



#### **Minister's Letter**

In Victor Hugo's novel, Les Misérables, Jean Valjean steals bread to feed his starving nephews and nieces. He is caught and sent to prison, serving a total of 19 years after repeatedly trying to escape. On his release, he is given a yellow passport, which marks him as an ex-convict making him unwelcome wherever he goes. Only the kind Bishop Myriel of Digne trusts him enough to take him in and give him food and a bed to sleep in.

But Valjean betrays this trust, compounding his own dire situation, when he repays the hospitality of by stealing some valuable silverware. To his great surprise, the bishop, instead of accusing Valjean, covers for him, telling the police that he gave him the treasure as a gift – and even adds two silver candlesticks, urging Valjean to use them to become an honest man.

This extraordinary act of grace transforms Valjean. He repents of his criminal life to become a man of integrity and generosity, dedicating his life to helping others. He even becomes a devoted guardian to the orphaned Cosette. What was stolen as loot is turned into a



gift, marking a profound turning point in Valjean's life. The bishop's undeserved kindness offers Jean a new beginning: it gives him life!

In a similar way, the gift God gave us at Christmas, His Son Jesus Christ, gives *us* life. His love, with no strings attached, means we no longer need to feel guilty and burdened by doubt and anxiety, but are forgiven and free to flourish.

So, as we approach the festive season, let's give thanks for the love God showed us in giving us his life-giving Son, and be inspired to offer life-giving generosity, not only to our friends and families, but also to the poor and vulnerable in our communities.

As Jesus said in John 10 verse 10, 'I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.'





#### Lighthouse Shelswell needs your help!

It's exhausting, it uses a week of your holiday, but it is FABULOUS FUN!



Lighthouse Shelswell hosted 60 children in 2024. At the moment we will only be able to take 30 children in 2025.

We need:

Two more age group leaders – ideal opportunity for a teacher / teaching assistant (whether currently working, taking a break or retired)

It was a wonderful week and brilliant fun to be part of such a friendly group of volunteers, to renew friendships and get to know everyone better. Thank you all! It was a joy to watch the children having a great time, building friendships and enjoying all the activities. Looking forward Lighthouse 2025 already!!

With the help of an adult helper and a couple of teenage helpers, you would lead a group of about 15 children of similar age (4-5s, 6-7s, 8-9s, 10 plus) throughout the week as they enjoy thinking about some stories from the Bible, doing some craft and drama. The Lighthouse organisation provides detailed guidance to the different sessions each day, though you would probably need to tweak these for your particular group. There would be good support in doing this from the other age group leaders.

Some experience of working with children in some capacity would be enormously helpful!

As well as the week itself, you will need to attend one planning session with the other leaders, and a training session on a Sunday afternoon shortly before the Lighthouse week. Anything else will be done by email.


Are you good with emails and data bases? You would not need to attend the Lighthouse week, and would have little direct contact with children. Your task would be managing the applications from both volunteers and children via the Lighthouse data base. Most of the year there is little to do – your work would start in February and pick up pace as Lighthouse approaches. In the couple of weeks before Lighthouse, you might be doing about 15 minutes a day. (Alice has managed it to date, alongside her other duties, and if you are good with data bases, it would probably be much quicker!!).

Full training and support would be given from the Lighthouse organisation.

### Shelswell-by-the-Sea, 21st and 22nd October 2024

The venue this time was at Finmere Village Hall. This is a beautiful village hall. We were fewer in numbers on the Monday. The tables were set out with different activities: we had newspapers on one, a jigsaw puzzle on another and different crafts on a further one – or you could just sit and chat. On arrival you could have tea or coffee with a cake or biscuits. Some ladies were knitting, sewing, crocheting etc.

We had a young policewoman visit who had come to give us a talk on fraud and scams. This was her first time giving a talk. What she had to say was very interesting as there are so many people being scammed on the telephone or on the internet. If these calls are from a telephone number you don't recognise or they are asking you to hold, don't do it. The same on the internet if you are being contacted by an email you don't recognise. Always be very wary and keep alert as there are so many scammers about wanting your money. She handed out some leaflets on fraud prevention and who you can contact. She also gave out little bells you can attach to your purse, so that if someone tries to steal it, the bells will alert you.

