

Minister's Letter

Now that I am old and my hair is grey....

.... do not abandon me, O God! Psalm 71.18

In February members of the Ministry Team went to an interesting session at Emmanuel Church, Bicester, to hear about the Anna Chaplaincy.

Anna Chaplains are named after the faithful widow, Anna, who appears with Simeon in Luke's gospel at the time of Jesus' presentation in the temple. Anna Chaplaincy is a ministry undertaken by volunteers in communities to provide emotional and spiritual support to older people in their own homes, sheltered housing or care homes. The Chaplaincy was set up to respond to a growing need for a distinctive ministry to older people, and their families and carers, as the population ages. The need for spiritual care continues, regardless of age.

In 2018 there were 1.6 million people aged 85 years and over. This is projected to rise to 3 million by 2043. According to Age UK, 58% of people over the age of 75 live alone, and 1.3 million older people say they have not been in contact with a friend, family or neighbour for more than a month.

Although we are not in a position to develop the Anna Chaplaincy in the Benefice in a formal way, the Organisation (which is part of BRF Ministries) has useful resources. People who visit and support elderly family, friends and neighbours may find such resources helpful. (www.annachaplaincy.org.uk)

Now that I am old and my hair is mostly grey, it seems time for a change of emphasis. Living with rheumatoid arthritis and its associated conditions - including poor circulation - for 44 years has taken its toll. Fortunately, the treatments are so much better now than when I was first diagnosed. God's grace, along with medication, has enabled me to be upfront (and upright!) for far longer than I anticipated. With Alice's agreement, I will now be taking fewer Sunday services, especially in the winter, and I hope to concentrate more on helping to support people who are no longer able to get to church.



Insights into Wulu County in South Sudan from Bishop Zachariah

The Importance of Mother Tongue

The common language spoken in Wulu County is 'Beli. The 'Beli group of people has four tribes in it, Sopi, Mo'da, Monga and 'Beli itself. They all speak 'Beli language including Dinka people living within 'Beli town. Only a few people are able to write and read the 'Beli language.

The bishop's wife, Mama Monica, speaks 'Beli because it is the mother tongue, without reading and writing it. Only three of their eight children can read and write in the 'Beli language, but all speak it.

Bishop Zachariah believes it is important for people to learn 'Beli because the language is a part of the culture and nationality. He says, 'When you don't know your mother tongue it means that you do not belong to that community. Knowing your own language along with writing and reading it shows that your language is alive'.

The South Sudan constitution gives freedom for any languages in South Sudan to be taught. More than 60 indigenous languages are spoken in the country. Currently in Wulu County there are teachers in the County Education Department who teach the 'Beli language in school. When it achieved independence in 2011, South Sudan chose English as its official language.

Bishop Zachariah has always lived in his home-town Wulu, and he likes it!

The Bible in 'Beli

Translations of the four Gospels of the New Testament, and Genesis and Exodus from the Old Testament, have been completed. Acts, First and Second Corinthians, First and Second Timothy and Titus are in the process of being completed.

The Market

In Wulu market some stalls use tables and some are on the ground. Some items on sale are grown in Wulu including sorghum, simsim (sesame), groundnuts, sweet potatoes. Others are brought in from the State capital, such as clothes, shoes, sugar and dry fish. Sometimes vegetables, chicken and goat are available.

There are two factories in Wulu, one for honey production and one run by women producing lulu (shea butter). Honey and shea butter production generates an income and helps people to provide for their children, allowing them also to benefit from the money earned.

Notes:

Shea butter is extracted from the nuts of the Vitelleria nilotica tree in South Sudan. This tree only produces fruits annually after 20 years, and it can take 30 years to get the first high quality fruit from a shea tree. Most shea trees then live on for 200 to 300 years. Rich in vitamins A and E, shea butter can be used in cooking and is good for skin nourishment as a lotion.



Vulu Platarat HONEY

Honey had to be boiled in traditional saucepans in the past, and then transferred to a bucket to cool. With new technology honey can be produced in the factory without boiling it, resulting in clean, dirt-free honey that can be easily transported to market.

The venue was excellent, Harriet and Caroline deserve to be praised for hosting it. I don't know who prepared and provided the lunch of a wonderful salad buffet, with every allergy catered for and well marked out. This was followed by lots of delightful puddings with soft drinks.

The afternoon started with boxes of Lego on each table, you had to make a model to signify forgiveness. It is so long since I played with Lego I didn't recognise many of the pieces!

All in all I thought it was a very inspirational day and gave people food for thought.

Thank you to everyone who helped in any way to make the day a success.

On reflection now the main thing that I took away from the Benefice Day was that God is always with us. It is too easy to forget that in an evermore secular society.

