


MINISTER'S LETTER

The factsite.com says that "May is a month of transition". If you live in the northern hemisphere you are moving from cold to warm and if you live in the southern hemisphere you are moving from warm to cold (or colder, anyway). Certainly, ecclesiastically speaking, we are this year in May moving from Eastertide towards Pentecost. Pentecost, the feast marking the coming of the Holy Spirit to the first disciples and the 'birthday' of the Church.

In secular Britain today, the first of May is a bank holiday, 'May Day'. In the past it was sometimes known as 'Garland Day', particularly in rural areas, and was celebrated with music, dancing and games.

The first of May is Garland Day So please remember the garland We don't come here but once a year So please remember the garland.

Primary school children would collect greenery to make garlands in the shape of hoops or crosses, and parade with them in the hope of collecting money. There are still some Garland Ceremonies today, one of them very near to us in Charlton-on-Otmoor. A large wooden cross covered with yew and box leaves stands above the rood screen in the church. On May Day this is taken down and re-decorated with fresh greenery and flowers, and the school children carry small decorated crosses around the village and bring them to a special service.

Years ago, I took a service in that church and can still remember being struck by the greenery cross above the rood screen and wondering if it represented some form of symbiotic relationship between Christianity and paganism, nothing I would ever have seen in the London church where I had been before moving to rural Oxfordshire.

As time passes, as we move from one place to another, one age to another, one experience to another, we leave some things behind and carry others with us. This is what we've done in the Church over the past couple of years - worshipping via Zoom, sitting spaced out in church, singing, not singing, mask wearing, worshipping outside; we've kept some practices and changed others, we've adapted. We are in a time of transition. It's Maytime.

Changes may happen as Pentecosts – birthdays – come and go, but one change won't happen. May in our hemisphere is **also** the time to celebrate the coming of spring, the blossoming of trees and flowers, the burgeoning of new life, and in this respect the Church is aligned with nature; the Easter experience affirms the power of life over death, light over darkness, hope over despair, love over hatred. The Easter message is as constant as nature's springtime – "Love", wrote Shakespeare, "whose month is ever May".


Benefice Service and BBQ at Evenley Wood Garden Sunday 29th May

Donations from the Lent Lectures

At three of the Lent Lectures, we invited the speaker to nominate a charity for any donations to be sent to.

Eva Grosman nominated **Smart Medical Aid** – a non-profit non-governmental organisation (NGO) of experienced health care professionals providing medical aid, training and support to help victims of injury and trauma. They are currently working in Ukraine to help war victims. https://smartmedicalaid.org/ We donated £115

At the beginning of April, Eva forwarded an update from their director Iryna -

It was just a walk to the store with his dad, after which four-year-old Dmytry asked his father to play on a swing. But as soon as the boy began to swing, there was a terrible explosion. Dad hugged him as hard as he could and ran to the nearest shelter, the porch. When they reached the shelter, Dmytryk cried out in excruciating pain, and his father noticed blood on the boy's body. He suffered a severe back injury, after which he could not get up on his own.

He was taken to Kyiv's Okhmatdyt, where we organized a Transfer for children to Lviv (with the help of ambulances received from the Netherlands) accompanied by Czech medics and a security convoy, so the way to Lviv's Okhmatdyt was as fast and safe as possible. At the moment, we are preparing all the necessary documents to take the children to the Czech clinic, where they will make every effort to cure Dmytryk.

At the age of four, Dmytry says his full name at a meeting, likes to talk about his cat and his favourite book, about Leopold the cat. In fact, cartoons with him best distract the boy when he is given drips. After the experience, the boy's gaze became much "older", because he is clearly aware of all the horror he had to go through. He knows that he is Ukrainian and wants to return home as soon as possible.

Unfortunately, we have hundreds of similar stories throughout Ukraine.

Martin and Margot Hodson nominated the John Ray Initiative, an educational charity with a vision to bring together scientific and Christian understandings of the environment in a way that can be widely communicated and lead to effective action. In total, £869.23 was raised, half of which will go towards the Girl's Primary School in Wulu and half towards the Shelswell History Festival on Saturday 16^{th} July. That is fantastic – thank you!

