland'.

Eva is Co-founder and CEO of the Centre for Democracy and Peace Building, based on Belfast. Polish by background and a very thoughtful and committed Catholic Christian, she also curates TEDxStormont and is an Advisor to RISING Global Peace Forum in Coventry and Director for Public Affairs at the Centre for the Resolution of Intractable Conflict, Harris Manchester College, Oxford.



Thursday 24th March – Martin and Margot Hodson Climate Change: a Christian Response





Melissa Morbeck (Coke-Smyth) is CEO of The Corporate Alliance, as well as Global Director of Partnerships at The NO MORE Foundation. Her work in the field of Gender Based Violence includes work in domestic and sexual violence with multilaterals such as UN Women, The World Health Organisation, The IMF and World Bank Group. Her work with businesses responding to domestic abuse started in 1992, has included Google, Santader, The Body Shop, British Airways, Rio Tinto, and thousands of others, and ultimately led to a global movement for employers throughout the world to support employees and families affected by abuse.


Melissa is an Advisor on Gender Based Violence, on the White House Gender Policy Council, as well as an Advisor on the International Labour Organisation Employer GBV Task Force. Melissa also supports individuals, families and employers on how to access public services and NGOs globally to save lives and keep people safe.



Melissa will share her personal experiences as a resilient survivor, how the grace of God has guided her life and work and how the season of lent is an opportunity to reflect on a life serving a higher purpose.

AFTER EASTER: CLIMATE CONCERN

A discussion group springing from 'The future we choose' by Christiana Figueres and Tom Rivett-Carnac



'A cautionary but optimistic book about the world's changing climate and the fate of humanity, from Christiana Figueres and Tom Rivett-Carnac—who led negotiations for the United Nations during the historic Paris Agreement of 2015.

The authors outline two possible scenarios for our planet. In one, they describe what life on Earth will be like by 2050 if we fail to meet the Paris Agreement's climate targets. In the other, they lay out what it will be like to live in a regenerative world that has net-zero emissions. They argue for confronting the climate crisis head-on, with determination and optimism. *The Future We Choose* presents our options and tells us what governments, corporations, and each of us can, and must, do to fend off disaster.'

I have found this book an inspiring and challenging read – rather than just feeling overwhelmed by the climate crisis, I am now fired up to do my bit!

The focus of the group will be to think about practical and positive steps that we can take as individuals and as communities, and to encourage one another in doing this.

Use it to ask our MP, Victoria Prentis, to keep up the momentum on climate change.



Funerals

Peter John Silver 1947 to 2021

Peter Silver died on 25th November 2021. His funeral service took place in the church on the 13th December. Many people attended and the service very much reflected his personality and sense of humour.

His sister Gill told us something of Pete's life: "Peter John Silver, born 26 October 1947 and died aged 74, taken from us far too soon. A brother, a father, a husband, grandfather, great grandfather, uncle and friend. Nicknamed Crispie before birth, he was going to emerge as either Christine or Peter. But secrets on what was hoped for were revealed in our parent's diaries and letters they wrote whilst apart. I was amused by the letter Mum wrote to Dad whilst in the maternity hospital. She wrote "I'm so glad that you like the baby dear even if he is a boy. We can imagine he's a girl for a few months". After Pete's initial wry expression, we both found this very funny and wondered if he was put in dresses for a while. It was, however, quickly followed with "it makes me so proud to see you come back from the nursery with such a proud expression on your face and kisses to Daddy from Peter", so all was not lost and he was thankfully accepted as a boy.

Pete was the eldest of three. We spent our early days in Willesden before moving to Romford when Pete was about 9 and then Billericay for our teenage years, after which we all scattered around a bit. We had a lovely childhood with many happy memories of holidays in our caravan in Rye and of many fun parties.

Our brother Colin sadly died of the same dreadful disease as Pete in 2008 and our parents died in 2015 and 2016. Pete and I remained close and supported each other during these difficult years, having many family gatherings and camping trips during which Pete would amuse us all with his funny stories and knowledge. He had an excellent memory for all sorts of things and a sense of humour that had us laughing through all sorts of troubles and particularly whilst huddled inside his cosy motorhome before we all had to return to our freezing tents.