There were four hymns in the service – twice as many as in your average Mixbury Half Hour: All things bright and beautiful, Sing Hosanna, One more step along the world I go, and Guide me, O thou great redeemer – the last hymn chosen by Ben and Vanessa. Vanessa's mum Belinda Whiteley read the reading for the Second Sunday after Easter - Luke 24: 36b-48 - which tells of one of Jesus's resurrection appearances to the disciples, and we reflected on how difficult the disciples found it to take in the amazing news that Jesus was alive again. Alice spoke of the different ways in which people can come to faith, and of her desire that Matilda, and indeed all of us, can come to know more deeply the amazing reality that is Jesus, 'God with us' in our lives, now and eternally.

It was a privilege to baptise Sharon Jones on Sunday 19th May in Cottisford Church, and to be able to welcome her husband and her friends and neighbours who had come to support her. It was Pentecost Sunday, the day when the church recalls how the Holy Spirit came on the disciples as tongues of flame and as a mighty wind, an appropriate Sunday to baptise Sharon into the church and to pray that God would send his Holy Spirit upon her, both on the day of her baptism and every day.

It was a lovely sunny day as we welcomed Annabelle and her family and friends to Newton Purcell Church for her baptism. Her guests had travelled from as far as Canada and as near as just up the road at Home Farm, and they were all delighted to see her.

Annabelle is the third child of Joseph von Maltzahn and Andreanne Morin. Her older brothers Hugo and Louis had been baptised at Newton Purcell on Easter Day 2019, and as old hands took the event in their stride. The family have until recently been living in Paris but are in the process of moving to London.

Annabelle is now three, and as such knows her own mind. Before the service started, she was definitely not of a mind to be baptised and looked considerably dismayed when shown the font. However it turned out that she enjoyed making baptingles and especially enjoyed hearing her name mentioned, so when one of her godparents picked her up and held her over the font, she was quite happy.

Pam Morgan played the organ for the three hymns: 'Come down, O love divine', 'Lord of all hopefulness' and 'Breath on me,

breath of God'. The Bible reading, read by Andreanne's father Georges Morin, was Matthew, Chapter 28 vs 16 to 20 – Jesus talking to his disciples after his resurrection, reassuring them that he would be with them always, and commissioning them to go and make disciples, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

The baptingles, of which you can see Annabelle's one in construction in the photo, were to help us think about the meaning of baptism. Once they were all made, we lit the candles and sang our second hymn.

Annabelle has three godparents: David Morin, Janine Stephens and Sally Burrowes. At the end of the service, she was presented with her baptism candle by her grandmother Ann von Maltzahn, who also happens to be church warden of St Michael and All Angels. After the service, everyone returned to Home Farm for a glass of bubbly and a lovely lunch in the sunshine. Memorial Service

Thomas Peter 'Gus' Anson 5th March 1933 – 7th April 2024

It was a gorgeous sunny day – so warm that jugs of water had to be brought out into the courtyard at Stratton Court Barn. As a tribute to his 91 years, 91 chairs had been set out in the barn, but this proved to be far from adequate as so many of Gus's family and friends came to pay their respects.



Gus's sons Henry and Patrick had wanted the service to be one of thanksgiving and celebration, as we remembered a life well lived, 91 years packed with activity, laughter, fun and love.

Robin Rhoderick Jones spoke of Gus's military career. Gus served in the Queen's Royal Irish Hussars, where he gained the rank of Colonel. but, amidst all the demands of army life and his responsibilities, seemed to manage to have a very good time. Henry then gave his tribute, talking about Gus as an incredibly vital, strong, fun loving man that hunted, skied, shot, fished, golfed, and played bridge into his mid 80's. He described Gus's great zest for life, his boundless energy, enthusiasm and sense of enjoyment. The death of his wife Judith in February 2015 knocked the wind out of his sails and he was never quite the same man after her passing. They loved and squabbled in equal measure but were a true partnership and will be reunited off the coast of Cornwall later this summer.

Cornwall, was Gus's happy place., and there were many happy family holidays there, both as a boy with his parents, and then with his own children and grandchildren. Only last year the family managed to get him into the sea on two separate occasions, coughing and spluttering but thoroughly enjoying it. It was entirely fitting that as part of the service, Gus's grandchildren read John Betjeman's poem 'Trebetherick'.

Being bought up as the youngest son of the youngest son, largely by nannies, Gus wasn't comfortable with outward shows of affection. Henry spoke of how he couldn't remember him ever telling him or Patrick that he loved them, and there were certainly no kisses or hugs. When Gus dropped him at Salisbury train station, aged just 19 and about to go to India for a six month gap year, they rather awkwardly shook hands. However both boys knew that this certainly didn't mean that he didn't love them. He showed his love in countless different ways. Gus and Judith sacrificed a great deal to enable both boys to continue the family tradition and go Harrow, and Gus was constantly encouraging and cajoling them to try the next thing, whether that was shooting, fishing, windsurfing, skiing or at school.