Penny then gave us a talk on St Frideswide, Abbess of Oxford. She was born around 650 AD and was the daughter of a sub-king of Mercia named Dida of Eynsham whose lands occupied western Oxfordshire and the upper reaches of the River Thames.

"There was of old in the city of Oxford a monastery of nuns in which rests the most holy virgin Frideswide. The daughter of a king, she spurned the marriage-bed of a king, dedicating her entire person to the Lord Christ. But when her intended had applied himself rigorously to wooing the virgin, having spent his prayers and blandishments in vain, he planned to carry her off by force.

When Frideswide heard of this, she decided to flee into the woods. But neither could this hiding place keep her hidden from her suitor, nor could her coldness of heart deter him, for she who fled was pursued.

When the young man's madness became plain, the virgin went further on through secret paths, protected by God, and entered Oxford at dead of night. But by morning her persistent lover hadhurried there too, and the girl began to despair of escape; too tired to go any further, she prayed to God to protect her and to punish her persecutor. When he and his companions entered the city gate, a blow sent from heave struck him and became blind. Realising then the sinfulness of his persistence, he sent messengers to beg Frideswide to pray for him, and with the same suddenness with which he lost his sight he received it again. Hence the kings of England have been afraid to enter that town and stay there because they think it is unfavourable to them, and they have all shrunk from putting this to the test.

So there in Oxford, the woman, secure in the victory of her virginity, founded a monastery and ended her days there, obedient to her eternal Bridegroom's call."

This is only a small piece of Frideswide history, in fuller versions of the legend, Frideswide is sad to have travelled to Bampton and Binsey. Whilst at Binsey, Frideswide brought forth a spring of healing water. Known locally as Treacle Well, it is said to heal those who drink from it or pray there. The well still stands in the grounds of Binsey's St Margaret's Church and is dedicated to Frideswide.

Lunch was then served, with sherry or fruit juice. There was a choice of two different hot casseroles with rice or vegetables followed by a choice of puddings. In the afternoon there was tea/coffee with cake for those who wanted it.

On Day 2 we had more people join us for lunch as Finmere have a lunch day once a month which coincided with our Shelswell-by-the-Sea. Thank you to the Ministry Team and their volunteers for all their hard work in putting these two days on. Thank you also to the Finmere Lunch Club for joining us and also thank you to the people who kindly gave lifts

#### Celebration of 50 years of ministry

Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> November saw well over 100 people gathered in the barn at Waterloo Farm to celebrate Penny Wood's 50 years of service as a Lay Reader / Licensed Lay Minister. Penny was 28 years old when she was licensed as a reader in a service on 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1974 at St Micheal the Evangelist and St Michael and All Angels, in Hyde Park Crescent, London. Although men were being licensed as readers from 1866, it was only in 1969 that women were permitted to train to become licensed Readers. And so the female reader was still a rare item when Penny was licensed, just five years later. Even nowadays, when more women than men are licensed, only about 10 % of them go into training when they are under 40. So as a 28 year old woman, Penny was in many ways a pioneer, although she would probably deny this.

Since then, Penny has served faithfully. At the celebration were two men who used to be in her youth group in London – they related how Penny took the group on holidays – to France! For the last 44 years or so she has served within the Shelswell Benefice. As part of her ministry, she has led services week by week, conducted funerals, organised the Children's Holiday Week, the Shelswell Benefice Choir, and Shelswell by the Sea, served on Fringford PCC and generally contributed to church and village life. We felt that this was something that we definitely needed to thank God for and to celebrate.

We shared in a wonderful communion service. As well as lots of people from the Benefice, many old friends of Penny's had come specially for the occasion, including some folk who had been there at her licensing in 1974.

At the beginning, the Shelswell Choir of 9 singers began to sing the introit, 'Jesu tawa pano' –(Jesus, we are here). Gradually a further seven people, who had all been members of the choir in the past, emerged from their seats and came to join them. Penny was so focused on her music that she was mostly unaware of our attempt at a flash mob until the end of the piece! The augmented choir gave a wonderful lead to our singing throughout the service.

Becky Adams read our first reading, Psalm 84, and Penny herself read the gospel reading, Luke 9: 51 - 62. Then we listened to an excellent sermon given by Helen Paynter who had travelled from Bristol, via a few days in

helpful. So we were delighted when she agreed to come and preach.

