MINISTER'S LETTER

What do you think?

Since the beginning of 2023 I have turned up at at least two churches to take a service only to find, at the appointed 'start' time, that no more than one person has arrived. A couple of other times only 3 people arrived. I don't think I need to take this personally because other members of the Ministry Team report similar experiences. Overall, numbers attending Sunday by Sunday are very small 6 - 8 - 10


Few people today are committed to worship every Sunday. Maybe 20 over the whole of the Shelswell Benefice. Yet every Sunday in the Shelswell Benefice there are four or five services on offer for them to go to. As it's unlikely the regular attenders will go to church more than once on a Sunday, it means each service is sparsely populated, even if a few of the irregular attenders turn up! Consequently, the worship is friendly but hardly uplifting. It's inhibiting to have to sing when there are so few people; it can be difficult to find people to help with the preparation of the church, the readings etc., volunteers are few and Ministers feel rather like 'pressgang masters' trying to get people to come and participate. The congregation can feel disheartened – a sad 'remnant'.

Why don't we just have one service on a Sunday which everyone goes to? [Or at the most, two.] The committed worshippers would benefit from each other's company, Ministers would benefit from being able to share leading the worship, there would be more chance of offering 'live' music and having the support of a choir; we would be strengthened by worshipping together. Any 'new' person who might risk putting a toe into the church would not feel so 'exposed' as they would do entering a church where there are only 4 or 5 people. Each Sunday the service could be in a different church so that 'hosting' responsibilities are shared.

Is this such a mad suggestion? Well, experience over many years highlights a particular emotional difficulty - the reluctance of many people to worship in any church other than their 'own' church. People are willing to drive to hospital appointments, the supermarket, the gym, take their dogs for walks, visit friends, go to the theatre, etc. etc. but going to another church appears to be a step too far. Or is this just a convenient excuse for **not** worshipping? In which case, these will almost certainly be the people who won't regularly turn up anyway even to services in their 'own' church. So, for the benefit of supporting and building up the committed, and to enable deeper, richer worship, let's try worshipping together.

WILDLIFE WORKSHOP

Saturday 29th April,

10 am – 12 noon – Open workshop - Stratton Audley Churchyard

An open workshop for people of all ages exploring the flora and fauna of the churchyard. You don't need to live in Stratton Audley to come!

The workshop will be led by Stephen Nisbet, MBiolSci CEcol MCIEEM. Ste is a Chartered Ecologist with 9 years' experience in the Ecology sector. He works for Atkins as an Associate Ecologist and is currently on secondment to East West Rail Alliance, where he holds the role of Section Ecologist. Ste is interested in all sorts of UK species and habitats, but particularly in herpetology (amphibians and reptiles).



Ste will be staking out some suitable spots in the churchyard with wildlife cameras in advance of the event and bringing the footage with him, so that we can see what nocturnal wildlife there is, and he will be laying out some reptile mats in sunny spots to hopefully attract any amphibians, reptiles and interesting invertebrates for us to see. He will be taking these away with him after the event, but will be leaving us with a bug hotel.



Congratulations to Victoria who was confirmed at the Easter Vigil service at Christ Church on Saturday 8th April by Steven Croft, Bishop of Oxford.

Victoria lives in Juniper Hill with husband Ed and their little boy Benedict. She attends Cottisford Church and is on the rota to read some of the Bible readings during the services.

It was a very special service – it started in the Cathedral Garden in the twilight. A new fire was lit as we recalled the first words of God at the moment of creation: 'let there be light' and as we remembered the saving works of God throughout history, culminating in raising Jesus from the dead. The Paschal candle was lit from the flames, and the president proclaimed 'Christ is risen!' We all responded 'He is risen indeed. Funerals

Eileen Bessie Curtis

26th October 1936 – 24th February 2023

Eileen was born on 26 October 1936, at Grange Farm in the tiny Oxfordshire village of Godington. She was the youngest of three children, with her sister Margaret and brother Norman. Her parents were Kathleen (née Markham) and Roy Tew.

