




MINISTER'S LETTER

ENCOURAGE ONE ANOTHER

September 12th is National Encouragement Day – probably not a lot of people know that!

At a recent Home Group study, we looked at Barnabas, a follower of Jesus. He was originally named Joseph, but the Apostles gave him the nick-name Barnabas, which means 'Son of Encouragement' or 'Son of Consolation'.



After Jesus' resurrection, the early Christians shared everything they had. One encouraging thing Barnabas did was to sell a field he owned and give the money to the Apostles to use to help any needy people among the believers.

After St Paul was converted on the road to Damascus, Barnabas introduced him to the Apostles. They were naturally frightened of Paul who had been vehemently persecuting Christians and they couldn't believe he was a changed man. However, Barnabas encouraged them to accept Paul by telling them how Paul had been preaching boldly in the name of Jesus.



Barnabas and Paul spent a whole year in Antioch encouraging and building up the newly established church there. On various missionary journeys Barnabas was an encouraging companion to Paul.


When church leaders in Jerusalem were debating whether Gentile believers should be made to adopt Jewish customs, Barnabas and Paul spoke up in favour of the Gentile Christians. They thought that things should not be made too difficult for them. The leaders then decided not to impose too many restrictions on Gentiles who came to faith in Jesus.

St Luke records that Barnabas was 'a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and faith, and many people were brought to the Lord' (Acts 11.24). Legend claims that Barnabas was martyred at Salamis (the principal city of ancient Cyprus) in 61. 'Son of Encouragement' - what a great nickname and epitaph to have!

The word translated encouragement in the New Testament is used to describe giving comfort, but it also involves urging, strengthening, giving courage. Throughout the Bible there are instructions to encourage one another, eg 1 Thessalonians 5:11:

'Encourage one another and help one another, just as you are now doing.'

The right words can help reinvigorate us, strengthen us for what lies ahead, and remind us to keep trying. Encouragement lifts us up when we are down or feel we have failed. It can be like a gentle push forward when we've run out of steam. Without encouragement, we can easily become dejected or overwhelmed.

Encouragement is free. It doesn't cost anything to say a few pleasant words to someone. Even a smile or saying hello to a stranger could make a difference to them. Of course, encouragement should not be hollow or patronising, but sincere and heartfelt, using words that build up rather than put people down.

'Pleasant words are like a honeycomb, sweetness to the soul and health to the body.' Proverbs 16:24



Let every day be a day of encouragement, not just September 12th. Say a cheery word, or a word of praise, or send a card or call or text someone who may be feeling down or struggling. Sincerely say thank you at every opportunity.

And let's pause to give thanks for people who have been an encouragement to us in our journey through life.



FOOD SHORTAGE IN WULU



You may remember from last November's Shelswell by the Sea that there was very bad flooding in September 2022 in Wulu – people lost their homes and belongings, and crops were destroyed. Bishop Zechariah responded by trying to get a grant for a hardship fund – he wanted to some basic equipment: utensils (cups, saucepans, jerricans, plates), plastic sheeting to make shelters, blankets and soap.

Now though, because of the crops being destroyed, people have been really struggling to find enough food. Bishop Zechariah has told us that those who have relatives who work in the Government are able to get some food though them, and people who own lots of cows have had something to eat (presumably the cows). There is food in the market but the prices are very high. Bishop Zechariah was not able to afford the flour brought in from Uganda. Food is no longer provided by the UN Food Programme - their input was discontinued with the advent of the war in Ukraine.

Bishop Zechariah had not told us directly about the food shortage, but it emerged when he was communicating about the crops he is trying to grow. He has planted them, but they need weeding. Church people will happily help with this, but they would either expect payment or alternatively that he would provide them with a good meal afterwards. Even a few weeks ago, when people from the parish of Machar-jele came and helped out, he was able to give them a meal afterwards, but now he does not have food to be able to do this. When we asked him directly, he said yes, he and his family were hungry, as were many people in the Diocese. Some of the crops will soon be ready to harvest, but he said it was difficult to see how they could get through til then.