Helen spoke of how there was no teleportation in the Christian journey – it is often just a matter of putting one foot in front of the other. Helen explained that psalm 84 was sung by pilgrims on their journey to Jerusalem, and how although much of their journey was through inhospitable land God provided companions along the way, small oases for refreshment and a vision of what they were travelling to. It had taken much planning and considerable ingenuity to arrange practises without Penny becoming aware. The words were very appropriate, and Penny was visibly moved by their gift of song. Then our intercessions were led by Liz Welters.

Before the final blessing, Penny was given various gifts. Brenda Stocker presented a garden voucher with thanks from Shelswell by the Sea, David Barnes presented some flowers and chocolate from the Choir, and David Taylor wheeled in an e-bike which was a gift from all of us, together with a cheque that will allow

Penny to choose something nice that she would like.

And then we turned to partying. Whilst people enjoyed a drink and chat at the other end of the barn, tables were put out, food was brought in and the feasting began. Huge thanks to the Taylor family who hosted us all so competently. They gave every appearance of ease which disguised the amount of preparation that must have taken place! After enjoying a wonderful array of puddings provided by various people from across the Benefice, Penny cut into a most beautiful celebratory cake made by Julie Wright from Fringford – decorated with shells (as in Shelswell) it was topped with a large '50' and an open Bible. And not only did it look brilliant, it tasted wonderful too!

#### Foodbank at Christmas

Bicester Foodbank in Wesley Lane, Bicester distributes emergency food parcels to local people in crisis. The Foodbank is part of The Trossel Trust and is run in partnership with local churches, including ours in Shelswell Benefice. Over half the food they give out is donated by the public.

A network of local referrers can issue a voucher if you are in need (Rev. Alice is a referrer). This could be for all kinds of reasons, such as being made redundant or facing an unexpected large bill while on a low income. Once issued with a referral voucher, local residents can exchange this for an emergency food parcel consisting of a minimum of three days of non-perishable food. Advice to help people out of a crisis is also there if necessary. 2075 people, including 902 children, were helped in the Bicester area in 2023/4.


Foodbank collection points are in most of our churches, so please don't forget the Foodbank this Christmas if you can afford an extra item or two! Tins of fruit, vegetables, tomatoes, meat, fish and soup are always welcome, as are coffee and hot chocolate. They have enough pasta and breakfast cereal, but these items would be nice to have for families in need at Christmas: Christmas pudding, biscuits/shortbread, mince pies, custard, cranberry sauce, stuffing, gravy mix

#### **News from South Sudan**

Please keep **Bishop Zachariah** and the Wulu Diocese in your thoughts and prayers

- For efforts to provide food and materials to help displaced people.
- For Bishop Zachariah and local leaders as they implement the outcomes of a workshop held in November. This aimed to:
- Assess the impact of flooding on farmers and cattle keepers in the area.
- Find out why there is conflict between farmers and cattle keepers (competing for the same resources)
- Train community leaders in conflict resolution to facilitate discussion between conflicting parties.
- Encourage sustainable agricultural and livestock practices that reduce vulnerability to flooding.
- For the school, as desks & doors were ruined in fighting between two communities. Some houses, the market and a hotel were also destroyed.

So at the start of the service Henry was at the front of the church with his two best men, Freddie and Tom. The bridesmaids processed up to the choir stalls and sat down. Then the organist struck up and Jasmine started to sing to Johann Pachabel's Canon in D major. She indicates that the church doors should be opened, and Camilla entered on her father's arm. Jasmine also sang whilst the marriage document was signed and as the newly weds were leaving the church to Handel's 'La Rejouissance'.

Henry and Camilla had chosen four hymns for their service: 'I vow to thee, my country', 'Be thou my vision', 'Lord of the Dance' and 'Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord'. They had three readings – the Bible reading from Colossians 3: 12 - 17, 'He's not perfect' by Bob Marley, and 'Paths and Journeys' from Far from the Madding Crowd by Thomas Hardy.

After the service there were bells and photographs, and then everyone returned to Camilla's parents' house in Stoke Lyne where the reception was taking place in an enormous marquee in the garden.

Our best wishes go to Camilla and Henry as they embark on their married life together – may their marriage be life long, life enhancing and a blessing to them, their families and those around them.