From the war years, Eileen remembered the farm work and the evacuees sent to live with them. She talked of the hours of work churning the butter, and of the long walk up Godington hill every day to the school bus for Fringford. In 1948 when she was 12, her mother died suddenly at the age of 45. Eileen was sent then to a weekly boarding school in Summertown, Oxford, which she disliked, until at age of 15 she enjoyed a short and happy time at art college, creating beautiful dress designs; she was incredibly talented.

She was abruptly called back home at the age of 19 - upon Margaret's marriage, to keep house for her father and brother. Through Young Farmers, she met John Busby, a farmer, and married him when she was 21. They took over College Farm in Weston near Towcester together, from John's father. Stephen was born in December of that year, and Caroline in April 1961. Eileen was a hard-working housewife and mother on the large mixed farm which included dairy, livestock and arable.

Her brother's and sister's growing families played a huge part in family life, staying in each other's homes and sharing family seaside-holidays and Christmases. After around 12 years however, at the age of 35, she left John and took the children to live with Norman, his wife Anne and their family back at the farm in Godington.

Eileen found live-in work at Caroline's school as a matron, and later as a primary school teacher in Brackley. She was unused to working out in the world and learned a lot, including, she said, to bear her shyness more easily, and to earn her own living for the first time.

The family of three moved to a cottage in Fringford next to her father's house, which is where local farmer and widower John Curtis, from Hardwick, came to take her out to dinner one day. A year and a half later, in 1976, when she was 39, she and John married, and his and Eileen's families lived together in Hardwick, with John's children Tim and Sally, over the road from John's brother Bob, Jean and their family.

Eileen joined John, Bob, and Bet Morgan from next door, and sometimes John's sister Mary, in running the farm. It was very physical work, including the harvests, the busy Christmases (selling Christmas trees and cockerels), the potato and egg businesses – helping to grade hundreds of eggs every day and delivering them and sacks of spuds locally. She was never happier than during those years. She loved her large family and being every day outdoors. In 1996, Eileen and John moved into the new house they had built in Hardwick - Sycamore House, where everyone celebrated her 60th birthday the same year.

Soon afterwards, John and Bob decided to stop farming, and for Eileen those years were then filled with managing her bed and breakfast guests, enjoying her grandchildren, her cake and jam making – first for the new farm-shop, then for her own regular market stall in Brackley and Bicester, and her gardening of course.

Eileen and John loved travelling, especially abroad, and visited far and wide, including New Zealand at least seven times to see Norman and his family there. Other holidays, more often than not, included Norman, Anne and Margaret. Eileen and John also became more involved in local Christian-based activities, supporting the church and hosting home-group meetings too.

When John passed away in 2021 after over 45 years of married life together, she learnt to slow down and take things more easily, adoring her family, her garden, reading more, and deepening her faith. She said she came to know more from the inside how we were all being cared for, loved and guided along God's path.

Eileen's family have been struck by how many of the cards and other tributes received have described her kind and gentle soul, her lovely presence and radiant light, her care for others, her being a lifetime giver, and a special friend. Her funeral was a celebration of her life, simple and informal as she'd wished. It wasn't easy for her to be the centre of attention and she came to accept this more - that she was loved and appreciated by so many.

Norman Davis

23rd November 1929 – 22nd February 2023

Norman Davis, long term resident of Hethe, very sadly died on 22nd February. His funeral took place at Banbury Crematorium on Monday 27th March.

Norman grew up in Long Whittenham. He had been born prematurely on 23 November 1929 as a result of a motorbike crash involving a van, when his dad was killed and mum badly injured. So he was called Norman, after Norman the Conqueror, by the nurses at Abingdon Hospital, as he was such a little chap, but intent on surviving! He showed the same determination to survive when undergoing major heart surgery in his 40s, proceeding to live in relatively good health until the last few months of his life and living to the grand age of 93 years.

Norman enjoyed his childhood at Long Whittenham. He was in the church choir, which involved attending church at least twice on a Sunday. His first job was with Ameys in the gravel pits on the Thames near Long Wittenham, and it wasn't long before he'd persuaded his boss to let him have a go at driving the big digger.

