Goodbyes

So this will be my last 'minister's letter'. What to say? Nine and a half years Joe and I have been here – not long in village terms, but long enough that leaving is going to be a wrench for us.

We have always been aware that we would be a temporary fixture in the Shelswell patch – the Rector swoops into your villages for a short time and then is off again. But you have generously made space for us and welcomed us. There have been some wonderful times – and, to be fair, some not so wonderful times. There are so many memories that I will treasure including those Plough Sunday and Harvest Home Celebrations with folk from the farming community and church gathered together, the joy of Lighthouse and school assemblies, our link with Wulu and the visit from Bishop Zechariah and Mama Monica, Shelswell by the Sea, some wonderful Christmas services – especially the crib services – especially the one where I had the opportunity to play the wicked King Herod. It has been a privilege to be able to accompany some of you through those significant times of life in funerals, weddings and christenings. I have really valued things shared during Lent groups and confirmation preparation. And a particular delight of late has been joining in with the choir. We will miss feeling a part of the community, being able to wave at friendly faces we know, that sense of belonging.





The thing I think that will stick with me most, though, is the dedication and devotion of those regular members of our church communities, doing their absolute best to live out their faith in their day to day lives. I am so struck by the way they go out of their way to help others, of the kindnesses that they have shown to me and others. I am so struck by how they hold fast to their faith in difficult and challenging times. So often, they are giving of their time, not just to church and church activities, but

to other village institutions, to involvement in charities of one sort or another, and to the community in general. And they are doing it because their faith is so central to their lives, God matters to them. They want to show his love, his care, to others, and they long that others may come to share their faith and the blessings that it brings.

At a funeral, I will say some words taken from psalm 103:

'our days are like the grass; we flourish like a flower of the field; when the wind goes over it, it is gone and its place will know it no more.'

I know that after we leave, things will carry on. The churches will continue to function, thanks to the efforts of the ministry team, the church officers and all who are involved in church life one way or another doing what they do. You may think of Joe and myself occasionally, but mostly we will, quite rightly, be forgotten. And then there will be a new Rector who will have their own ideas of how things should progress, and I hope that you will welcome them as you welcomed us, and I hope that you will do your best to work with them as they try to take our churches forward.

They will have a difficult job – life for our churches is increasingly difficult. The regular congregations are small and generally ageing. The ancient church buildings are a nightmare to maintain. It would be a mistake to assume that these churches will just continue – they will only stay open and functioning if there are people attending them, and people stepping up to take responsibility for them by getting involved, and sufficient money coming in to pay for their upkeep and for the clergy to work in them.

But even if the worst were to happen and all the churches were to close, the one thing I am absolutely certain of is that God won't be shutting up shop. His love will continue, his blessings will continue and his work will continue. That's what comes next in psalm 103:

'But the merciful goodness of the Lord endures for ever and ever towards those that fear him and his righteousness upon their children's children - with those who keep his covenant and remember to obey his precepts.'

Whether Christians are meeting in a church or a village hall or someone's home, God will continue to pour out his love and care, and those who follow him will continue to find deep joy and peace, strength and guidance, in good times and in bad. Because God is utterly faithful.



WULU GIRLS PRIMARY SCHOOL, SOUTH SUDAN

Summary of information from Martin Ngula Simon, County Procurement Officer, Wulu County

In our community girls are the most vulnerable group as they are mean of getting resources, and it is said if you educate girls, you educate the nation and educating girls is important because it ensures the gender equities and equalities. It is best to have a school only for girls to avoid disturbances from boys and allow them to study freely.

The school opened in 2008 and is run by the Church. 185 girls are enrolled this term and 165 or 170 attend each day on average. They take exams at the end of every term or year and finish school at 17-18 years old due to our situation and context. (Primary is intended for 6-13 years.) For now, Wulu Girls has no P8 (the top year) so this means no girls can go on to Wulu Secondary School. In our community girls can be married by then, but now they look for money and go to school.