She loved being with people and enjoyed seeing her friends at the coffee mornings in Fringford and Shelswell by the Sea. Her funeral at St Michaels Church in Fringford, where she was buried with her husband of 56 years, was a lovely celebration of a life well lived. Her life was seemingly ordinary but made extraordinary by her love and appreciation of simple pleasures through which she found a deep sense of peace and contentment."

Margaret was born on 30<sup>th</sup> December 1937 at Pebble Hill Farm in Launton, the fourth of the six children born to Albert and Ena Green. She had four brothers and one sister. It was a hard childhood, with all the children working on the farm from an early age, helping with the milking and so on, and then as she got a little older with the cooking and cleaning on a Saturday. She and her siblings had to walk 3 miles to Launton School. There were occasional holidays though to Blackpool or to visit their Auntie Dora in Rugby. She enjoyed pressing wild flowers and going on bike rides with friends. And there was the dog called Fanny, a cat and a lamb.

Throughout her schooldays, Margaret had apparently wanted a job to do with the sea. However on leaving school she did a variety of jobs, the first being at Evans Department Store in Bicester. After getting

married, she worked for years at the Red Lion with Mr and Mrs Moy in Stratton Audley, Then she moved to a job at Bicester Garage for years, then a garage in Buckingham, and then in the café at Bicester North Station. And throughout this she cleaned for Mrs Howson. However this really interesting variety of jobs put her daughter Rita in a bit of a fix when she went to register the death – they ended up recording her work as 'farmers wife', which of course she was.

Margaret first met Robin at the Sow and Pigs in Poundon, which her parents had taken on after the farm. Robin had spied her in the garden there, and was bowled over by how she was dressed; she looked so smart. It was love at first sight and there followed many a date in the pub or at the pictures. And then marriage. Margaret, having grown up on a farm knew what she was gettin ginto and the pair were married in Streaoon Audley church on 3rd May 1958. They then stuck together through thick and thin for over 60 years and we were delighted to celebrate their 65th wedding anniversary with a special service just last year.

Initially they lived in a caravan at Elm Farm where Kevin was born on 11th November 1959. Then they moved to Poundon where Jackie came along in April 1962.

In spring 1964 they moved to Glen Close in Stratton Audley where in the August Rita was born. Sensibly, given that each move seemed to lead to a baby, they then stayed put, and when Kim arrived in 1978, Margaret brought her up in Glen Close too.

Margaret loved her family and was delighted as the years went by to welcome the grandchildren Tyler and Jarren – and she was so proud when they went off to work in Dubai, and then the great grandchildren Tia and Kaelun, and then the great grandchildren Lyla and Leyton.

Her family was Margaret's proudest achievement, but apart from Robin and her family, she had three other passions. The first began in 1969 when Uncle Bob and Uncle Pop wanted to go and see Oxford United play Blackpool. She went along, and there began what was to be a lifelong devotion to Oxford United. She loved going to the matches. When asked what her dreams were, she said it was probably a bit too late to have dreams, but they would be to see all her family settled and happy and to see Oxford United Football Club promoted – which they were this year on 18<sup>th</sup> May. And although she wasn't well enough to go to Wembley to see it, she knew that it had happened.

Her second passion was Daniel O Donnell – and there were many holidays to Ireland every year to see him. She went to dozens of his concerts, and would even queue up overnight in order to get front row seats when he was playing in Oxford!

And her third passion was Christmas. She loved Christmas and Christmas at Glen Close with her was always very special. She was often heard to say 'don't let your dad see' as she sent one of the family off to find an extra present she'd hidden in the wardrobe. The Christmas before last was particularly noteworthy for the old marquee that was erected in the back garden – it had to be covered with a plastic sheet to make it weather worthy, and

Margaret was asked how she hoped people thought about her – she said she hoped they thought she was kind. She had many attributes – she was hardworking, loving and caring to her family, loyal to her football team, patient, strong and courageous. But it is her kindness that perhaps stands out. She gave so much to her family, so much kindness and love and care. At times this wasn't easy, but she wouldn't have had it any other way.