The three of us were quite different. Colin was always the 'tinkerish' one of the family, always taking things apart and not always getting them back together. I seemed to be the one that was always in trouble, but Pete seemed to be the one that was always the sensible one, never over-indulging as a teenager. He was artistic and confident, always particular about his possessions and woe betide if Colin or I ever spoilt anything of his, or even touched anything. This showed in later life with the care and attention he gave to everything he did.

Pete retired from the Gas Board aged 60 and this led on to his new career in photography and video work. It was his eye for detail and getting everything just right that made him the person he was, the creative photographic skills that he developed into a successful role both as a business and for friends and family. The group family photograph was always taken on every occasion we gathered. All of us posed and warned not to move or blink. He thoroughly enjoyed his video work and approached this with enthusiasm filming Steeleye Span, the Fire Brigade, fashion shows and much more.

Pete will be sadly missed by us all: by Christine, his children, Paul, Nicky and Sally, his grandchildren, great grandchildren, his extended family, his many good friends, colleagues and the community in which he lived.

I am sure that each one of you have special memories that you will cherish always and so this tribute is a very sad farewell to a much-loved man taken too soon, a very special uncle to Emma, James and Leanne and the fondest of farewells to my lovely, funny brother, my support and my life-long friend."

Peter's wife Christine introduced the piece of music following Gill's tribute – 'Jollity Farm' by the Bonzo Dog Doo Dah Band::

"Hello everyone. Well, Pete, here we are in church again, I'd rather be in a campervan. There's a lot been said about Pete's sense of humour lately, and this was what attracted me to him, 17 years ago. Pete's choice of music was always very varied and we were on a day trip early on in our relationship, when this next song came on the car radio. We were stopped at the time, and he gestured to the radio, "you know this one", and when I glanced across at him he was singing along with all the words and the noises. Jokingly I said, "I think this should be our song, Pete". Later tongue in cheek, we thought about having it for our funerals, however Pete changed his mind

about 5 years ago and thanks go to my son in law, the other Pete, for remembering that the music he wanted was 'Life is what you make it'. So he's getting that as well.

Although I would have wished it longer, I really enjoyed and I hope he did too, what we did make of our life together. So let's remember the laughs we had with Pete, join in if you wish, and let's everybody make a row, as we bid him farewell. Bub, bub Pete."

After the Address, we listened to the next piece of music which was introduced by John Dagnall a longstanding friend of Pete's:

"I'm not sure of the year Pete first came in to my life or what the project was we were working on at that time but I believe it was about 20 years ago.!

Pete was such a terrific person to have around; so generous with his knowledge and his time. When it came to filming or a photo shoot Pete was always the first person I would call. Working on projects with Steeleye Span, Gerard Kenny, Gilbert O Sullivan, Sir Terry Pratchett. We spent many hours driving up the motor way discussing so many things. Cameras, techniques of Editing, Music, families, Health, religion. I think Pete liked talking.

When he came to the studio his eyes would light up when I said "Cup of tea and a biscuit Pete?" The answer was always the same, "OOOH that would be nice, John." And the conversations would start again!

And then there was Billy's World Club -a kids You Tube channel using puppets.

I had to apologise many times to Pete for giving him cramp. "Any chance you can leave the Camera on a wide shot, Pete, and sit on the floor over here and stick your hand up the puppet to give it some movement?" "Eer I'll give it a go, John". Nothing seemed to phase Pete. But boy we did have a lot of laughs on this project while drinking yet more tea.

I will miss him so very much. I have a feeling Pete is still working some magic from heaven right now as on Billy's World Club channel the You Tube views have increased terrifically in the last two weeks. Thank you, Pete.

And now to the next piece of music. Pete filmed the video to this song and it's so beautifully shot. The song is by Steeleye Span and is called 'Somewhere Along The Road.'.

