MINISTER'S LETTER

How long, O Lord?

Has your heart been breaking as you've heard the news about the conflict between Israel and Palestine? My emotions have been buffeted between shock and horror, anger, and deep deep sadness as I imagine the utter fear of the people at that music festival in Kibbutz Re'im, as I hear on the radio the pain of parents who had just been told that their son was among the

dead, as I see those pictures of tower blocks reduced to rubble and as I wonder whether there will even be an

end to it.

Perhaps by the time you read this, a fragile peace may have been restored. But at the time of writing, the violence just seems to escalate, and each fresh atrocity on either side seems to simply fuel it further. I long for world leaders to say 'stop – there is just no future in this', for people to be

prepared to really listen to one another's grievances, and for wise and able diplomats to broker a different, more peaceful way forward.

I think it is the barbarity of it that distresses me most. There seems to be no limit to the cruelty that we can inflict on one another, and at times we seem to have such scant regard for the preciousness of human life.


Perhaps it has particularly struck me it seems in such contrast to other things I have heard or seen this week, things where life has been treated as precious, something to be handled carefully and with respect.

Like the person telling me of the way in which her husband had been treated with such care and compassion, and afforded such dignity whilst dying in a local hospice, and of the difference that this had made to him and his family.

Or whilst visiting an elderly gentleman with dementia, how I witnessed the kind and respectful way in which the live in carers interacted with him.

Or the joy of a great grandmother as she proudly showed me the photo of a new baby born just that day.

Sunday 5th November at 4pm in Stratton Audley Church



October's meeting saw us welcome the owner from Beautifully Different in Brackley. Liz gave us a brief history of her journey to owning her own business. She then went on to share some of her hints and tips for dressing different body shapes and how to feel comfortable in what what we wear. We also learnt some scarf



knotting ideas (no more slipping scarves for the Shelswell WI ladies).

November sees us welcome Jane Fletcher and her talk "Memories, making the most of your possessions." This month also sees us visit Bucknell WI for the North Ploughley group meeting and in December we are looking forward to our Christmas meal and Carol Service.

We have a wealth of varied speakers and meetings lined up for 2024 so if you would like to join us we meet on the first Thursday of the month 7.30pm in Fringford village hall. For more information contact Lesley Beagent 07729605670.



At our October meeting John Gibson, who is an RHS Daffodil Society speaker and judge, came to talk about growing bulbs. He explained the differences between bulbs, corms, rhizomes and tubers. He gave us tips on when to plant, what medium is best to plant them in, what type of container to use (must have drainage holes), where to position and their aftercare. He suggested that bulbs are great value for money as there are varieties for every season. He displayed some well-known bulbs in flower e.g. Begonias and some more exotic ones that needed extra care!

In September we heard about Penstemons from John Lee who has a wealth of knowledge about this perennial. It was originally found in the USA where it still grows in all states bar Hawaii. It can flower for up to 7 months a year and comes in many colours. It prefers a sunny position and doesn't normally suffer from any infestations. It is also easy to propagate. John also gave us some useful gardening tips. His Froggery Cottage garden was developed from original allotments and covers three quarters of an acre 'packed' with plants and is a haven for wildlife. It also contains a large National Collection of Penstemons.

The talks for the last two months of 2023 are as follows:

On **November 14th**, we will welcome Avril Hughes with a 'surprise' talk. Avril is an excellent speaker who has visited us previously.

On **December 12th** we will have our AGM with mulled wine and nibbles. This will be followed by a practical session making a Christmas arrangement in an unusual container (maximum size of approx. 25 cm). There will be a prize for the best display.

Club membership has remained at £10 for many years. All related club costs have been increasing and therefore the committee has decided that as of this membership year (starting September 2023) our membership fee will increase to £15 per year. This covers all speakers, zoom meetings in January and February as well as entry to the evening garden visits.

We are also increasing the **visitor fee to £5**, which will be refunded if the visitor decides to join the Club that evening. **Swallows Nursery** in Mixbury has kindly offered a discount to our members when you show your membership card.

We welcome visitors to our club that normally meets at Hethe Village Hall at 7.30 pm on the second Tuesday of the month (apart from August). Meetings and outings are open to members and visitors, friends and relatives. Plants are for sale at most meetings.

The September book, 'The Children's Act' by Ian McEwan was universally agreed to be a good book club choice – lots to talk about, with 'real life' cases providing great discussion. The descriptions of scenes, noises and movements were particularly vivid. The writer was able to keep us guessing – will Fiona decide for / against the blood transfusion, what will happen at the end (a twist none of us saw coming)? And much discussion about how stress can 'unhinge' people and lead to unpredictable behaviour. NB: The film is worth watching!