Obituaries

Michael Curtis See Stoke Lyne village report.

Audrey Theresa WAKEFIELD 22nd October 1930 – 6th March 2022



Audrey Theresa Pritchard was born on 22 October 1930 in Smethwick, the youngest of three children. Her brother John began playing the violin, and with her natural curiosity it wasn't long before Audrey picked up his instrument to find out how it worked. John, not best pleased to see his little sister meddling with his violin, insisted that if she was interested, she should take it seriously. And so began her long love affair with the violin and a highly successful career in music.

By Audrey's early teens she and John were competing in festivals and competitions all over the Midlands, almost always taking the top prizes. Not realising that her musical gifts could lead to a career Audrey began training to be a secretary. Her boss, whose wife was fine pianist, heard of Audrey's festival successes and invited her to play duets. With their encouragement Audrey, aged only sixteen, auditioned for the Royal Manchester College of Music where she was awarded a scholarship that lasted five years. In 1952 Audrey graduated as an Associate of the Royal Manchester College of Music,

with diplomas in teaching and performance. In those five years Audrey formed friendships that lasted for the rest of her life.

Audrey's first professional appointment was with the Yorkshire Symphony Orchestra in Leeds, where she met, fell in love with and married Maurice Brett, another violinist. Their career in Leeds was cut short when the local authority, refusing to add a half penny to the rates, withdrew its subsidy, resulting in the orchestra's closure. The next step, in what proved to be a distinguished career, was a move to the BBC Northern Ireland Orchestra.

Audrey and Maurice stayed in Belfast for fifteen years, not only as leading players in the orchestra but also as soloists and chamber musicians, including live solo radio broadcasts, which often started very late at night. After five years their daughter Fiona was born, with Audrey perfectly combining motherhood with her busy career.

As the troubles in Northern Ireland intensified Audrey was keen to return to the mainland, and in 1970 she and Maurice joined the BBC Symphony Orchestra. It was there they met up with Jeff, who had studied at the Royal College of Music at the same time as Maurice, and they all became good friends. Audrey was respected as a fine musician and for being fun loving and extremely supportive of younger players who were new to the orchestra. Curiously, Audrey was born on the same day that the BBC Symphony Orchestra gave its first public performance, a remarkable coincidence mentioned on live tv and radio at both the 50th and 90th anniversary concerts.

After her divorce Audrey and Jeff became closer, gradually realising that each had found their soulmate. They married on 21 August 1989 to the delight of family, friends, and colleagues. Their years of international travel with the orchestra inspired a retirement that for ten years combined warm weather cruises with care of Fiona's son George. Their cruises led to many new friendships, particularly with Maria who kept in close touch with Audrey throughout her final years.

Following in Audrey's footsteps Fiona was able to continue her successful career after George was born, because Audrey and Jeff were generous in supporting her with childcare at home and abroad. At that time Fiona's orchestra spent two weeks at the summer festival in the Austrian city of Graz and in common with many of the young parents in the orchestra Fiona took George with her. This was only possible because Audrey and Jeff regularly drove the 2,000 miles return trip, combining holiday with support for Fiona and having the time to enjoy being grandparents.

When they finally retired, Jeff was determined to leave his violin in its case, marking the end of an era so to speak. Audrey, however, quickly missed playing, developed itchy fingers, and resumed playing until a few months before she died! This started a new routine, where Audrey and Jeff combined daily individual practice with playing duets.

In 2006 Audrey and Jeff moved from Chalfont St Peter to Stratton Audley, and when not cruising or child minding threw themselves into village life. Inseparable as always, they shared an enjoyment of choir, tai chi, indoor bowls, and coffee mornings, and attended church regularly. Audrey took great pleasure from visits to Symphony Hall in Birmingham, and village trips to local theatres.