Later, when we were gathered up at the village hall for refreshments after the service, John Fargin from the Parish Council spoke on behalf of the Village Hall Committee:

"Welcome to Fringford Village Hall. Peter was a key member of the small group of volunteers that runs this hall on behalf of the community. As you move around the hall today you will see many examples of the contribution Peter made to this hall and to this community in the 13 years or so he was involved. Peter digitised, edited, and catalogued all the historic images that form the Village History Display in the next room. Please, if you can, take time to have a look. On your way to the Chinnery Room you will see a fantastic drone image of the whole village that demonstrates that Peter was at the leading edge of all things photographic. He made videos for us, developed the first village website, and provided numerous images for the village magazine. Very significantly Peter gained funding for and set up some fabulous cinema equipment to form the Take 5 Cinema Club which was attended by many villagers over the years. The huge screen, equally huge speakers, the acoustic ceiling panels and even a pop-corn machine made the cinema experience very real. Peter would introduce his excellent, sometimes off-beat, film selections with his own, relaxed, warm, and humorous style and always get the evenings off to a great start. As the lead on Entertainment, Peter was at the heart of many village events - He even managed to somehow attract artists such as Gordon Gilltrap and Rick Kemp to our little village hall for fundraising evenings. Peter played an important part in the team and his expertise his relaxed, calm, style, and his sense of fun will all be sorely missed. Please join me in raising a toast to a great colleague, a committed and generous villager, and a great guy! To Pete.... "

SHELSWELL GARDEN CLUB



At our **December 14th** meeting, we welcomed **Katherine Crouch**. She has been interested in gardening since childhood. In the early 90s she moved with her husband, to a bungalow in Somerset where they had to make front and back gardens from scratch. In the front they decided to just use plants and no hard landscaping but, in the back, there was an opportunity to terrace the sloping garden, making paths and seating areas using old railway sleepers. They made the best use of space and were accepted into the National Garden Scheme. In 1999 she entered the new Gardeners World 'Gardener of the Year' competition, beating over 3000 entrants to the title! Her horticultural career then took off, she undertook a course on running your own business and since then she has been busy working as a garden designer as well as giving talks all over the country. In 2008, Gardener's World decided to have a 'Gardener of the Decade' competition, calling back previous winners of the yearly competition. Five gardeners entered and yet again Katherine won becoming Gardener of the Decade. She met several well-known gardeners at this time including Alan Titchmarsh and Rachel de Thame.

For our first meeting of 2022 (via Zoom) on January 11th, we welcomed Christine and Keith Hayward of Hart Canna Nursery. They told their story of growing Cannas in their garden to growing them commercially in a 2-acre nursery with seven large polytunnels and becoming holders of National Collection of Cannas. They provide RHS gardens, Kew Gardens and exhibit at some of the national garden shows. In 2016 they received a gold medal at the Hampton Court Show. Using photos, they showed us several Cannas which are native to Central and South America. There are 3 types, grown for foliage, floral or water lovers. They generally require warm sultry positions, frost free and damp in winter, in containers or the ground. They are best bought as plants or rhizomes which should have shoots appearing.

At our next meeting on **February 8th**, we have invited **Michael Holland** with his favourite talk -5 **Plants that Changed the World**. Michael trained as an Ecologist and started his career at the Chelsea Physic Garden in London, latterly as Head of Education for over 17 years. He has taught tens of thousands of people, aged 2 to 92, about the natural world. His first book, 'I Ate Sunshine for Breakfast' was published in April 2020 providing an inspiring introduction to the wonderful world of plants and how they are relevant to our lives. The talk will look at some of the plants without which our planet would not be the same! SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

Our first meeting of 2022, on January 11th, looked at a number of poems associated with the theme of Travel. It was a good way of widening our horizons and looking forward to a time, hopefully not too far in the future, when travel should become easier than it has been for the past two years.

We began with 'The Golden Journey to Samarkand' by James Elroy Flecker, an extract from his verse drama, 'Hassan'. Next was 'The Song of Wandering Aengus', by WB Yeats, a poet of the Irish 'Celtic Twilight'. Edna St. Vincent Millay's 'Travel' sums up the feeling of wanderlust, as does Robert Louis Stevenson's own poem of that name. Rupert Brooke's 'Song of the Pilgrim' reflects his own restlessness and world-weariness, whereas John Masefield's 'Sea Fever' and 'Cargoes' are vibrant with interest in a varied and exciting world. Several extracts from Walt Whitman's 'Leaves of Grass' were full of optimism and vigour about the multi-faceted experiences he had enjoyed on his travels, whereas Tennyson's 'Ulysses' is a more sober, thoughtful contemplation of the urge for action. In 'The Nightmare Song' from Gilbert and Sullivan's 'Iolanthe', the travel is done in a nightmare. Laurence Binyon's poem 'Fetching the Wounded' recounts his travels as an ambulance driver during the First World War, and we were brought right up to date with an extract from Amanda Gorman's 'Back to the Past'.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday February 8th at 10.30 in Stoke Lyne, and the theme will be Springtime which, with global warming starts earlier every year!