He was a good driver and was driving right up to his last few days. When he joined the army, his driving skills were put to good use. During his army days he travelled widely, and recounted his days in Singapore, Aden and the Suez canal, where he was involved in building bridges and roads. On leaving the army, he took on lorry driving. It was through this that he first met Margaret. He would describe with some joy how he found some excuse to take her in the lorry, sitting her on the long leather seat in the front, and quite deliberately taking the lorry round the corner just a little bit fast, so that she came sliding over the leather to bump into him.



He and Margaret were married on 29 March 1952. It was winter and snowing. The song 'Get me to the church on time' was true for Margaret, but unfortunately not for Norman. His car broke down on the way from Long Wittenham, and having managed to get a lift to Bicester, there were no taxis available as they were by this time all at Hethe! He managed to persuade a well wisher to give him a lift but was over an hour late. Apparently some doubted whether Norman had chickened out, while Margaret had no doubt whatsoever that he would arrive!

For a time Norman worked as a cattle lorry driver. Local farmers remember how good Norman was at this job. Often he had to drive long distances to places like the Isle of Sheppey, arriving home in the early hours around 3 or 4am. Often the lorry broke down. Sometimes he was so tired that he would get done for speeding, but the fine went to his

boss and there were no penalty points in those days! On more than one occasion, his boss then arrived at dawn knocking at the door asking for Norman to take some stock to market, only to be rebuffed by a very protective Margaret. She soon had him move on to a more appropriate job. He also worked for William Barrett and later for Morris's at Cowley, which he really enjoyed. He was unique in wearing a white shirt on the production line, thanks to Margaret who always wanted her man to look the part!

Norman and Margaret were devoted to one another. They used to sit on the sofa holding hands, and her daughter Chris remembers Margaret sitting in the cold of the front room wrapped in her coat watching for Norman to come home. In later life, when Margaret became less able, Norman looked after her. He said once that it would have been better if he had gone first, as it is women who know how to do everything in the house. But none the less, for three years he cared for her, and under her tuition washed and cooked and cleaned and kept everything up to scratch. And he missed her hugely after she died.

Norman and Margaret initially lived in a flat over the village hall which is now Hethe house, where Christine and then Pauline soon arrived. Eventually they moved to Fringford, then back to Hethe to Hardwick Road and ultimately to their bungalow in Bainton Road.

Both Norman and Margaret were keen Oxford United supporters when they played at the Manor Ground and travelled the country to away matches and helped arrange transport. Norman also helped and encouraged youngsters in Hethe to play football, where he was called Uncle Norman. Sometimes Norman would take the family to a café in Banbury where Norman's choice from the juke box was Perry Como's 'Catch a Falling Star'. They had amazing holidays, often with other supporters. One of Norman's favourites was to the West coast of the States, visiting Grand Canyon, Yosemite, San Francisco and LA - these long holidays sometimes resulted in long term friendships. They enjoyed more latterly long weekend trips with the family to Bournmouth.

Norman lived a long life largely filled with joy and fun. He will be missed by all who knew him, and our thoughts and prayers are with his family and friends at this difficult time.

SHELSWELL GARDEN CLUB

In March we welcomed John Morris of the Chiltern Woodlands Project. This is a registered charity based in the Chilterns and was founded in 1988. The area has now been designated an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. What makes it special is the wildlife, cultural heritage, high beech forests and wooded landscape which covers parts of four counties.

Ancient woodlands have been identified where the flora has adapted to heavy shade, for example, Primroses and Solomon Seal. At Pulpit Farm, an Iron Age Hillfort has been identified. John illustrated his talk with beautiful photos of the landscape as well as a selection of natural flowers e.g., Orchids, Bluebells and Hellebores. He has been working for the project since the start, alongside volunteer groups and he gives courses in Woodland Management, Tree Identification, Felling Licences and applying for the grants.