Audrey's health declined over the last couple of years as her heart began to fail, and that combined with the pandemic left her and Jeff housebound for much of that time. Very reluctantly she was eventually taken into hospital where she died on Sunday 6 March.

Her funeral was held on Tuesday 22nd March in St Mary and St Edburga's, Stratton Audley, with the committal afterwards at Banbury Crematorium. Among the family and friends present was Clare, who Audrey met on her first day at the Royal Manchester College, and Maria, who Audrey and Jeff had met on the cruises – they had not met each other before, but left having become firm friends.

Audrey will be hugely missed by us all. She always had a smile on her face and a cheery word to say, and her enthusiasm for life shone through. Our thoughts and prayers are with Jeff, Fiona and George.



SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

At our April meeting we discussed poems on the subject of Music, and found that many poets have tackled the topic in a range of styles.

The poet Arthur O'Shaughnessy, in 'Ode – We are the music makers' wrote of poets being music makers who have influenced the world for centuries via their poems and songs. Another Irish poet, Thomas Moore, in his poem 'On Music' also speaks of the power of music to inspire, comfort and remind us of our past. Walter de la Mare's poem 'Music' describes how music enhances his senses and Elizabeth Barrett Browning, in 'A Musical Instrument', takes us back to a mythical dawning of civilisation and the 'invention' of music.

In 'The Darkling Thrush' by Thomas Hardy a bird is a musician bringing hope and solace to him at a bleak time of year. In another of his poems, 'At the Railway Station, Upway', he describes a scene in which a little boy plays his violin to a man in handcuffs on his way to prison, there being a distinct similarity between the thrush in one poem and the young boy in the other.

Theodore Wratislaw dealt with a popular theme in his 1893 poem 'The Music Hall', writing of his delight in one of the chorus girls. Siegfried Sassoon, on the other hand, writing when his experiences in the trenches during the First World War had made the easy jingoism of the music halls hateful to him, wishes death and destruction on the prancing singers. His contemporary, Robert Graves, in 'Dead Musicians', finds that the German composers he once loved have been tarnished by his war experiences, but that modern popular music offers no comfort either, since it reminds him of all the men who have died.

Phillip Larkin's love of jazz was well known, but in his poem 'Reference Back', he remembers how his mother's attempt at bonding over jazz records annoyed and frustrated him when he was reluctantly at home from university. His poem 'Broadcast' is less gloomy, and describes listening to a radio concert, knowing that a girl he loves is in the audience.

Tennyson's 'Choric Song', part of the longer poem 'The Lotos Eaters' is about the soporific power of slow sweet music, and is hypnotic in its effect, whereas in 'Der Leiermann' (The Hurdy-Gurdy Man', part of his 'Winterreise' song cycle, Franz Schubert presents 'peasant' music which reinforces the gloomy thoughts of his hero.

'The Piano' by Gillian Clarke describes the writer as a proud mother of a teenage son who plays the piano, whereas in 'Piano' by DH Lawrence, we hear from an unhappy son who longs for a past in which he would sit at his mother's feet as she played the piano.

Michael Curtis (31st January 1934 - 6th February 2022)

Dad - Mike as you knew him, was a fantastic husband, dad, grandad, great grandad and father in law.

As a dad, he was a tough task master, pretty strict, but always fair even though at the time we often didn't think so, as kids do! Ian and I had a lovely and memorable childhood.

We always had pets of some sort and quite often this extended to stray, or injured wildlife - Dad frequently brought home wildlife that needed care and attention and once healed they would be sent on their way. The beautiful barn owl which lived on a branch in our living room window for a few days and another time a whole clutch of duck eggs, which we hatched with a chicken given to us by Uncle Bob and Uncle John! A chicken which very much panicked the first time we put 'her' babies in the bath for a swimming lesson. We have such fond memories and were very lucky to have such a wild and crazy home to grow up in!