THE SHELSWELL BENEFICE The Tenth of the Village Articles Mixbury



Mixbury has an unfortunate meaning, 'dunghill' or 'filthy place'. The parish includes the 'lost' hamlets of Fulwell, meaning 'foul stream' and Willaston, the 'tun of Wiglaf; the place-names indicate that all of them were Anglo-Saxon settlements. The village was never large and in 1662 there were only 34 and 21 householders in Mixbury and Fulwell listed for the hearth tax. By 1801 there were some 50 houses and a population of 304. In 1851 the peak population of 402 was reached. By 1951 it had shrunk to 184, when there were only 64 houses in the whole parish. By 2011 when Mixbury included Newton Purcell-with-Shelswell, the population had risen to 370. Its present neat and attractive appearance dates from the late-nineteenth century, since in 1874 the thatched and dilapidated cottages were replaced by order of the Court of Chancery with about 40 semi-detached houses. The old cottages were described as being 'huts...with here and there an upper room reached by a ladder'. Bishop Wilberforce noted the poverty and poor condition of the cottages and he blamed the old and non-resident squire, who owned the whole village and half the parish but did nothing for it. In 1803 the parish was the poorest in the hundred. It continued poor and neglected and in 1854 the children were still leaving school at eight or nine to work in the fields or to make lace.

The parish church of All Saints dates from the 12th century but the only Romanesque feature left is the south door. There was considerable rebuilding in the 14th century, when new windows were inserted in the north, east and south walls of the chancel. In addition the present tower was erected, the north aisle was built and a clerestory was added. In the 17th century many changes were made to the fabric, including a low roof over chancel and nave, and a large south porch. Later, W.J.Palmer (rector 1802-51) organised extensive repairs and an elaborate restoration, in spite of initial objections from the vestry. This work included a new carved altar, stained glass, tiles and panelling, and a smaller south porch. Palmer also rebuilt the rectory (enlarged in 1855) and built the school in 1838. In 1928 the school was reorganised as a junior school and seniors were sent to Fringford. In 1948 it was reorganised as an infants' school. In 1954 it was granted aided status but it closed in 1955.

Palmer was a member of a remarkable clerical family and locally he was highly regarded as a saintly rector. He made some close local connections, since he married Dorothy Roundell, sister of Henry Roundell, rector of Fringford 1814-52, while his sister married Charles Wood, curate of Fritwell. His eldest son, William, became a leader of the Oxford Movement and a pioneer in establishing friendly relations between the Greek and Anglican churches. He died a Catholic. His younger brother, Roundell Palmer (1812-95), had a distinguished political career, rising to Lord Chancellor and becoming Earl of Selborne in 1872. His son and grandson also had successful political careers, the 2nd Earl becoming first lord of Admiralty, 1900-5, establishing Osborne, Dartmouth and Royal Naval War College, and becoming high commissioner for South Africa, 1905-10.

Farming has been the main occupation of the villagers. In the 1850s the village also had a blacksmith, a baker, two shopkeepers and a carrier. By 1903 there was still a blacksmith and a shopkeeper, but by 1939 the only tradesman left was a shopkeeper. This decline certainly compares unfavourably with other villages in the benefice. The parish has been notable for its connection with medieval tournaments, since in 1194 the open ground between Brackley and Mixbury was made one of the licensed tournament grounds in England. There was also a castle at one time, and the earthworks opposite the old school are still clearly visible.



Garden Waste Collections are Changing

Between September 2021 and January 2022 Cherwell District Council will be delivering a free 23 litre silver outdoor caddy to all households in the district.

They will let us know when to expect our caddy delivery by putting a bin hanger on one of our bins a week before delivery. Once received, please start to use your caddy for food waste instead of the brown bin. They will also supply a roll of compostable caddy liners to help us get started. The food waste caddy will be collected weekly.

From 1st March 2022 garden waste collections will change to a paid-for opt-in service at a cost of £40 per year. We will be able to sign up from December 2021 and those registering before 1st February 2022 will be charged a reduced rate of £36. From March please do not put food waste in your brown garden waste bin, use your outdoor food waste caddy. Further information can be found on the Cherwell District Council recycling website along with a bin collection calendar.