There are only four classrooms but seven classes. There are blackboards in the classrooms, but they need renovation. The girls wear school uniform provided by parents as the school has no budget for these. The school is free, but learners have to buy textbooks, pens, exercise books etc from markets. The school has no computers and no internet access.

'Beli and Dinka languages are spoken, but not all the girls know 'Beli, so it is taught. It is important for the girls to learn English (the government language) and know about their cultures as well.

Five teachers are getting the incentive payments of **20 USD** per month which is paid in cash. It helps them cater for their families' needs and treatments. Only two teachers receive government pay and there are three new teachers this year.

The Church has just started a school garden to grow groundnut, semsem (sesame) and sorghum. Funds from the garden can support the school and help feeding the teachers. In the nearest future we plan to provide food for the girls because when the school has feeding it can attract more learners to join the school. Girls are taught at home by their mothers about growing food, and cooking.

Wulu Diocese is overwhelmed with happiness for your usual support. Here are some important things:

- a. The School is in an open place where motorcycles and vehicles pass, meaning the school needs to be fenced.
- b. Classrooms are not enough, some children are studying under trees
- c. No concrete office for the teachers





Thanks to everyone's generous giving, the well-attended Cream Teas on 29th June raised **£399** on the day for Wulu, and some more donations have come in since. The cakes and scones were much appreciated in a cool church on a hot day. Heartfelt thanks go to the willing bakers and helpers.

In July the Benefice sent **£600** for the Teachers Incentive Scheme.

Major investment in local churches and parish clergy as £1.6bn three-year national spending plans unveiled



The Church Commissioners' funding towards work of the church is set to leap by 36 per cent in the three-year period 2026-28, amounting to the biggest distribution in Church's history.

The C of E plans to invest more than £1.6 billion towards sharing the good news of Jesus Christ and serving local communities over the next three years. In total, it plans to invest £4.6 billion over the next nine years, from 2026 to 2034.

Also, the typical stipend is set to rise 10.7 per cent next year, under new proposals as clergy well-being put at centre of spending plans.

On top of that, the funding for churches in the lowest income communities will jump from £91 million spent in the last three years, to £133.5 million.

There will also be a major focus on safeguarding, for which £30 million has been allocated.



The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, said: "Parishes and clergy are at the heart of everything we do in the Church."

Mike Green, Treasurer of St Edmund & St George Church in Hethe commented, "It is good to know that our clergy are to be looked after!

"It is welcome news that the Church Commissioners are releasing funds and may satisfy many people who believe that the CofE is "cash rich" so why should they contribute their money to the local parish church.

"However, the Diocese have been releasing more money in grants for works with conditions such as that parishes should be paying their full Parish Share. A

reduction in Share would be the fairest option and would benefit all parishes and would allow individual churches to make their own choice as to how they used the money - ie day to day expenses or works."

Janey Poole, Treasurer of St Peter's in Stoke Lyne agrees with the last point. "We are finding it increasingly hard to pay in full our Diocesan share. It would be more helpful to small parishes to reduce our overheads rather than allow The Church of England to distribute from their central office which is very detached from our small community.

"If ever we need help from The Diocese procedures are complex and timescales very drawn out, requiring expertise which takes more funds and time which would be better spent developing our mission.

She has a further suggestion, "There is potential for long term money saving improvements but these require up-front capital investment on a large scale that at present is not available [to St Peter's]. Some kind of capital loan fund would be useful."



The Parish Share is the money paid from our parishes to the Church of England. The broad church group savetheparish.org has recently criticised the level of Parish Share and how it is spent.

The poet muses on how a chance collection of creatures in his room causes him to pause in his writing and think about their place in the universe, humble as they are compared with man. It is a theme he also deals with in <u>The Darkling Thrush</u> and <u>Afterwards.</u> Living in Dorset for much of his life, he felt a close connection with the natural world and used it as a backdrop in many of his novels.