On April 11th our meeting was quite different! Anne Webb gave a talk entitled Forensic Botany and Palynology. (Palynology is the study of pollen grains and spores.) She had always been interested in Forensic Science and avidly followed TV programmes e.g. Life Scientific. By exploring and using evidence from trees, plants, pollen and fungal spores at the scene of the crime or on victims or suspected offenders prosecutions can be made very successfully (mostly for murder and rape cases). Pollen found on victims can be traced on offenders, for example a honeysuckle that only grows in ancient woodlands. These specialist scientists must have extensive knowledge in toxic plants, wood, leaves, seeds, pollen and fungal spores and how and where they grow.

The use of forensic botany and palynology is more widespread now and used effectively in more and more cases.

SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

The subject for April was Eggs – following on from the Birds topic of March. The earliest example was an anonymous *Anglo-Saxon Riddle*, which was written in the persona of a cuckoo's egg. A witty take on the habits of the same bird was *Cuckoos* by *Andrew Young. Hatching* by *Elizabeth Jennings* describes a chick's emergence from its shell, whereas the anonymous *Dear Egg* is a love-letter from a newly-hatched chick. *Edna St. Vincent Millay* ponders the instinct which makes a chick break out of its protective egg in *Inert Perfection*.

Robert Louis Stevenson's poem Nest Eggs and the anonymous Birds' Nests combine verse with teaching children about birds, their eggs and their habits. John Clare, the Northamptonshire poet, describes the finding of a nest with "curious eggs, in number five/Of deadened green, or rather olive-brown" in his poem A Nightingale's Nest. Robert Frost depicts the turtle eggs he found as "torpedo-like, with shell of gritty leather" in The Egg and the Machine. In Death of a Naturalist by Seamus Heaney the eggs take the form of frogspawn.

Ezra Pound uses eggs as symbols for his poetic efforts, with himself as "a grave poetic hen" in Poetic Eggs. T S Eliot in A Cooking Egg uses a stale egg to symbolise a marriage from which the novelty, freshness and excitement has gone. A happier relationship is at the heart of an extract from Marginalia by Billy Collins.

In the realm of poetry written for children, *Dr. Seuss's Green Eggs and Ham* will be very familiar (nb Nigella Lawson's recipe for green eggs and ham is excellent!) and finally, we all know the nursery rhyme *Humpty Dumpty*, a character depicted as an egg by Lewis Carroll in Through the Looking-Glass, (the sequel to Alice in Wonderland) but, some sources suggest, based on the collapse of a huge siege engine in the English Civil War.

The book chosen for our March meeting was *Disturbed Ground by Carla Norton*, which all thought a good choice, with a story which was extremely unsettling. The themes of deception, secrets, abandonment and a life 'off grid' gave us a lot to discuss. It resonated with our concerns about people living in similar or worse circumstances in the UK today.

Other books we discussed were based on our individual reading. They were *On Chapel Sands by Laura Cummings;* Feral by George Monbiot; Small Things Like These by Claire Keegan; Moth by Melody Razak; Seven Moons of Maali Almeida by Shehan Karuntilaka; A Fortunate Man by John Berger; The Slow Worms' Song by Andrew Millar; Crossing to Safety by Wallace Stegna; and the autobiographies of Clarissa Dickson-Wright, Andre Agassi and John McEnroe.

The April meeting took the form of a discussion of *Ragtime by E L Doctorow*. Opening in 1902, it addresses aspects of American culture and history, with a many-stranded plot.

OXFORDSHIRE ELECTRIC VEHICLE CAR CLUB PILOT LAUNCHES



An Oxfordshire-wide pilot of electric vehicle (EV) car clubs has begun, with fourteen new car club EVs being launched across Abingdon, Banbury, Bicester, Eynsham, Henley, Kidlington, Oxford, Thame, Witney, Wallingford and Wantage. These shared vehicles – operated by CoWheels, Enterprise CarClub and Thame EV Hire Club - will be available for people to use on a pay-per-use basis that provides a convenient and affordable alternative to individual car ownership, as well as providing an opportunity for petrol and diesel drivers to try an EV without any long-term commitment.

