

#### MINISTER'S LETTER

#### **COURAGEOUS ADVOCACY - REALLY?**

Every five years or so, Finmere and Fringford Primary Schools, along with other Church of England Primary Schools, have a SIAMS inspection. SIAMS stands for Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools, and it is designed to assess the impact of the school's Christian vision on all that it does. In recent years, the inspection framework has been revised twice, in 2018 and in 2023, and 2018 saw the introduction of a new term: courageous advocacy. I don't know what images that evokes for you, but my mind is filled with Emily Wilding Davison throwing herself in front of the King's horse at the Epsom Derby in 1913. Or supporters of the 'Just Stop Oil' gluing themselves to significant paintings in the National Gallery in 2022. climate protesters people sticking themselves to the M25. Or Greta Thunberg absenting herself from school as a call for more action against climate change. Certainly courageous acts of advocacy, but I am not entirely sure that these are the sort of actions the SIAMS inspectors have in mind!



Maybe not, but we probably do want our children to be able to speak out against issues of injustice, especially on behalf of those whose voice is not generally heard. We do want them to be informed about issues of injustice in the world, and to be able to move beyond simply knowing to saying and doing. We do want them to be able to become agents of change in the world, bringing about transformations in our communities, both locally and globally.



In fact, it would be quite good if we as adults were better able to do that too! The problem is that it does require effort on our part if we are to find out about the facts behind an issue, rather than sticking with our often ill-informed opinions. It does require courage on our part if we are to risk speaking out, especially if our opinion does not match that of other people that we meet. And it does require sustained persistence on our part to think of and follow through with actions that will make a difference. Added to which, there are just so many things in the world that need changing. A lot of the time it can feel easier not to bother!

So what can help us be courageous advocates?

- many Christians, trying to reflect God's love within our communities and follow Jesus's teaching to love God and love our neighbour, believe that God wants us to be agents of change in the world. And at times when we feel discouraged or like giving up, we will look to God for the strength and inspiration to carry. I wonder what your own world view is, and how it inspires you to make a difference?
- who around you shares your passion? It is much easier to keep energised with the support of others.
- small steps make a difference they all add up. How do you celebrate the small steps you make?

The church communities in Shelswell do a little bit of (fairly timid) advocacy.

- we think that it is not right that many people in Bicester, Brackley and Buckingham are struggling to afford to eat, or that NHS staff working in the John Radcliffe are having to rely on food vouchers to feed their families. And so we are trying to support the local Foodbanks through the donation points in our churches. And a couple of our church community are regularly volunteering with one of the Foodbanks.
- we think it is not right that girls in so many parts of the world are minimally educated, especially as there is good evidence that educating girls saves lives and builds stronger families, communities and economies. It is one of the things that can make a real difference in the developing world. And so we are supporting the girl's primary school in Wulu, South Sudan.
- we are ashamed of the way we have used and continue to use the earth's resources, causing such devastation to our planet and impacting big time of the lives of so many in the developing world. And so we are trying to change some of our own habits, raise awareness in some of our services and other events, allowing parts of our churchyards to grow wild, and having a 'cream tea for trees' on 6th August to raise money to support the Woodland Trust's Atlantic Rainforest Restoration Appeal and Tree Aid's Great Green Wall Appeal to plant trees and restore lands across the Sahel.

And I also know of individuals who are passionate about other issues such as mental health or supporting refugees.

I wonder what injustices you see in the world, both locally and globally? What issue do you feel passionately about? Help us to share your passion and celebrate the actions you have taken by writing a short article for the Shelswell News.



#### **GOD IN THE ARTS**

#### 'He gave us eyes to see them': 'Herdsman with Cows by a River' by Albert Cuyp 1650

What is this life, if full of care, we have no time to stand and stare?' W H Davies

It is a very ordinary scene of nature. Yet there is a radiance and a tranquillity that strike us as we see the herd of cows standing in the still waters. Around them there is a lot of movement: birds fly in the sky, boats are sailing off into the sunset and two fishermen are busy at their work to the left of the canvas. But the cows and their herdsman are quiet and contented, relishing this moment of the day closing, and contemplating the world going by. And two of those cows seem to be looking out into our own world. In many of Albert Cuyp's paintings the sun bathes each scene in a golden light. Here the clouds are gathering in the sky as the sun sinks down in the west, but there is still a glowing calmness brought by the light of the sky above.