At our June meeting, we were depleted in number, due to illness and holidays, but filled every minute with the poems we had chosen. We began with a brief extract from a poem which was a balm to anyone who has recently lost a beloved relative, friend or animal companion. We went on the look at the deceptively simple *The Star* by Ann Taylor (1782-1866) and her sister Jane (1783-1824). As a poem/nursery rhyme it is full of simple (if now disproved) facts for young minds, along with some imaginative flourishes.

We continued with two poems evoking heat in their various ways. <u>Work and Play</u> by Ted Hughes (1930-98) makes us think about how a swallow's work seems to the poet far more full of joy and beauty than crowds of holiday makers supposedly 'at play'.

The final poem was <u>The Lotos Eaters</u> by Alfred Lord Tennyson (1809-92), based on Homer's Odyssey. He takes the episode of Odysseus having to rescue his travel-weary sailors from the island of the lotos eaters when the scouts sent on ahead have been given the lotos fruit to eat. Sunk into dreamy anarchy, they have lost the will to do anything more than eat more of the fruit which drugs them. Modern interpretations include that Tennyson was warning of the dangers of laudanum and opium in making passive and dependent ghosts of a growing number of addicts in Victorian Britain, but it can also be enjoyed as an evocation of a warm, soft and voluptuous way of life which almost lulls the reader to sleep with its use of onomatopoeia (language which evokes the sounds and feelings of the thing described).



Thank you to Flora and Lily for the concert by Opus Sax held in the church on 6th July which raised £300 for church funds. Flora wrote:

"Saxophone fans were in for a massive treat on the weekend of July 5th and 6th with two contrasting concerts from Opus Sax, fresh from their exuberant appearance at Fringford Beer Festival a couple of weekends previously.

Hethe, continued

"The programme at Fringford ranged from JS Bach's Little Fugue in Gminor through Piazolla's 'Histoire du Tango' to some beguiling pieces by contemporary composers David Salleras, Edward McGuire and Andy Scott. They finished triumphantly with the atmospheric 'Witch Hunt' by Ulrich Schutlheiss, full of frantic energy and complete with witchy screams.

"At Hethe, the quartet showed off another facet of their musical prowess, bringing us some soulful sound pictures in Althea Talbot-Howard's 'Rievaulx' and Ola Gjeilo's 'Northern Lights'. At the other end of the spectrum there was ragtime and jazz, familiar tunes to get our toes tapping, and 'A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square' to sing along to. They finished with an arrangement of George Michael's 'Careless Whisper' before drawing to a close with a rousing 'Cantina Band', a favourite with Star Wars fans - what a joy!!" Open Village Meeting

In summary, the meeting was useful as people took the opportunity to voice any concerns, what they value about the church and what was the legal position regarding its future use.

Flora opened the meeting and stressed that although there is shortage of money, without people who are willing to help with the day to day running of the church it will not survive. This includes membership of the PCC in addition to cleaning and churchyard maintenance. There is plenty to do!

We are grateful to the Archdeacon of Dorchester, the Venerable David Tyler, for his involvement.



- He explained that the Church of England is not "cash rich" but is nevertheless releasing more funds which should trickle down to the clergy and local parishes.
- St Edmund and St George Church was unlikely to be accepted as having sufficient historical interest to merit it being taken on by a church conservation trust. If it were to be closed for regular services, it is unlikely that it would be converted for residential use. In the worst case, and despite its listing, it could be demolished.
- Although there is some uncertainty over what would happen to the church if it were to be closed, the Parish Council would be responsible for the churchyard.

There were many suggestions as to how money could be raised and the necessity to engage with more people, particularly those who do not come to these meetings or other parish events. These included considering more varied use of the building, improving the facilities (especially water and a toilet), more musical events (the acoustics in the church are better than those in the village hall). The possibility was floated of doing more across a number of local parishes. The idea of a "Community Hub" to involve more

people and raise funds is to be discussed further, realising that without the involvement and commitment of more people the church won't survive - regardless of the amount of money in church funds.

Thank you to everyone who came to the meeting and those who were not able to attend but gave useful input. Finally, thank you to those who volunteered to join a rota for cleaning the church and providing flowers.