We want to help them out, so we decided to make a collection over a couple of weeks specifically to enable Bishop Zechariah to buy food for people within the Diocese, himself included. At the time of going to press, we had only just started this, but your generosity had meant we were able to send an initial donation of £585

GIRLS' PRIMARY SCHOOL

At the end of July, we made a further donation of £500 / approx. 630 USD towards the teachers' incentive scheme. You may recall that in South Sudan, teachers are supposed to be paid by the Government, but this frequently doesn't happen. The incentive scheme aims to

- encourage the teachers

which will go quite a long way in Wulu.

- make them more committed to the school
- improve the quality of teaching and learning

Currently five teachers are receiving an incentive of 25 USD each month, a total of 125 USD, which is not quite covered by our donation.

Bishop Zecharia has also sent us some information about a 3-day training event that was held for the eight teachers in May. The purpose of this was to enable them to be able to provide inclusive and quality learning opportunities in a safe and protective environment.

Some of the topics covered included:

- good teaching methods
- lesson planning (reasons for planning, what happens when you do not plan, difference between lesson planning and lesson preparation
- techniques of identifying low learners in class
- classroom language and management
 The training highlighted a need for further training:





- most of the teachers had a low level of education themselves, which was contributing to poor teaching. (Due to the disruption to education generally during the civil war, it is likely that few of the teachers finished primary education.)
- although the pupils are encouraged to speak English, this was not often happening because most of the teachers could not themselves speak English. (South Sudan has over 60 indigenous languages, but English is the official language in South Sudan. It is important for

pupils to learn if they are to progress into higher education)

Bishop Zechariah has sent us a proposal asking us to fund a further five-day training programme for the teachers. This would cost just 326 USD / £260. We have a further year to run with the teachers' incentive programme, and will be continuing to raise money for that, but if you or someone you know would be up for sponsoring the teacher training, please do let me know.

Lauren walked down the aisle on her father's arm to Hans Zimmer's Maestro. She was accompanied by her sister Ellie who was the maid of honour and little Monty, who did a great job of carrying the cushion bearing the rings to the front of the church. James's brother Alex was his best man, and he had two groomsmen Casper and Sam. Sammy the dog, a very important part of James and Lauren's family, did come to the rehearsal, but it was thought there would be too much excitement at the event itself so he had to stay at home.

Lauren and James met online some nine years ago when they were both at university in Sheffield. Lauren was studying Politics and Philosophy and James was studying accounting. It was James's last year, and he was due to move down to Northampton for work, but, in spite of the long distance between them, the relationship thrived and in May last year James proposed whilst they were on holiday in Italy. Currently

they live in Bow Brickhill. Lauren works in market research and James is an accountant.

Lauren and James had chosen three hymns for their wedding: We pledge to one another, Come to a wedding, and One more step along the world I go. These were accompanied by Pam Morgan on the organ. Funerals
William <u>David</u> Willington Smith
23rd July 1932 - 12th July 2023



Finmere Church was well and truly full for the service of thanksgiving for David's long and very full life. Even the family were squashed into not quite enough space at the front of the church.

David was born in 1932, a year after his brother Anthony, in the Swan and Castle Hotel, Buckingham, now known as Villiers, his parents sold the hotel to buy G&CA Bennet, wine merchants based at number 1 West Street, Buckingham, then having the benefit of cellars, gardens and stables. Soon after his seventh birthday he remembered the gravity of listening, with his parents, on the radio, to the declaration of war. David remembered an air raid warning, where he was duly ushered into the family cellars (which were fully stocked with wine) and were acting as a public air raid shelter. There was a low rumbling sound, followed by a loud bang, causing much consternation to all gathered there. The air raid warden, Mr. Downer the chemist, popped his head in, to inform them, not to worry, it was just a lorry passing by and backfiring at Cannon Corner!

From boyhood David was a keen and natural horseman, and from his early teens would leave early in the morning to hack miles to meets of the Grafton Hunt. He regularly used to help Roland

Hirons, a renowned farmer and cattle dealer from Preston Bissett, and on his pony would drive stock from there to Buckingham market, a common occurrence in those days, though not without difficulties, on one occasion filling Tom Lambourne's Barbers shop in Market Hill with sheep. Aged 14 he rode to relatives in Wendover, staying in a barn overnight on the way there, and back. Herrings the Saddlers lent him a military saddle and riding cape, and on entering the municipal gardens in Aylesbury, the uniformed park-keeper spotted him from a distance, shouting "You can't ride through here", but as he approached more closely and on eyeing him up and down, he said "Are you with the military?" ... "Yes," replied David... "oh, that's all right then, carry on."