In this month of July we are probably planning holidays. Some holidays can be a frenetic rush, others are those occasions when we simply sit back and relax, letting what we see around us bring refreshment and renewal. It is the way we are encouraged to savour the joy and delight of Scripture in what is called *lectio divina*. Monastic teachers compared it to cows grazing in the field. They pointed to four stages: Lectio – we take a bite of scripture; Meditatio – we chew on that word; Oratio – we savour its flavour and nourishment; and Contemplatio – we digest its goodness to feed body and soul.

The herd of cows in Albert Cuyp's painting have spent the day doing just that – grazing and ruminating in the fields nearby. The herdsman has brought them to the river to relax in the water. Soon they will take the journey home to the farm and the safety of the cowshed. Tomorrow will bring them the opportunity to graze anew in the gift of another day. Walt Whitman wrote in one of his poems, 'I think I could turn and live with animals, they are so placid and self-contain'd, I stand and look at them long and long.' As we stand and look at the cows in this painting, perhaps we may realise that whether at work or on holiday, in Sunday worship or Bible reading at home, God can feed us through His world around and in His word in Scripture. As long as we take the time and the care to savour the delights that He offers us.


Sunday 4th June 2023

Kalisha's dad had promised that she would be on time, and at exactly on schedule at 2.30 pm, the car drew up outside of the church gates.


Kalisha and Jackson met 9 years ago when they were both working together at Bicester Village for the summer. The following summer, Kalisha instigated their first date to go and see a horror film at the cinema. She reasoned that a horror film would be the perfect excuse to have to hold Jackson's hand when she got scared. Which seemed to work very well as a plan.

Jackson grew up in Hardwick, one of the sons of Tim and Sharon Curtis. Indeed he lived there until January last year. The area was not unknown to Kalisha who used to live with her family in Brackley. The couple now live in London where Jackson works as a recruitment manager and Kalisha as a civil servant with the Foreign Office. Jackson and Kalisha are actually having two wedding ceremonies, this one, and another Hindu ceremony in September.

Kalisha walked down the aisle on her dad's arm to 'Here comes the sun' played on the organ by Pam Morgan. She was preceded by her flower girl, Ishani, and her two bridesmaids Amy and Sophie. Jackson had his two brothers Freddie and Redford as his best men.

There were two readings: 1 Corinthians 13: 4 - 1, read by Cheryl Hutchinson, and 'Love in colour' by Bolu Babalola read by Cassia Wright. There were three hymns: 'All things bright and beautiful', 'Lord of all hopefulness' and 'Jerusalem'. There were four witnesses to the signing of the marriage document: Eileen Kuester, Jean Curtis and Kalisha's grandparents Raman and Sushila Patel.

There was a retiring collection that was to be divided between the church and The Woodland Trust.


#### Rosemary Farmery

10<sup>th</sup> December 1945 – 15<sup>th</sup> May 2023

Rosemary was born near York in 1945. Her early schooling was in Pocklington, south of York. She spent holidays in Scarborough, amongst other places, in the company of her cousin Jean, now 91 and sadly unable to attend the funeral from Yorkshire.

Rosemary's father was in business as a cobbler but died when she was under 5 while her mother Mary lived to 82 having taken on the business until she decided to sell up and move both of them south, eventually, via Bletchley, to Stratton Audley in 1971.

At that time Rosemary, having already having secured her 80 words per minute typing speed, quite a feat on the old swing ping typewriters, and 100wpm Pitman Shorthand, continued to work in the Civil Service, the MoD no less, in the buying and selling of munitions which briefly took her across the pond to work in Washington DC for a while, before returning back to the UK to MoD Procurement Executive in London. The latter was something she rarely wished to discuss, having signed the Official Secrets Act.



Years later, she began keeping the books for a number of farmers and various organisations of which the Bucknell Grain Stores Syndicate was one. This led to her being the civvy "bean counter". She then kept the accounts for the estate of the late Andrew Dalton. Fortunately, she was based locally at Fritwell Manor (great for exercising the dogs). Rosemary was very fond of all the family and had the luxury to enjoy the Scottish estate for short stays. The latter is where the broken shoulder débâcle occurred with the ever patient, kind Mike Haddon et al coming to the rescue to collect her XC70 Volvo estate with the canine entourage. Meanwhile, Rosemary, despite the pain, was lording it in the hospital! Thanks go to the Daltons for hosting the rescue team.