Margaret's funeral took place on Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> October at St Mary and St Edburga, Stratton Audley. Her coffin was carried into the church to Jim Reeves singing 'Precious Lord, take my hand'. Her grandson Tyler gave a lovely tribute to Margaret, and Rita read a poem 'When tomorrow starts without me'. Our Bible reading was Ecclesiastes 3: 1 – 8: for everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven. We sang 'The Lord's my shepherd', 'Lord of all hopefulness' and 'Lord of the Dance', and the coffin left the church to more Jim Reeves – Distant Drums. The committal took place immediately after the service at North Oxford Crematorium. After the service, people were invited back to the Littlebury Hotel for refreshments.

The family would like to express their thank to everyone who attended Margaret's funeral and who contributed so generously to the retiring collection which was divided between the church and Oxford United in the Community. Our thoughts and prayers are with Robin and the family at this difficult time.

#### Elizabeth Anne NEWLAND ['Annie']

20 March 1943 – 14 October 2024 St Michael & All Angels, Newton Purcell

There was standing room only at Annie's funeral on 8<sup>th</sup> November. One of her daughters in law, Miranda Markham, delivered the family's tribute to her:

"Annie was born in March 1943 to John and Joan Robarts who had a mixed farm at Kimble. She grew up there with her old sister Fizz and spent her childhood surrounded by horses, dogs and the countryside. Her much loved pony Cider gained her numerous rosettes at gymkanas and later she enjoyed the thrill of regularly hunting with *the Old Berkley*. After attending Pepworth boarding school together with Fizz she joined Aylesbury Young farmers.



Annie met Barry and married at the age 19 and they were blessed with 2 boys, David was born 1964 and Mike 2 years later. The family lived at Godington Cottages before moving to Home Farm at Shelswell Park and later here at Elm Farm.

After Barry and Annie went their separate ways Annie went on to form a partnership with American born Jerry Harrington and spent several happy years together which they ran a pub together, the White Horse at Dinton Though his career took him back to the USA they remained close friends and Jerry continued to visit Annie whenever he returned to England. Annie was eventually to find love again marrying the son of a family friend, Jack Newland, and became stepmother to Caroline and James who credit Annie as being both an inspirational and loving stepmother.

Annie was never one to stand still. Through her working partnership with General Motors she travelled all over the world, was a regular on Concorde travelling to every continent and even a weekend shopping trip to New York to get her favourite perfume. She remained close with her boys who both went to local boarding schools. They would visit her on alternate weekends and enjoy her famous Sunday roasts which included the crispiest golden roast potatoes and always followed by a crumble and custard. Later she would continue a « meals on wheels » service to David and Mattie Harper when they were sharing the cottage in Newton Purcell as well as a full gold star laundry service.

Although Anne inherited a love of horses and the countryside, it was cars that shaped her life and her career. She began working in the Robarts family business in St Albans, in the eighties alongside her husband Jack. Marlborough Motors was to become the 2nd largest Vauxhall dealer in the country with Annie responsible for some record sales and this was the springboard for her venturing into motor racing, first as a sponsor and then into management. David joined working in the business during the winter season. Both David and Mike went onto compete with David winning many prizes in saloon car racing while Mike squashed himself into a single seater with some success.

One of Annie's proudest moments was when she joined ranks with David Sears and together they managed Jan Magnussen from the beginning his journey in Formula Ford, Vauxhall Lotus, Formula 3 to his much prized Formula 1 seat with Maclaren and Stewart racing. They were a formidable team and were proud to say that they nurtured and developed some great young racing talent.

As a regular at the Silverstone circuit, Annie quickly became part of the racing community and in particular, *The Doghouse* now more politely known - as the Women's Motor Racing Club -for the wives and partners of those involved in Motor racing but importantly fund raising and offering support. Julie, Carol, Emma are here and have told us Annie was a staunch supporter. According to the ladies she had a huge zest for life and a mischievous streak.

Annie and Jack went their separate ways but Annie's motorsport career continued to flourish. However, in 1995 Annie was to suffer a major setback when she was involved in a serious accident whilst on the circuit in Nürnberg. Annie sustained severe head injuries and the German surgeons requested permission to amputate her leg. With help from the John Sunderland and St Johns Ambulance we were able to get Annie flown home and her leg was saved but this was the beginning of a long and painful recovery.