The October meeting is due to be held at 3 Kennel Cottages, Cottisford on Wednesday 18th October at 7.30 pm. The book is **The Memory Police by Yoko Ogawa**. At the time of going to print, the meeting had not yet taken place so a review of the book will be in the December Shelswell News. They were: *Silver Moon by Paul Mariani; The Silver Road (anon); Beneath a Silver Moon by Tracy Davidson; Silver by Walter de la Mare; Moonlit Apples by John Drinkwater; Under the Harvest Moon by Carl Sandburg; A Hymn to the Moon by Lady Mary Wortley Montagu; The Moon, as Silver as the Sun is Gold by Redfeather, and The Song of Wandering Aengus by WB Yeats.*

Maxwell's Silver Hammer, a Beatles song, is full of ghoulish humour, and Penelope contains the bitter humour of Dorothy Parker. In his poem Silver, Uros Zupan thinks about all the connotations of the word 'silver', whereas Qiniso Mogale, in his poem Silver and Gold plays on its use in currency and its ill effects. Silver Threads Amongst the Gold was written in the last century by Hart Pease Danks and Eben P Rexford and was a popular parlour song. In his play The Merchant of Venice, Shakespeare created a plot around three caskets, of gold, silver and lead, and we looked at what various characters have to say about silver.

From left field we had the quirky *The Lone Ranger and Werewolves by Randy Johnson*, a latter-day McGonagall, and went on to the surprising and downbeat poem *Silver Wedding by Vernon Scannell*. A more upbeat poem on the theme of wedding anniversaries came from Arthur Hugh Clough, in *The Silver Wedding*.

The Silver Swan, by Orlando Gibbons is a dark and pessimistic poem, whereas *Christina Rossetti's* poem *Paradise:in a Symbol* is a visionary rendering of a spiritual experience in which imaginary birds figure. Finally, *Rainy Twilight by Evelyn Scott* evokes a beautiful evening in which rain becomes "silver ladders". Our next meeting will be on Tuesday 7th November at 10.30 am, and the theme will be Joy. 



6.00 pm - fireworks display (please make sure all your pets are inside and are safe and sound on the night)



Rena welcomed members to the meeting. Five apologies were received and as there were three birthdays, cards were given out and "Happy Birthday" sung. There were no minutes to read out as we don't have a meeting in August. Instead, we had an outing for members to get together at the Trigger Pond in Bucknell for lunch, and all agreed it was a lovely lunch and nice to be able to socialise.

Rena introduced Dave Clack who gave an insight into his involvement with MI5. He started his talk by saying that anyone who has signed the Official Secrets Act is on it for life, so there were certain things he could not divulge. Dave then gave us a bit of history about his life: on leaving school he loved music and used to refurbish the reeds on musical instruments after which he worked for 5 years in a music shop.

He then joined the Police Force, a job he loved, and we were told about some of the horrific cases he was called out to such as sudden deaths, suicides, motoring accidents to name but a few and as a young 21-yearold who had never seen a dead body he found that hard. He didn't want to show us photos as it would be too upsetting. Some of his duties took him to places like Greenham Common and Upper Heyford (I am sure most of us remember seeing women chaining themselves to the fences) and included policing the miners' strike. To this day there are families who are alienated from each other all because some wanted to go back to work as they needed to have an income coming in to pay their way and feed their families. Dave was assigned to the Aylesbury Police Department and told us that the Prime Minister's country residence at Chequers came under their jurisdiction and that two of their officers had to be sent to check it every day but were not allowed to go through the gates as Chequers has its own security.

Dave retired from the force as a Police Inspector and then went on to get a job on the Council Highways. He also volunteered at Bicester Heritage Centre making and filling boxes to be given to NHS staff and all involved in helping with the Pandemic.

At question time afterwards, members asked about what drove people to murder repeatedly, examples being Myra Hindley, Jack the Ripper and Harold Shipman to name but a few. Rena thanked Dave for a very interesting talk and we then had tea served by tea hostesses Sheila and Rena during which members were reminded about the Group Meeting at Bucknell and other upcoming events. Over the years John played many different acting roles, starring in "The Sweeney", one of his favourite roles; "Z-Cars"; "Kavanagh QC"; roles in various films and then on to play "Inspector Morse". He was a very shy man and loved classical music. Alastair told us that lots of the college scenes were actually filmed at a college at Harrow near the film studios in London and also various other locations across the country. If they were filming in the streets of Oxford people watching were sometimes asked if they would like to be an extra and lots took up the offer. Alastair then spoke about Kevin Whately, who played Lewis, and then a bit about Shaun Evans, who played "Endeavour".