Animals were a great passion for Rosemary, having owned a horse, kept locally back in the 1970's who according to Rosemary, "could be quite an exciting ride!" She would delight in recounting how a farmer, on what is now Southfields, came to the rescue when said horse took umbridge at a new double decker bus passing by on the A421.

The main loves of her life post MoD, were ... canine! She started with a Pekingnese (inherited from a cousin) followed by Sheba the Poodle. Her love affair with the Labrador Retriever began with Rosie a Fox Red and Mandy, a yellow. Enjoying dog agility and dog training. Rosemary, despite some early disability showing, decided to put docile Mandy into pup. Unfortunately, there were only two yellow puppies... so, guess what, Rosemary...HAD... to keep them both! She still had command of the pack now including Dee and Dilly, save the rare wanderer in Cavendish, using her direct booming voice as required.

As her pack reduced down to none, Rosemary was at a loss, made worse that now retired, she had more time for her dogs. All told, a puppy was out of the question which she eventually came to terms with. So, after a word with her vet, off she went to Blenheim Palace to view a particular Labrador in trial which was the result of a recommendation. She was shocked at the submissiveness of said black dog....then she said YES, I'll have her. And there started the love affair of Rosemary and Cricket.

Rosemary's patience around dogs brought Cricket out of her past and into a new life as a cheeky, but a highly loyal companion. After some daily fitness walks during lockdown on Seven Springs, thanks to permission from the late John O'Neil, Cricket was ready to be Rosemary's new scooter's outrunner after gentle encouragement from Rosemary.

Rosemary enjoyed the independence that her scooter brought her once again, with freedom to go where she wanted locally with a smile and kindly interaction with those she and Cricket met. They could happily potter along on the scooter at 2mph or up to 6mph, they enjoyed pub lunches in Fringford, rides/trots to the Stratton Audley Mill, up to Stratton Audley Park, then enjoyed coffees at the Howson's West Farm Barn, where she had also arranged ladies' breakfasts in opposite to the village Men's breakfasts - Ever the early feminist!

On top of all this, she had also previously helped out with the Parish Council, and regularly continued to really support Save The Children, the Guide Dogs for the Blind, Dogs for the Disabled, Royal British Legion and numerous other charities.

Latterly, Rosemary had also edited the Shelswell's News bringing her into regular contact with many in the Benefice she had known for years and meeting those new to the Benefice. In this period, when reliant on dog walkers and morning carers, one particular carer, with whom she clicked, left, so Rosemary tracked her down. Anna with her happy disposition, would come to clean, cook, be the helper to sort the never-ending boxes into piles of ... charity shop, discard or to keep but also to after "booked time" to just chat and laugh. Anna was helping Rosemary with decluttering until just very recently.

Rosemary should be remembered for her lunch parties in her redesigned garden, her moving the garden room (only twice!) and latterly her pre-Christmas prosecco fueled evening. The latter just in December 2022 started by one of Rosemary's famous "if you don't mind, could you "just russell up" a few drinks and nibbles" that turned into a lot of Prosecco and many canapés for a long evening full of laughter. She loved it. She then decided when directing others on tidying up, that she would like to have a summer "do" outside, perhaps to be planned at the end of May once she had her new joystick scooter; sadly, she left us all a few weeks prior.

In brief, Rosemary was a good friend to all her friends, to her own and visiting dogs, but in particular, her last faithful companion, lost only just 3 months prior... Cricket. We trust that they are now once again, The Team.

Rosemary's funeral was arranged by Mike Haddon, her executor, with help from Sarah Noujaim. It took place in Stratton Audley Church on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> June. The church and porch were filled with an amazing number of flowers donated by villagers, an indication of how much she will be missed. Rosemary was then taken to Banbury Crematorium before everyone returned to Garden House for some rather wonderful refreshments and time to exchange memories in the sunshine.

Rest in peace, Rosemary.

A perfect Spring evening was spent when we visited a real treat at Chivel Farm Garden in Heythrop, Chipping Norton in May.