David boarded at Bloxham school, and he embraced school life, and made lifelong friends. He was a good cross-country runner, played in the rugby team and was an exceptional boxer, the headmaster taking him to the finals of the public school's boxing championships, which he won at his weight.

David's father died when he was 14. Soon after his 18th birthday, national service call-up papers arrived. The story is that they were filled out at the bar of the White Hart Hotel. On answering the question of preferred regiment, someone entered The Seaforth Highlanders, a Scottish regiment, based at Fort George, Inverness, as far from Buckingham as could be! Training was rigorous, David, though, did well, and on finishing his training was offered the opportunity of officer training and he was commissioned into the Northamptonshire Regiment and soon seconded to the Royal West African Frontier Force, Sierra Leone. The next two and a half years were spent in Freetown, where he enjoyed life as a young officer. David said he would have liked a career in the army, but having voluntarily served an extra year or so he felt his duty was to return home, and join his brother Anthony to take on the running of the family business, which had run down since their father's death, so the boys set about re-building the business, and enjoying bachelor life.

He hunted again with the Grafton, and the picture of David is from that time, and was taken in the yard at 1 West Street. He was the last person to keep horses in the town. David also played rugby for Buckingham at this time.

David met Beryl at a Grafton hunt party held in Brackley town hall, and they married in 1955, a marriage that was to last 68 years. They lived for a short while at Shalstone, where James was born, and then moved to the Old Bakehouse in Thornborough, living in a caravan whilst they renovated the dilapidated property. Guy, and then Rupert soon arrived. Due to changes in the retail world in the mid 1960's David and Anthony decided to sell the wine business which they had so enjoyed.

David then concentrated on property development, however his real desire was to farm and so Lower End Farm, Thornborough, was purchased, the family living in a caravan again whilst David oversaw the building of a new home, which became Stonelands Farm. David very much instigated an upbringing for the boys that was a mixture of Swallows and Amazons and army cadet force. 'To receive our pocket money on a Saturday morning we had to march up to father's desk, smartly present our paybook, have it signed, receive our half crown, salute, and march promptly away,' quote his sons! One neighbouring farmer remarked to David that he was surprised how he managed a fair-sized flock of sheep without any sheepdogs. David replying "I don't need sheepdogs, you see those three boys, when I say run, they run!" (And they did!)

David kept horses at the farm, breeding foals, breaking in ponies to ride and drive. He hunted regularly with the Whaddon Chase, shot regularly with the Thornborough shoot syndicate and was a keen supporter of the Stowe Beagles, of which he was a founding member, and supported them until very recently. He liked his trips to watch England play rugby at Twickenham and throughout his life enjoyed a day at the races, in particular the Cheltenham Festival and was a long-term member of Towcester Race Course. David had a strong sense of public service and supported a wide breadth of local organisations throughout his lifetime.

After leaving the farm, the family then spent some very happy years living at Bridge House, Lillingstone Lovell. After another property venture, retirement was planned, and the farmhouse of Field House Farm, Buckingham was purchased for that purpose. David and Beryl decided to delay retirement though, and instead established a children's day nursery, David saying that it was more profitable farming babies than sheep! After a few years the business was sold.

Retirement then brought them to Finmere and more adventures, travelling to South Africa every year for the next near on quarter of a century with other trips to Europe and Australia in between. During these years his 5 grandchildren were all born, Harriet, Bethany, Edward, Emma and Rosie, in whose progress he took much interest. He now found more time to spend on his love of woodwork, enjoying the time spent in his workshop making furniture and repairing items. "A Look at" some of the "Lost" Memorials of St Peter's Church

Following on from my recent articles about various memorials still visible inside the church, I thought I would take a look at some of the memorials which the "Victoria County History" website says "could not be traced in 1956".