A Further Look at the Men from Stoke Lyne Killed in WW1 and listed on the Memorial Plaque in St Peter's Church

This is the time of year I look at the "fallen" of Stoke Lyne and put together what fresh information I've been able to unearth about them and their lives during the past year. This year I've new information on their families from the 1921 census (which was the first census to show employer information) as well as the wills which four of the men wrote on page 13 of their soldier's pay books. Privates and non-commissioned officers in the Army and Air Force were encouraged to write a will in these books when they went on active Service. There is a detailed explanation about such soldiers' wills on this website: https://www.westernfrontassociation.com/world-war-i-articles/in-the-event-of-my-death-an-analysis-of-what-can-be-gleaned-from-soldiers-wills/

Cecil Brandrick signed and dated his will on 23rd July 1916. He died just over a month later on 28th August 1916 at No 14 Stationary Hospital in Wimereux. He writes:

"In the event of my death I will leave all my property to Mrs C Brandrick of 3 Cambridge Rd Walton on Thames Surrey England."

On the 1921 census Cecil's wife, Caroline, is described as "widowed", aged 30, living at the home of her sister's family at 13 Victoria Terrace in Stratford-on-Avon. Her occupation is given as "laundress" for a Mr Edmonds at 19 & 20 Greenhill Street in Stratford on Avon. Cecil's parents, John and Maria, with his brother Ernest are still in Stoke Lyne, living in Stratton Lane. Both John and Ernest are described as labourers working for Sir A Peyton.

Charles Butler signed and dated his will on 30th June 1915 and died just a few months later on 20th November 1915 writing:

"In the event of my death I give the whole of my property & effects to my Mother Mrs Rebecca Butler, Stoke Lyne, Nr. Bicester, Oxfordshire, England."

On the 1921 census Rebecca, aged 62, and her husband Frederick, aged 66, are still in Stoke Lyne, giving their address as "near Church". Frederick is still a "gardener's labourer" for Sir A Peyton at Swift's House.

Gilbert Collins signed his will but did not date it. He was killed in action in France on 22nd August 1917.

"In the event of my death I give the whole of my property to Mrs T Collins, Park Farm Tusmore near Bicester Oxon."

On the 1921 census his parents, Thomas, aged 58, and Eliza, aged 57, are still living at Park Farm Cottages, Tusmore, with their sons Harry, George, Ernest and Alfred, ages ranging from 32 down to 16. All the males except George are farm labourers for T J Hiorns at Park Farm, Tusmore. There is nothing recorded against George in the occupation column, not even "out of work" or "none".

Harry George Hinton signed and dated his will on 1st September 1915 and died at the Manoel Military Hospital on Malta on 20th October 1916.

"In the event of my death I give the whole of my property and effects to my mother Mary Hinton, Stoke Lyne, Bicester, Oxon."

On the 1921 census Mary, aged 71, is recorded as living "near Lower Farm" in Stoke Lyne. At the same address was her stepson James, aged 57 who was a ploughman for Rupert Adams, and granddaughter Dorothy. Harry's brother, William, had married and was living with his wife and child in The Street and was also employed by Rupert Adams.

The families of most of the remaining men on our memorial (whose wills I was unable to find on the Probate Service website) were still based in Stoke Lyne for the 1921 census.

The parents of **William Harry Curtis**, Harry and Edith, were at Church Farm together with their four surviving sons. Bernard was still at school but the other sons worked for their father.

Allen and Mary Damant, the parents of **Percy Allen Damant**, were at Ivy Cottage, Swift's House where Allen was Farm Bailiff. Percy's sister Selina is recorded as having "no occupation" whilst his brother Ernest, aged 30, is a boot repairer (on the 1911 census he was a "stonemason" – so did he take over the boot repairing business which was Percy's occupation on the 1911 census?)

William Mervyn Golder's wife, Clara, had remarried in 1919 and on the 1921 census she and her second husband, Gilbert Trinder, were living in Park View, Charlbury. Clara was a district nurse in Finstock. Clara and Gilbert had an 8 month old daughter, Elizabeth, who was born in Stoke Lyne (presumably Clara had returned home to her mother's for her confinement). William's parents, Alfred and Sarah Ann, aged 58 and 56, were still in Stoke Lyne, their address is recorded as "near school". Alfred did general farm work for Rupert Adams.

The parents of **Howard Stanley and William Clarence May**, Thomas and Elizabeth, aged 68 and 66, were at Baynards Green where Thomas was a farmer. Their surviving brothers, Thomas and John, worked on the farm while sister Kate helped their mother, and sister Adeline was a post office clerk at the Post Office in Brackley.

Finally, to the family of **Henry Sydney Charles Peyton**: his widowed mother, Ida, now aged 53, was at 51 South Street, in Mayfair, London with his sister Dorothy, aged 28, with two servants. I've not been able to find Henry's brother, Algernon Thomas, the 7th Baronet, and his wife Joan: they are not at Swift's House. Their daughters, Delia and Elizabeth are recorded as visitors at "Stella Maris" in Birchington (a seaside village in Thanet, Kent), with a Nurse and Under Nurse, so perhaps they were sent there while their parents were out of the country.