It has been in the current owner's family since 1800's. Originally a working farm. The house itself is situated near some trees which were planted at that time including an enormous sky high Wellingtonia (Sequoiadendron giganteum) There is a wide range of ornamental trees including the beautiful colouring of Acer Brilliantissimum, Cedrus deodara and many varieties of Magnolia, particularly a gorgeous upright called Yellow River, covered with unusual yellow flowers. The borders are colour schemed with a charming visual smorgasbord with unexpected treasures such as white Veronica, a dark red Astrantia, with a selection of Peonies including 'Molly the Witch' The area which used to be a tennis court is now an exciting wildflower meadow with orchids. The enchanting garden looks over the breath-taking undulating vistas of the Oxfordshire countryside and makes full use of the landscape.

A week later, we had an opportunity to visit Swallows Nursery at Mixbury with the new owner, Anna Allen. She has taken on this good nursery and made it her own, with new show gardens, a fabulous wooden pergola for seating, and an excellent range of trees and shrubs with herbaceous plants galore. Members receive a 10% discount and will thoroughly enjoy looking for that perfect plant in this wonderful nursery.

June should have seen us visiting The Grange at Chalgrove but the owner asked if we could delay the visit till autumn, so instead we had a lovely evening in the garden of member, Buzzy Lepper.

Buzzy runs her own business, Flowers Naturally, and has a large area given over to flowers for her arrangements. It was lovely to see such a range of flowers and there were many that caught our attention, in particular, a white Corncockle, with the most delightful markings. After some searching online, we identified it as Agrostemma 'Bianca' and Secretary agreed to order some for the members. While we enjoyed some refreshments, Buzzy demonstrated how she makes her hand-held bouquets, making it look so easy. Many thanks to her for allowing us to visit at short notice.

#### SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

Our June meeting was centred on the theme of Emblems – flags, badges and symbols.

Poems about flags and what they can represent were: *The Red Flag*, composed by Jim Connel in 1889; *Flag* by John Agard, a contemporary poet from the Caribbean; *The Bonnie Blue Flag*, a Confederate song from the American Civil War, and another favourite in the Southern States, *Dixie*, read in its two versions- the Union one being a skit on the original version, which was written by Daniel Decatur Emmett. The *Star-Spangled Banner* by Francis Scott Keys, and *The Maple Leaf Forever* (in its original and 1975 versions) focused on America and Canada respectively.

Two extracts from Shakespeare's play *Henry V* employ symbolism in the form of bees, eagles, weasels, mice, cats and music. In *The Sick Rose* by William Blake the rose symbolises healthy and fulfilling love which, in Blake's opinion was being laid waste by the 'invisible worm' of sexual diseases. *Daisies are our Silver*, a children's hymn written by Jan Struther, equates the beauties of the natural world with jewels. Langston Hughes, a poet of the Harlem Renaissance in America, depicts a mother telling her son that her life has been "no crystal stair" in *Mother to Son*.

The Red Cross Nurses by Thomas Lansing Masson, a lesser-known poet of the First World War, makes clear what a wonderful organisation that was and is. The Crown by Carol Ann Duffy pays a reverent yet clear-sighted homage to the late Queen, and an Australian poet, CJ Dennis, has fun with heraldry in Our Rampant Coat-of-Arms. Similarly tongue-in-cheek is Emblematic by an anonymous amateur poet from Wales. The First Badge by AP Herbert, and written in 1945 gently mocks a Wren who has gained a Good Conduct medal. Hail to the Chief, inspired by a poem by Walter Scott is played to honour a current President.

A 2011 poetry competition in Canada called Totems in the Sky received one entry entitled

*Symbols of Pride* by Carolyn Devonshire. It looks at totem poles as symbols of Native American culture and history. In *Still I Rise* by Maya Angelou, the poet uses dust as a symbol of the oppression of non-whites in America, but also of her ability to rise above the negative side of life.

In *Metaphors* Sylvia Plath poses a riddle worthy of the Anglo-Saxon poets, finding a string of images to symbolise being pregnant. The metaphysical poet John Donne uses a pair of compasses to symbolise the closeness between him and his wife in *A Valediction:Forbidding Mourning*.

Lastly, a poem loved by our hostess Jane, is Edward Thomas's iconic poem *Adlestrop*, written before his death in the First World War. It symbolises the glories of the English countryside and the peace and tranquility lost during that conflict.