Life changed for the family when Gus got his dream job at Tusmore in 1986. Running a functioning country estate and shoot whilst having someone else to pay for it – he was in heaven. And once he had managed to persuade Wafic Said to buy 'hunters' for his guests, who rarely ever hunted, he was able to become a regular with the Bicester and Whaddon Chase for 15 or so years. On shoot days, Patrick and Henry found themselves enrolled as loaders, and then when there were only a few guns, being given the opportunity to stand on the line, all very exciting for teenagers.

Gus's health deteriorated in the last couple of years of his life as general infirmity and dementia got a hold. His sons were able to honour their promise to him that he could die at home with the help of his friend Susie and his carer Caroline.

Gus was a man of faith, and a regular attender at St Edmund and St George church in Hethe. He could always be relied upon to sing the hymns with gusto, and so it was fitting that there were three hymns in the service: 'Jerusalem', 'Dear Lord and Father of mankind' and 'The day thou gavest, Lord, has ended'. And to honour Gus's love of the Harrow song book, everyone joined in a rendition of the first and last verses of 'Forty Years on'. Patrick read Henry Scott-Holland's poem 'Death is nothing at all' and we all said the 23 rd psalm together.

Refreshments were served after the service and people enjoyed remembering Gus and catching up with one another in the sunshine. Gus will be greatly missed by those who knew him and by folk in Hethe.

SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

At our May meeting, when the theme was Trees, we began with two poems about the illegal felling of the Hadrian's Wall sycamore. Simon Armitage, the Poet Laureate, wrote **The Holy Land**, addressing the 16-year-old farm labourer who is accused of doing it, and demonstrating his ex-probation officer's understanding of the boy's motivation. Adrian Overkill, an amateur poet, wrote a heartfelt lament for the tree, the felling of which has left 'another lonely local wind trap' in **The Tree**.

Two more poems about the wanton felling of trees were William Cowper's **The Poplar Field** and Gerard Manley Hopkins' **Binsey Poplars.** In **Woodman, Spare That Tree,** George Pope Morris pleads with a would-be lumberjack, and the idea was taken up by the American singer Phil Harris in a comic song.

Alfred Lord Tennyson praised one of our most long-lived trees in **The Oak** and Jill Stanton-Huxton mused on old oaks as a witness to history in her poem **Oak**. A E Housman and Edward Thomas both wrote poems about wild cherry trees in **Loveliest of Trees** and **The Cherry Trees** respectively, and John Russell McCarthy endowed certain trees with human characteristics in **Poplar Trees are Happiest**. Jill Stanton-Huxton wrote of the beauty of the tree in **Weeping Willow**.

Poems about trees which became songs include Linden Lea by William Barnes, The Ash Grove, based on a traditional Welsh poem, Where'er You Walk by .William Congreve, and the aforementioned adaptation by Phil Harris (Woodman, Spare That Tree)

More general poems which address the wonder of trees and what they give to humanity were **Trees** by Walter de la Mare, The **Message of the Tree** by Alice Polk Hill, **Home Thoughts From Abroad** by Robert Browning, a traditional weather rhyme **If the Oak be out before the Ash**, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's **The Village Blacksmith** and Rudyard Kipling's poem **The Way Through the Woods.** A poem which uses the idea of trees and their roots metaphorically is **Family Tree** by Ron Tranmer.

Fringford Rectors 1756-1898 This is the second of a three part series on Fringford Rectors by Martin Greenwood

The Revd Henry Roundell (1814-52)

Roundell came from a great Yorkshire family and being 'possessed of ample means and of a genial temperament, he was much given to a simple hospitality and unostentatious charity.' Apart from major improvements to the Rectory, 'He was also responsible for the rebuilding of the chancel and much of the other restoration of the church.' This included a new chancel in 1821, the north aisle in 1829, and in 1831 the present stone tower was constructed by Daniel Mansfield of Hethe to replace the wooden belfry.

In 1842, the pulpit was installed, using 16th-century carved panels from neighbouring Hardwick manor, and the vestry was built. He also presented the old font, which had been given to him by his brother-in-law, the Revd William Palmer of Mixbury, who had married his sister Dorothea. 'Thus, in days of too common laxity, he was careful of his flock.' By 1817, communion services were monthly.

In the chancel, there is a memorial to Henry and Elizabeth Roundell (who died in 1838), and, after their death, the Roundell family also filled the windows with stained glass. There was so much stained glass installed in the 19th century that, as a later rector said 'no one can now read his prayer book without electric

light'! Roundell also let out part of the glebe as allotments for the labourers, a rare kindness at the time [1830s].