Oxfordshire County Council has coordinated the pilot and facilitated the arrangements between participating councils, car club operators and chargepoint operators. The EV car club vehicles will mainly be based at Park and Charge hubs in District Council car parks, and Oxford City Council are also introducing a new EV car club based at the Energy SuperHub at Redbridge Park and Ride.

Whilst car clubs have seen great success within Oxford, little has been tested outside of the City. The aim of this pilot project is to demonstrate the demand for car clubs in more urban and rural areas and test the business models for non-city EV car clubs. The hope is that if successful this pilot will help inform future EV car club roll-out strategy for the County and pave the way for more EV car clubs across Oxfordshire in the future.





Reduced Speed Limit through Hethe. The Parish Council have applied for a reduction in the speed limit for the whole village because:

- The village is small which means those passing through (rather than visiting) often exceed the 30mph speed limit by some margin.
- As we are close to the M40, Brackley, the A43, Bicester and the A4421 and A421, we are often used as a cut through when road closures and accidents reroute traffic.
- The roads are narrow and wind through the village creating the risk of accidents and bottlenecks.
- The regular movement of farm vehicles from the two working farms in the centre of the village increase the risk of accidents.

A LOOK AT THE SINGING PRIZE CERTIFICATES WHICH USED TO HANG IN ST PETER'S CHURCH UTILITY AREA

These have hung for many years in the utility area of the church but I understand they are not there at present.





The 1932 one, somewhat the worse for wear was awarded to "St Peter's Stoke Lyne Children's Chorus" for winning the second prize in Class IV of that year's Berks, Bucks and Oxon Competitive Musical Festival and the 1935 one to "St Peter's Stoke Lyne Choir" for winning First Prize in Class V E of that year's event.

So what was this festival? This annual event begin in 1903, the first one taking place in Reading Town Hall but each year a different destination within the three counties was chosen eg Oxford, Banbury, Maidenhead, Aylesbury etc. The objectives of the festival were "to offer inducements to the intelligent study of music; to apply to music the stimulating influence of competition; and to encourage local talent." In the early years the Festival had some very distinguished connections: the President was HRH Princess Christian (aka Princess Helena, daughter of Queen Victoria, who was well known as a hard-working member of the Royal family: a founder member of the Red Cross and president of two other nursing charities) with Vice-Presidents Sir Hubert Parry (the composer of the music for "Jerusalem"), Sir Walter Parratt and Mr. C. H. Lloyd and patrons included the Lord Bishop of Oxfordshire and several Earls and other titled persons. The 1904 festival was held in the Town Hall, Oxford on 5th, 6th and 7th May for which Sir Hubert Parry composed his "Ode on St Cecilia's Day" for performance by the combined choirs on the evening of the final day. Two of the adjudicators booked for that year were the composers Dr Walford Davies and Dr. Vaughan Williams.

Unfortunately the local Bicester and Oxford newspapers for the 1930s are not yet available on the British Newspaper Archive website so the only reports I can find are from Banbury or Buckingham and they quite naturally concentrate on their own area's participants. However, I have found a report mentioning Stoke Lyne's 2nd prize win at Aylesbury in 1932 in the Bucks Herald of 3rd June. The maximum score for each of the two test pieces was 100 and the totals combined for the final score.

"CHILDREN'S CHORUSES.

Test pieces – "Sea Roads" (Martin Shaw); "The Jackdaw of Rheims."

1 and Banner -2^{nd} High Wycombe Trinity Guides, conductor Miss I. Harvey, 124 (81, 43). Not quite broad enough and rather too lyrical for such compass words in the first piece while in time breaths not always taken in suitable places. In the second piece the phrases had not quite enough breath. Were often cut short.

2 – Stoke Lyne Children's chorus, conductor, Mrs. M. Spencer, 122 (82, 40). There was good tone in the first piece. Breath not always judicious. Mouths well open but consonants need a little more punch and vowels a little more character. Well in tune. In the second piece the tone improved otherwise and apart from sharpness on the top notes pleasant to listen to, but it was not always accurate as regards note values."