Two poems held over and to be included in our July meeting (the 4<sup>th</sup>) are *Ragged Old Flag* by Johnny Cash and *Flower of Liberty* by Oliver Wendell Holmes. The theme for the 4<sup>th</sup> is Freedom.





The village hall is now fully back in use and most of the regular users have resumed their scheduled events.







#### A Look at William Holt's Memorial in St Peter's Church

In the March 2023 issue of Shelswell News I looked at the Love family memorial in the chancel. If from that memorial you then turn to face the altar you will see to the altar's left a stone chest tomb set in a recess with a brass immediately above it and higher up above them both what I think of as a coat of arms. These form the memorial to William Holt, who died in 1582, and his wife Katherine.

We'll start at the bottom with the **chest tomb**. The 2017 edition of "The Buildings of England: Oxfordshire North and West" describes it thus: "tomb-chest with bold strapwork". According to that book's glossary "strapwork" is "late C16 and C17 decoration like interlaced leather straps".



J. C. Blomfield, in his section on Stoke Lyne in the "History of the Present Deanery of Bicester," series, published in 1894, points out that "In the recent restoration of the church this tomb has been removed from its original position on the N. Side of the altar, and placed in an arched recess, in order to give greater space."





Close ups of the male and female sides of the brass

The **brass** immediately above it is described by Arthur Mee in the Oxfordshire volume of "The King's England" as follows: "William Holt of 1582 and his wife Katherine have with them ten children kneeling on cushions on a tiled floor, he in a rich cloak and ruff, she in a ruff and gown with a pointed bodice, and the children dressed to match." There are two sons are kneeling behind their father and eight daughters behind their mother, all in the same posture. "The Buildings of England" gives the size of the couple as 11 in (28 cm).

Images of the both the Love and Holt brasses appear on Oxfordshire County Council "Heritage Search" website. However, while researching this article I realised that the brasses has been catalogued with each other's dates so I emailed the Oxfordshire History Centre who checked their records and replied "it was the photographer, Percy Simms, who mixed up the dates on his own glass plates".

Underneath the figures on the brass is an inscription which didn't come up well in my photographs but can be transcribed as:

"Here lye interred the bodies of William Holt Esq & Katharine Dormer his wife, the daughter & heir of John Dormer Gent. This William Holt was the son & heir of Robert Holt & Elizabeth Lyne his wife, one of the daughters & coheirs of John Lyne chiefe lord of Stokelyne. Obijt 7 Jan 1582."

William's father, Robert, was the first of the Holts to hold the Stoke Lyne estate via his wife. Blomfield includes a Holt family tree in his book which names seven of William and Katherine's ten offspring: the two sons are Thomas and William, and the five daughters Anne, Brydgett, Isabell, Frauncys and Katherin. The other three unnamed daughters presumably did not survive until adulthood and therefore must be the ones represented by the three shorter females in the group. Unfortunately, the Stoke Lyne parish registers available on the Ancestry website do not begin until the 1660s so I cannot add any further information.

Finally, the uppermost part of the memorial which "The Buildings of England" describes as a "large painted stone achievement". The glossary defines an achievement as "a complete display of armorial bearings." It is a colourful and densely packed piece of work. Blomfield contains a detailed description of the various heraldic elements, the most unusual of which (to me) is the arm at the top holding a "pheon" which is defined as a "representation of the head of a javelin, dart, or arrow point downward with two long barbs engrailed on the inner edge".






William was succeeded by his son Thomas, who in turn produced at least seven offspring. Thomas is succeeded by his eldest son Ralph. In a repetition of names Ralph is succeeded by another Thomas and that Thomas is succeeded by another Ralph ie William and Katherine's great x 2 grandson. It is this Ralph who is named on the memorial on the wall above the organ which I will talk about in a separate article as well as the memorials for his sister and one of his wives who are commemorated elsewhere in the church.

One final thought: according to Blomfield, William's father, Robert, is also buried in the church "He was buried within the chancel of the Parish Church, near the south door, where a stone slab, 3ft long, with a plain + incised at its foot, and the name only in black letters inscribed, "Robert Holte," marked his grave." The only slab now visible near the south door of the chancel is the one pictured below:



but it is considerably longer than 3ft. Is this the slab? It certainly displays a cross. If you rub your hand over the base of the cross you can feel that something was once written there – but what? I have not been able to find any other reference to it.