But Annie was ready for anything that life threw at her - with her characteristic « true grit » approach she was not deterred, she remained unbelievably positive laughing off any negative thoughts and just got on with it. The silver lining of her convalescence was that Annie had a regular hospital visitor, William Davies, a friend and motorsport travel consultant. Annie and William really hit it off sharing a love of her grandchildren and of course horse-racing and motor racing with William adding snooker and Motorbikes to the mix. They were in many ways a perfect match with so much in common. Annie doted on William and a quieter family life. Sadly William was lost to cancer far too early but it is Annie's wish to be buried with him in a shared grave at Newton Purcell.

No recollections of Annie would be complete without mentioning her most treasured and loyal companion, Scruffie, her border terrier with whom she was inseparable in her solo years.

As some of you may know she was one of the tidiest, most organised and fastidious people you would ever meet - her neighbours in Finmere were a little taken aback when she first hoovered her driveway, but they got used to it. Another time when she joined the Mobley family Christmas lunch at my sister Katie's we all wondered why she was producing a pen and envelope from her handbag before we sat down to eat. She breezily said, "I'm just writing your thank you card!"

Annie was an amazing support when the children were growing up. She would do school runs, babysitting, washing and ironing (so much ironing) and was generally at the heart of family life. Many of you will recall Annie's banter, sitting on the sidelines at sports matches at Beachborough and at Stowe handing out copious sausages, crisps and haribos and occasionally arguing with the referee. Annie had herself been a cricketer and was very happy to reiterate the rules of the game whenever required (and sometimes not). Annie's other favourite pastime was the monthly Girls Lunch with Barbara, Janine, Yvonne to name a few.

Over the last 4 years, Annie's health significantly declined but she has enjoyed the most wonderful care at Juniper House in Brackley. Annie became a self-appointed « Head girl » in the home - she had her own little club of friends to socialise with and she regaled residents and staff with her many stories and adventures. The staff were incredibly fond of her even though some of her antics were more reminiscent of the Colonel in Faulty Towers as she critiqued the food and the service. In reality she did give it a 5 star rating. It was sometimes difficult to separate fact from fiction as Annie's illness progressed; her life had been so extraordinary. Why would the Queen have not paid her a personal visit or the entire England cricket team sit by her bedside while they apologised at their performance in Australia?

She continued to take the Daily Mail every day (and to believe every word in it) and would not miss watching racing at Cheltenham or Ascot and of course the cricket! The whole family owe a huge debt of gratitude to the staff at Juniper house who we will be making donations to - they all deserve a medal.

So Goodbye Annie - We thank you for your kindness and generosity, your enthusiasm, your encouragement, and for your fun and laughter. You have been so strong and resilient all your life. May you finally rest and be at Peace. "



#### David Eoin McCULLAGH

22 November 1948 - 17 October 2024 St Michael & All Angels, Fringford

Fringford church was packed for the funeral of David McCullagh on 1 November. Some people even had to remain outside. Not only had David been hugely active in village life, and village people wanted to pay their respects, but clearly he had touched a wide range of relatives, friends, and people from his working life. He was well loved and respected.

Tributes were paid to David by a former colleague and dear friend Andrew Richards, and his daughter Sophie gave a moving eulogy, summarised below:

"My Dad, David, Mac, Spreader or however you knew him, grew up and spent all of his childhood in a beautiful estate village called Hulcote which is just outside of Towcester. On the Friday before he died, we visited this lovely place together as a family along with his brother Mike and heard many of the wonderful stories about Dad, Mike and Shaun growing up together in the most idyllic of settings.

He went to primary school in Towcester and then onto grammar school in Brackley where he worked hard and proudly played for the 1st rugby fifteen. He then went on to study agriculture at Wye Agricultural College where he met some of his closest friends.

After university, he returned to Northamptonshire to start his career as an agronomist. For those of you who don't quite know what that is, my Mum always described it as 'what a vet does for animals, he does for crops.'

I recently asked my Dad about his very first client. When I asked how he made contact with this farmer, he simply replied 'I knocked on his door.' Dad went on to pursue a long and incredibly rewarding career in agronomy. His passion and enthusiasm for his career is something I have always admired. I always remember wondering how he had the energy to get up so early every morning and to dedicate so many hours to his clients.

Everyone who met him in a professional sense was incredibly lucky to tap into his extensive knowledge, although from speaking to his colleagues over the last few weeks, I believe many were also slightly terrified of him due to his punctuality and attention to detail. One also commented on the benefits Dad passed onto the fledgling agronomists he mentored and said you could 'always tell one of David's.'