As well as receiving a certificate the 1st prize winners also received a banner, an example of which I've cropped from a postcard on sale on ebay, "BBOCMF" being the initials of the music festival.



I have not been able to find any reports mentioning Stoke Lyne for 1933. The 1934 festival took place in High Wycombe and Stoke Lyne came 4th in the children's choruses class. The 1935 festival at which Stoke Lyne won 1st prize took place at Maidenhead but again I've not been able to find further information. Presumably they brought home a banner similar to the one above.

The BBOCMF was not the only festival in which the children's choir participated. In 1934 the Buck's Herald of 24th March reported that "St Peter's School, Stoke Lyne" were new competitors at the "Children's Day" of the annual Buckingham Music Festival and were conducted by Mrs. C. Spencer. They competed at Buckingham again in 1935, 1936 and 1937, usually in several classes: those with an attendance of 60 or less and those with an attendance of 120 or less and those with an attendance of 200 or less and on each occasion were conducted by Mrs Cecil Spencer. Mrs Spencer did not restrict herself to the children's choir: the Bucks Herald of 20th March 1936 also lists her as conducting both the Fritwell WI and the Bucknell WI in Class V on the Choir Day (Stoke Lyne WI was not formed until 1959).

So just who was Mrs M/Cecil Spencer? Mary (or Marie) Kate Chapman was born in 1892 in Homerton, London. On the 1911 census her occupation is "typist". Her first husband was an Arthur Edward Banner whom she married in 1919. On the 1921 census she is described as a "stenographer" working for shippers Lane and Macandrew Ltd. She and Arthur eventually divorced and on 27th January 1931 she married Cecil Spencer, "Clerk in Holy Orders" at "The Chapel of the Savoy".

Wikipedia explains that this was a "Royal Peculiar", outside the jurisdiction of a diocese but under that of the reigning monarch. It became known as a location where divorced persons could marry or have their civil marriages blessed, a practice which was stopped by an incoming incumbent in 1933. By the time of his marriage Cecil was already Vicar of Stoke Lyne. His signature first appears on an entry in the burials register on 23rd January 1930 where he describes himself as "Vicar designate". Cecil was baptised in Great Sankey, Lancashire on 2nd December 1877, making him 54 when he married Mary who was aged 38. Alas Cecil and Mary did not have long together. He died in 1937 on 3rd April at The Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis in Maida Vale London but was buried here in Stoke Lyne in St Peter's churchyard. His last entry in the burial register was on 16th April 1936 and the next entry is for his own burial on 6th April 1937. His death certificate names three causes of death, one of which was an operation for cerebellar carcinoma which he underwent on 1st April. Here's his gravestone:





Of course with her husband's death, Mary had to leave the vicarage and it was at this point perhaps that the church sold off the property, for by the time of the 1939 register the Donovan family were living there (see my follow up article on the Old Rectory in the December 2022 issue of Shelswell News). I have not been able to find Mary on the 1939 register but several family trees on the Ancestry website have her marrying again to a Percy James Clayton Johnson in the Oxford registration district in 1940. The death of a Mary Kate Clayton Johnson is recorded in the Lambeth registration district of London on 4th February 1979.

As an footnote to this article, apart from bringing to the village a wife who obviously took a keen interest in church affairs, Cecil also had "modern" ideas about fundraising. The Daily Mirror of 14th August 1931 published this article:

CHURCH – AND TEA! Novel Appeal to Motorists – Picnics on Vicarage Lawn CAR PARKS FOUND

A novel bid to popularise church-going among motorists is revealed in a report just issued by the R.A.C. It contains a list of churches where car owners and cyclists are particularly welcome.

It included a "few notices from the list" and amongst those chosen was:

Stoke Lyne Church, Bicester, Oxon — Teas, including sandwiches and cake can be had for 6d. per person. Will cater for high teas for parties if advised beforehand. All profits to church funds.

The Exeter and Plymouth Gazette of 15th August 1931 also picked up on this and included a last bit of detail from the RAC entry:

"There is a notice board giving full particulars at the Stoke turn of the road. Vicar: Rev. C Spencer".