<u>Schools:</u> by 1834, there were three daily schools, with 20 boys and 16 girls between the ages of three and nine, supported by parents, Lord Sidmouth and Roundell; by 1823, and probably earlier, there were Sunday schools for boys and girls, also supported by Roundell. Other parishes do not seem to have been so fortunate, as Roundell comments in 1838 that 'six places have no daily or Sunday school.'

In 1846, he became the first Rural Dean of the Bicester Deanery. In 1848, he was described by his churchwardens as very sober, his dress gentlemanly and becoming a minister, although Bishop Wilberforce found him 'a little huffish'! There seems to have been a genuine affection for him in the parish and when Wilberforce spoke at his funeral in 1852, there were 'many wet eyes'. His only child, Henry Roundell, was ordained in 1849 and became Vicar of Buckingham in 1853, He died in 1864 and was buried in Fringford.


It is also worth mentioning that Roundell's sister Dorothy was mother of Roundell Palmer, first Earl of Selborne (1812-1895), who became a distinguished academic, lawyer and politician. He was knighted in 1861 and in 1872 he became Lord Chancellor and was raised to the peerage as Baron Selborne. In 1865, he had purchased the Temple and Blackmoor estates (about 1800 acres) in the parish of Selborne in Hampshire, where the naturalist Gilbert White had lived.

The Revd Henry Fane De Salis (1852-73)

De Salis was another rector of ample means. He came from a Swiss family and his great great grandfather was sent as an envoy of the Graubinden (Grisons) to Queen Anne and was created Count of the Holy Roman Empire in 1748. Henry's great grandfather (the 2nd Count) was naturalised by Act of Parliament in 1730, marrying the Hon Mary Fane.

Henry was also son-in-law of J.W.Henley, a Cabinet Minister in the 1850s, who obtained the Fringford parish for him. He had been rector of Shalstone, near Buckingham, for 19 years and Rural Dean of Buckingham.

In 1853, he gave the new organ, for which John Rogers, the organist and village carpenter, carved the fine casing. At the same time, he noted 'No school room. Half of the Old Tithe Barn fitted up by me as a School House for which purpose it now answers very well.' By 1854, there were 35 children here, and also an infant school for 20 and Sunday schools for 40 boys and girls. In 1856, under the guidance of the Diocesan architect, G.E.Street, the south aisle was enlarged and the south doorway and porch restored; this completed the restoration of the church. After about 1850, there were also celebrations of communion on Great Festivals and Holy Days.

He also built the new National School on land leased from the squire, John Harrison Slater-Harrison. with places for 80 pupils. He also added two cottages for labourers on Glebe Farm and increased the allotments for the labourers nearer their homes. He became Diocesan Inspector but resigned from Fringford in 1873 on succeeding to property at Portnall Park, near Virginia Water in Surrey. It was called 'The Wentworth Estate' and was left to him by Col Thomas Chalmer, whose second wife was Henrietta De Salis, Henry's sister.



Fibre Broadband - Message received from Sam, the Chairman of the Parish Council:

Gigaclear & BT Openreach are in the process of installing Fibre Broadbrand across Cottisford, Stratton Audley & Hethe. This process is going to take the remainder of 2024 but at the end Hethe residents at the East end of the village will have the option to upgrade to full fibre, up to 900mbps.

The digging up of the road will happen from July onwards, Relay Cabinets being installed / upgraded in August, with the service fully operational from December. These times are subject to change and are currently indicative, but they will update us more fully as time progresses.

ATTRACTING SWIFTS TO YOUR NEST BOX



Thank you for putting up a nest box for Swifts last year. If you are extremely lucky and Swifts are already nesting nearby, your box may be used within a few years. But often it will take much longer – possibly many years.

It will greatly improve your chances of attracting Swifts if you can play Swifts' calls from the box itself or from nearby. There are several ways of doing this.

- 1. You can buy a CDof Swift calls and play it from a window near the box.
- 2. You can download Swift calls on to an MP3 player and do the same.
- 3. You can also buy all the equipment you need amplifier, the calls on a USB or SD card and a microphone. The microphone can be hung from a nearby window or attached to the box itself.

Playing the calls

- 1. Try to play the calls as much as you can between the beginning of May and the beginning of August
- 2. You don't need to play them all day. The best times are early morning (say 6 am until 9 am) and evening (say 6 pm until 9 pm). The middle of the day around noon can also be effective. You can buy a timer quite cheaply.
- 3. Finally please be considerate when playing the calls. Your neighbours may put up a nest box if you are successful and you haven't turned them off! Swifts have very good hearing.