Despite his marriage to his job, he did manage to find time to marry my wonderful Mama in 1994. They had met at a mutual friend's 40th birthday a few years before. When Mama contacted her friend the following day to ask for Dad's number, she informed her that she had been too slow and he had already asked for hers. They bought our house in Crosslands here in Fringford and named it after their beloved black Labrador Henry. In 1997, I arrived and quickly became his little princess, which I never grew out of. Mum and Dad provided me with an idyllic childhood, that I will be eternally grateful for.

More recently in 2022, we welcomed a Ukrainian family into our home, which quickly became their home for almost two years. Dad helped them settle in, get through the mountains of paperwork and eventually find them their own wonderful home in Bicester, which they moved into last month.

As I grew up, he shared many of his passions with me. I will treasure our Daddy daughter trips to Franklins gardens for the rest of my life and I will continue to support our beloved Northampton Saints Rugby Club. Skiing is another passion that he shared with me and in the mountains on a bluebird day is probably where we both felt the most content.

His commitment to making other people's lives easier and putting others before himself was truly inspiring. Even in the last few weeks and months, I was completely in awe of his ability to prioritise others. As you come through the green hopefully you will notice the new village sign, new parking, new dry-stone wall and

new playground, all of which have what a fellow villager described as the 'famous McCullagh touch.' Even when he was very poorly, he often made us push him in his wheelchair to inspect the work being carried out and check it was up to his standard.

Whether it was the village, carers' trust, Milton Keynes community shop, the sailing club, the Clarendon club, Kirtlington golf club or whatever other committee he had managed to sneak onto, I can guarantee that it ran like clockwork whenever he was around. So, I wish all the new committee members luck; they certainly have big shoes to fill.

Sadly in 2021, Daddy received an awful diagnosis of advanced cancer in his throat. He approached this horrible situation with the most positive attitude imaginable. The day he got his diagnosis I remember him saying 'we're going to fight this Soph' and that he did. Just six months later we got the all clear.

Since then, he travelled to Italy, France, New Zealand, Australia and Singapore. He played more rounds of golf than you can possibly imagine, bought a few outrageous cars, took a trip to Twickenham to see his beloved Saints finally lift the trophy, and made several very special trips to Edinburgh to visit me in the beautiful flat that he helped me to become proud owner of.

Just a few weeks ago, I said to him 'this is SO unfair' and he simply replied with, 'not really, I got three and a half years extra time.'

He left us before his time but I encourage you to remember him with a smile on your faces remembering what a wonderful man you had the privilege of being your agronomist, relative, husband, friend or neighbour. And as part of his legacy, I urge you to do that thing you've been putting off, book the flights, call that friend, buy the outrageous car... whatever it is, just do it. "

#### SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

Our theme for November (carried over from the cancelled October session) was Rodents. This might not seem to be particularly poetic, but we found plenty of examples, ranging from mice to lemmings!

Mice feature in many poems. John Betjeman (1906-84) used the creature to symbolise human attitudes and behaviour in his poem *Diary of a Church Mouse* and his satire makes for uncomfortable reading for the 'big occasions only' churchgoer. In *To a Mouse*, Robert Burns (1759-96) apologises to one disturbed by his ploughing, and expresses fellowship with it. Theodore Roethke (1908-63), in *The Meadow Mouse*, explores his feelings about a baby mouse, one of the wild creatures 'innocent, hapless, forsaken' at the mercy of nature. In *Cat and Mouse*, Ted Hughes (1930-98) creates a similar sense of vulnerability in a few powerful lines, and Gillian Clarke (b 1937) describes the trauma suffered when she and her children found a fieldmouse injured during harvest. She aligns its suffering with that of humanity in wartime in *The Field Mouse*.

The libretto of Benjamin Britten's cantata *Rejoice in the Lamb* uses the words of Christopher Smart (1722-71) from the poem *Jubilate Agno*, written whilst incarcerated in a lunatic asylum. On a simpler level the poem *The City Mouse and the Garden Mouse*, by Christina Rossetti (1830-94) is both educational and touching, describing the mouse as 'poor little timid furry man'. She is similarly sympathetic towards a creature many treat as a pest in *My Mouse* – a memorial to a beloved pet. Paul Verlaine (1844-1896) sees the mouse as a symbol of night-time in *Impression Fausse* and calls it 'Dame mouse', creating a sense of companionship.