Eventually the grandchildren came along - James, Iain, Leanne and Olivia and dad took great pleasure in spending time with them, every moment spent with them brought lots of fun and laughter to all involved. When Mason, his first great grandchild came along, dad was so happy - he loved holding him and spending time with him. Dad was further into dementia when Marnie and Harrison came along, but he still managed to hold them and he would have a fantastic sparkle in his eyes. On top of that he was a great father figure to Iain and Olivia, as they were growing up. I was a single parent for most of their childhood and I couldn't have done it without him and mum.

Despite the early ravages of dementia, Dad still had a great sense of humour and as a family unit we had lots of fun together - he would tell Marion that she was his favourite daughter-in-law and Marion would say 'but I'm your only daughter in law Mike' which always made him chuckle. Us girls would often have a little dance in the kitchen with him, poor dad, whilst trying not to fall over, as his balance wasn't great.

At dinner times he would steal food from our plates even when we were looking and he'd just look at us with that twinkle in his eyes and a massive grin - he totally knew what he was doing.



Food shopping at Tesco was another source of fun, we would attach the special wheelchair trolly to his wheelchair - it was a big contraption - it took up the whole aisle and was difficult to steer - you get the picture - everyone gave us a wide berth. Dad especially loved this because he was able to grab things off the shelves as we went down the aisles, when mum wasn't looking. Chocolate often figured in this and we would hide it amongst the other shopping because once at checkout it was too late for mum to put it back - Dad was supposed to be watching his weight - but actually mum was trying to do that.

Dad was mums rock and she was his - during their 65 years together they had some great times. In later years he gave mum a few shocks, once at the age of 84 when he decided to climb into the big green garden waste bin to pack it down and it tipped over with him inside it - this resulted in very bruised ribs and a telling off from mum who then proceeded to feed him a large stiff whisky, much to the horror of the paramedics once they got there! Another time dad decided it would be a good idea to drive himself

to the doctor surgery after he had suffered a small stroke - he didn't tell mum because she was in the garden. Instead he just got in his car and drove himself there. The first thing she knew about it was when the surgery called her to say they were taking him to the JR by ambulance. Poor mum was horrified and dad got more than an earful when he got home that night.

Throughout his last few years, dad was first cared for at home by Jonny a live in carer and then later at Lake House Care Home. We would like to thank them all so much for taking good care of dad when we no longer could.

Eventually - after time dad lost his ability to communicate but it didn't stop him from having the most wicked sense of humour and the biggest smile, which was always lovely to see. This is how we will remember him, always smiling.

A LOOK BACK AT QUEEN VICTORIA'S GOLDEN JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS IN 1887

Stoke Lyne's celebrations were held at Swift's House and it a great deal of time and effort went into ensuring a most enjoyable day was had by all. Here is the report of the event from the Bicester Herald, 15th July 1887.

"JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

STOKE LYNE, FEWCOTT, BAINTON, AND CAVERSFIELD

Held their united festival on Thursday last, July 14, in the park connected with Swift's House As to situation, convenience, and beauty no better place could have been selected, and the kindness of Sir Thomas Peyton in this respect was, we believe, thoroughly appreciated. For the purposes of the dinner and tea, the capacious Turweston tent had been requisitioned, and had been made to look attractive by the ladies comprising the committee given below. A handsome motto was conspicuous, bearing in black letters on a white ground "God save the Queen," and at the side were the letters "V.R." A festoon of greenery rand down the centre of the tent, and portraits of Her Majesty and numerous flags completed the adornment. It is computed that about 200 sat down to dinner, which was given to all the working men and youths in the villages named. The repast was excellent in quality, unlimited in quantity, and heartily partaken of. Some of the cooking was done at the House. Unfortunately Sir Thomas, who had returned from Malvern on Tuesday evening, was by indisposition prevented from presiding over the spread. The Rev. C. D. B. Marsham (vicar of Stoke Lyne and Caversfield) accordingly occupied the chiar. The carvers included the Chairman and Messrs. W. May, W. Godwin, W. Horwood, H. King, J. Tubb, T. Baughan, A. Tanner, T. May, J. Stuchbury, J. Stanley, H. Parrott, H. May, and E. J. Damant. Each carver was supposed to have two waiters, and among these latter were Mrs. Marsham, Miss Peyton, Mrs. W. May, Mrs. Horwood (Caversfield), Miss Tanner (Baynard's Green), and Messrs. T. White, W. Ayris, J. Dickinson, F. North, J. Hickman, W. North, &c., &c. – The Chairman, in an appropriate speech, proposed the health of the Queen, commenting on her many good qualities, and he hoped she might long live to reign over them (Enthusiastic cheers were given, and the Bicester Volunteer Band played the National Anthem. Cheers were likewise given for the rest of the Royal Family.) – The Chairman then said Sir Thomas Peyton was sorry he could not attend that dinner to-day; but he not well enough. He (the chairman) hoped this day might be one of social enjoyment, and that nothing to-morrow would make them regret what they had done to-day. (Applause) – Later in the afternoon the women and children were regaled with an excellent tea, about 300 sitting down. Mr. R. Hudson, of Bicester, was the experienced "brewer" of the refreshing beverage. After dinner, tickets entitling the holders to four glasses of beer, or four bottles of spruce were distributed. With regard to the committees, who carried out the arrangements so admirably, the management of the tea and the decoration of the tent devolved upon Mrs. Marsham, Mrs A. Tanner, Mrs. W. May, Mrs Howard, and Miss Tanner. Dinner Committee: - Rev. C. D. B. Marsham, secretary and chairman, Rev. M J. Rice (Fewcott), Messrs. T. May, Tanner, Horwood, Baughan, T. White, Beesly, and T. James. Besides the large tent, there were several smaller ones, and these were erected and arranged by Messrs. T. May and J. Beesly. Flags were kindly lent by Messrs. T. C. Finch, T. Sulston, J. Campin, W. Grimsley, .W. Hyde, and Thomas (gentlemen of Bicester). During the course of the afternoon Sir Thomas and Lady Peyton appeared in the park, and took a lively interest in the enjoyment of the company. We also noticed Mr. Henry (from the Isle of Wight, who is on a visit to the House), The Rev. E., Mrs., and Miss Withington, and the Misses Webster. The sports were held immediately after the tea, and excited great interest and much amusement. They were ably managed by Messrs. Godwin, Tanner, James, and W. Horwood, to whom much credit is due. We append a detailed list of events:"

The "detailed list" includes the names of the events, the three prize winners and the amount of prize money won ranging from between 1s. and 3s for individuals and 5s for the tug-of-war team.

As space is limited, here are just the event titles, some of which might raise an eyebrow or two today!

Flat Race (for boys over 12 and under 16)
Flat Race (for girls between 12 and 16)
Sack Race (80 yards)
100 Yards (married women)
150 Yards (men over 30)
100 Yards Siamese Race

150 Yards (girls over 16)
150 Yards (men over 50)
Cock Fight
Obstacle Race
Siamese Race (under 16)
Tug of War (10 a-side)
Donkey Tournament
Donkey Race

The newspaper report continues:

"In the children's races, ties, handkerchiefs, pencil cases, &c., were awarded. Of all the items the donkey tournament was the most mirth provoking, and proved to be a splendid innovation to the ordinary catalogue of sports. The prizes are to be given away either to-day or to-morrow. There were other amusements in plenty, including cricket, cocoa-nut throwing, roundabouts, a good show, and other things, and not a few availed themselves of the kind permission given to have a look over the grounds and gardens of Swift's House. There was a very pretty triumphal arch at the chief entrance to that portion of the park where the festivities were held. It was decorated with various kinds of flags, and was the work of Mr. Parrott, gardener at Swift's House. The Bicester Volunteer Band gave every satisfaction, and an enjoyable dance was engaged in to their music. Amongst the large number of people present, were many from Bicester, including the members of the Bicester Cycling Club. Everybody appeared to be highly pleased and to have immensely enjoyed the Stoke Lyne Jubilee Festival."