On Sunday 5th June Mixbury will join in the fun to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. There will be new village bunting to make, music, dancing, children's competitions and much much more! More details to follow.

All Our Yesterdays - How special are archaeological "finds" today?

Recently we have been treated in this region to various announcements by HS2 of amazing heritage on the path of the HS2 track which is being built. The most prominent so far are:

- 1. A wooden Roman figure found in a ditch in Twyford, Buckinghamshire.
- 2. Iron Age and Roman settlements cheek by jowl at Chipping Warden, Northamptonshire.
- 3. The torsos and heads of some large Roman statues found near Stoke Mandeville, Buckinghamshire.

I'm sure that most of us would readily have foregone the experience of HS2 carving its way through our parishes, destroying the natural environment, communities and the homes and livelihoods that many people created. You would think that as someone who values history and heritage very highly that is difficult for me to write but, frankly, it is no contest. The destructive effects of HS2 greatly exceed the heritage gain, which would have been sitting safely under the ground anyway. However, we are where we are, and the heritage found should be valued for what it is and what it tells us about the period of history from whence it came – in the cases of 1 to 3 above, the Iron Age and Roman periods. In these cases, it really doesn't matter where these finds were. They give us more of an insight into times in history, in which we all have stake, rather than the place.

How widespread are archaeological finds, particularly in this region? In 2007 research published by Oxford University concluded that there were 1224 hillforts in England, of which 40 were in Oxfordshire. Archi UK, an organisation that has created a database of 190,000+ British archaeological sites, from pre-history to medieval times, has in January 2022 added a further 1000 GPS locations of Roman settlements, villas, buildings and occupation sites. The database carries over 250 records of sites, from pre-history to medieval times, within 10km of Mixbury, many of which will be in the area of Shelswell Benefice. Historic England say the Normans built 500 motte and bailey castles (nearly all made of wood), followed by those with a stone keep, in the first 20 years after

the Battle of Hastings, of which 90 remain in England today. (Mixbury has the earthworks of the Norman Beaumont Castle). It is thought that the Normans built over 7000 churches in England over the century following 1066, many of which form the bases of what exists today. And according to Oxford Archaeology, in 1974 there were 148 deserted villages in Oxfordshire: Mixbury's is at Fulwell. Added to this are the many pottery sherds, pieces of glass, coins and other artefacts which ordinary people find, sometimes in their back garden, and it is fair to say that we live in an archaeologically rich area. So, when you are walking around your parish it is a wonder you don't trip over one or more of these features! It is certainly very unlikely that you will be far from something of historical interest.

Of course, the plough has long-since buried or altered many of them, and others will be covered by modern buildings. Detectorists, archaeologists and serendipity have led to the discovery of some. In June this year Mixbury History Group hopes to mount archaeological investigations at what we think are key sites in the parish - to confirm the possible locations of Mixbury's Saxon church and the Saxon mills at Mixbury and Fulwell; to locate a Roman road which we think runs to the north and east of the village; to investigate the content and nature of Oseney Abbey's grange (after 1205), and Mixbury's manor houses from 1550 to 1750, all at Fulwell; and to investigate the "lumps and bumps" in a field to the west of the village. The success of the whole venture depends in the first instance on the success of an application we have made to the National Lottery Heritage Fund for resources to employ professional archaeologists. Keep your fingers crossed, please.

Having intimated earlier that it doesn't really matter in many cases where heritage finds are made, it does matter to the people who live there. In August 2022 we surveyed households in Mixbury so we could gauge their interest in history generally and interest in the work of the History Group in particular. Only 27% of adults frequently "consumed" history/heritage through, for example, books, films, visits to museums etc. This compared with 43% who had interacted one way or another with the History Group. But 88% of respondents agreed with the statement that "Knowing the parish's history gives me a sense of place", and 93% enjoyed "Learning about Mixbury's history and heritage. I suspect that most places, primed by History Tents and Newsletters, would come up with a similar result: I think we are all a bit parochial about where we live. But a wider understanding of history and heritage comes from looking at and valuing our neighbours' lots as well as our own.

Post Script: By the time this article appears, we will have had a presentation by the sector manager for Fusion, HS2's enabling arm, about the archaeology they have found in Mixbury. I will include an update about this in next month's Shelswell News.