There is less sympathy to be found in poems about rats. John Gay (1685-1732) turned one of Aesop's Fables into a poem entitled *The Rat-Catcher and Cats* and turns it into a moral tale of conflict of interests with a mercantilist twist. In *Break of Day in the Trenches* Isaac Rosenberg (1890-1918) addresses a rat - whose kind swarmed over the World War 1 battlefields - and expresses a wry appreciation of how the rat has more chance of surviving the war than do the soldiers fighting it. Few poems with a strong streak of humour can have been written about rats, but Robert Browning (1812-89), in *The Pied Piper of Hamelin*, employs it in his description of the townsfolk when invaded by an army of vermin.

Two humorous poems about squirrels ('rats with bushy tails') are *Squirrels Go Nuts* by Eric Ashford, written in 2024, and *Two Squirrels Discussing Poetry*, by John Lawless, another contemporary poet. Guinea pigs, those pets so often ending up in a parent's reluctant care, find their way into an anonymous nonsense poem, *A Guinea Pig*, written around 1775, *The Guinea Pig and the Green Balloon*, by Oni Buchanan (b1975) and *A Guinea Pig is Dead* by Caren Krutsinger, (writing in 2018).

Ogden Nash (1902-71) chose the porcupine for a humorous 4-line verse in *The Porcupine*, and in *Lake Beaver* Melvin Walker La Folle (1930-2015) considers how humans exploit beavers for their fur. A poem about lemmings, comparing them with humans moving ever westward across America, is *The Lemmings* by John Masefield (1878-1967). A creature common in parts of America is described as 'a small, brown flame' by Robert Gibb (b 1946) in *For the Chipmunk in My Yard*. Finally, in *Another Day Safe from the Harvester's Jaws*, Wendy Watson, a contemporary poet, imagines the consternation caused in a harvest field inhabited by many tiny rodents.



#### PROJECT POPPY 2025

A small enthusiastic group of villagers have expressed how lovely it would be to see Mixbury Church War Memorial and Church decorated with poppies like other churches in the area especially as 2025 will be the 80th anniversary year of the end of WW2.

We would like to invite knitters/sewers/artists/people who crochet, the young as well as the slightly more mature people, to join this community project.

We need a very large quantity of poppies, all sizes, not just red, some purple ones for the animals that served in the war and just to give an idea of what could be achieved I will have posted some photos of a church I have visited elsewhere on the Mixbury Facebook page and am not saying we can produce a display of such a huge scale as in the photos, but we can make a start. I think it would be very ambitious to do a cascade from the top of the tower - but who knows once people get knitting and on board......



Poppies can be made of felt or material not necessarily wool. A plastic box will be left in the church porch for completed poppies so ask around for donations of red/purple and black wool, visit charity shops to see if they have any wool, get family members on board to help. (Donations of wool can also be left in the box).

As soon as we have a good supply of poppies we would need to start assembling and a working party will be needed. If you are interested in helping please let me know, there will be coffee/cake, and lots of chat and laughter - possibly making new friends and meeting neighbours. We have till the mid October 2025 to complete this project - *and we cannot do it without you*. There are lots of knitting/crochet patterns on line for poppies and if you cannot knit/crochet but want to participate there are lots of YouTube tutorials also on line, if you need help please ask.



#### A Memorable Remembrance Sunday at St Peter's, Stoke Lyne!

On the unusually bright Autumn morning of Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> November, villagers and visitors gathered at St Peter's Church for the annual Remembrance Day service.

It was a pleasure to welcome Father Alex to officiate at this important service. It was his first time leading such a solemn service and he ran it in a sensitive manner. The service began promptly with a warm welcome and a reflection on the importance of remembrance in fostering gratitude and unity. His words carried through the nave, touching each heart with their sincerity. As the congregation stood in silence, the atmosphere was solemn with reverence and remembrance, a collective pause to honour those who had served and fallen in conflicts past and present.

We surrounded the war memorials of WW1 and WW2 at the west end of the nave and joined together in the Act of Remembrance. The names of the departed were beautifully read by Rena who also read the Exhortation:


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