One of these belongs to **George Fletcher**, vicar (d. 1734). The Rev. J. C. Blomfield in his 1894 "History of the Deanery of Bicester", says this of George:

George Fletcher, M.A., presented by Charles Holt, Esq. Instituted Feb. 19, 1705, cler. fil., Corpus Christi Coll., Oxford. Matriculated, July 15, 1693; B.A., 1697; M.A., 1700. His name appears at the bottom of each page of the Church Registers, which he carefully kept throughout his incumbency. Children were born to him in 1707, 1710, and 1715. In 1725 he was preferred to the Rectory of Somerton, in this Deanery, and in 1730 to that of Rousham, but he continued his residence at Stoke. In 1726 his wife died, and was buried at Stoke.

The Stoke Lyne burial register records: "George Ffletcher, Vicar, was buried August ye 11th, 1734 Affidavit made ye same day." but Blomfield does not give us details of any memorial stone or inscription but presumably there was one as we still have a slab visible in the floor upon which his wife was commemorated.

Her burial record states: "Elizabeth wife of Mr George Fletcher was buried July ye 6th 1726. Affidavit made ye same day".

Also named as having lost memorials are **Charnell Petty** and his wife **Eleanor**. At first sight Charnell seems a very unusual first name and even more so to modern eyes when you look up its origins. Various baby name websites indicate that it comes from the French and means "burial place". Some also cite the Latin word "carnarium" (of/pertaining to the flesh), from where we get so many modern words like carnage, carnivore, carnal. Charnell's family came from Tetsworth in Oxfordshire. His daughter, Susan, married Thomas Holt, the father of the Ralph and Susannah Holt whose memorials were discussed in the August issue of "Shelswell News".

Blomfield says that Charnell "came to reside at Stoke immediately after the marriage of his daughter with Thomas Holt, as quasi-guardian of the young people, who were both minors under age. He was resident here in 1634, for in that year hr proved his descent at the Herald's Visitation, describing himself as "of Stoke," and he continued his residence after his son-in-law's death as guardian to his grandson" (ie Ralph Holt).

The memorial inscriptions for Charnell and Eleanor s were printed in "The Visitations of the County of Oxford Vol 5" by William Henry Turner published in 1871 and are also quoted in Blomfield's book.

Charnell's inscription was described as being "on a white freestone".

February the 14, 1661.

Here lyes the body of Charnell Pettie, Esqr. aged 82.

The righteous shall bee in everlasting Remembrance. Ps. 112.v.6.

They who threescore years in one bed lay

Doe here rest sweetly in one bed of clay.

While his wife's inscription was on another stone:

March 7, 1662. Here lyeth the body of Elionor, the wife of Charnell Pettie Esqr. aged 85. Those that sleep in Jesus shall God bring with him. Thes. 4.V.14. So these two definitely seem to have disappeared. Additionally, according to Blomfield, Charnell's second son George was buried at Stoke Lyne in about 1643 aged 24, and his first son Christopher was buried in 1651 in the north aisle whilst Christopher's wife Dorothy was buried in the chancel near the door.

Another memorial the Victoria County History says could not be traced is that of **Charles Holt** whose burial is recorded in the parish register on 13th December 1731. He was the son of the Ralph Holt mentioned above. Blomfield says of him:

"Charles Holt was 37 years of age when he succeeded to his patrimony. This he soon contrived to dispossess himself of. He never resided at Stoke, but was buried here. At the time appointed for his funeral a great storm arose, which delayed for a long time the interment of his corpse, and thereupon much was said, and more doubtless was thought, in the village and neighbourhood of this strange coincidence. No memorial was placed over his grave. He left no will; his niece, Susannah, administered his estate. The family then appears to have become extinct in the male line."

John Dunkin in "The History and Antiquities of the Hundreds of Bullington and Ploughley Vol II" published in 1823 is a bit more forthcoming on what the villagers thought and why:

"Charles Holt, his eldest son and heir, died unmarried about 1740, and at the hour appointed for his funeral, there happened such a tremendous storm, that it was with difficulty the corpse could be taken for interment into the church, notwithstanding the mansion was so near. The superstitious villagers attributed it to the agency of the devil, in consequence of the man's wicked life, who it appears had been somewhat faulty among the lasses."

[NB. "the mansion" would have been the manor house which is believed to have been located to the south of the church. It was demolished in the early 1800s]. Therefore, according to Blomfield's comments above, rather than the memorial having disappeared, it appears to never have existed in the first place!