Churchyard. Thanks to Ian Soper and Helen Pritchard for strimming and raking. There is more to be done if anyone can help, please contact Flora for guidance as we need to preserve some wild areas. Helen is approaching tree surgeons to assess the safety of the walnut tree due to the dry weather which is causing limbs to break off trees. Philip Mansfield has made an excellent job of clearing the fallen branch at the far end of the churchyard.



A Look at the Peyton Memorials within the church – Part 5, Lucy wife of Major General Sir Thomas Peyton, 5th Baronet (1817-1888)



Lucy acquired the title "Lady Peyton" in 1872 when her husband became 5th Baronet (He was featured in the June 2025 issue of "Shelswell News"). It is not easy to find out anything about her early days and background. From one of Thomas's obituaries in 1888 we know: "The deceased baronet married in 1853 Lucy, daughter of William Watts, Esq." and another one adds that he was "formerly of the Madras Civil Service."

However, we know from the later censuses that she was born in London and we have the date of birth from the plaque. With that information I found an image of her baptism in the parish register St Marylebone on the Ancestry website. It states that Lucy Watts, daughter of William and Margaret Watts

was baptised on 1st August 1827. The address was "Grove Place" and William's occupation was "Gent". There is a note in the final column that she was born on 8th June.

The next record I have for her is an image of her marriage entry to Thomas Peyton on 3rd November 1852 at Bellary, Madras, India from British India Office records on the FindMyPast website. It states that her father was "William Watts (deceased)". Unfortunately I cannot pinpoint where and when he died. Watts was a relatively common surname and William was a very popular first name.

Thomas and Lucy produced four children: Algernon Francis (who was in the army before he became the 6th Baronet), Thomas Thornhill (who became Rector of March in Cambridgeshire), William Robert Boileau (who was also in the army) and Elizabeth Gordon. All four were baptised in Secunderbad in India. When Thomas inherited his title, Lucy would have been 45, Algernon 17, Thomas 16, William 13 and Elizabeth 10. The careers of the three sons took them away from home but Elizabeth remained with her parents/mother and never married.

Both Lucy and Elizabeth seemed to have taken a special interest in the village schoolchildren. The Bicester Herald of 18th August 1876 reports:

"STOKE LYNE DAY AND SUNDAY SCHOOL SCHOLARS had, on August 11, their usual annual treat at Swift's House, kindly given by Sir Thomas and Lady Peyton. The children assembled in the large field, in which the school premises stand, and, after being arranged in ranks, and having flags distributed amongst them, proceeded on their way to Swift's House, nearing which they commenced singing a song, when they were met by Lady Peyton and Miss Peyton, Miss Cotton and Miss Calvert (from Maidsmoreton), who lead them to the front lawn, where they played at various games, including croquet, swinging, drop-handkerchief, &c. The party had now become enlarged by the addition of Laura Lady Peyton [widow of the 4th Baronet, later to become Lady Valentia] and party, the Rev. C. D. B. and Mrs. Marsham, and the Misses Joscelyne, and a friend, who kindly joined in the children's games. The boys were taken to the park, under the guidance of Messrs. T. and W. Peyton, with Rev. C.D.B. Marsham, and Mr. Hankey, where they thoroughly enjoyed themselves with cricketing and racing until they were invited back to the lawn to partake of an excellent tea repast. After tea the children were invited to the other side of the house, where the most successful ones in the late examination were to receive prizes. Three were given for needlework, one for good conduct, and 12 for general proficiency. They included a work-box, work-basket, and smaller work-box, large photographic album, containing photographs of Sir Thomas and Lady Peyton, and Miss Peyton, a writing case for travelling, pairs of illuminated texts, gold alluminium pencil, and handsome pen-knives and books. After the distribution her Ladyship told the unsuccessful children not to be disappointed, but to try again another year. On returning to the lawn there was a "bran-pie" (given by Laura Lady Peyton) for those who had not gained prizes, containing various things: knives, trumpets, balls, needle-cases, purses, &c.; and great fun was caused by the diving for these amongst the bran. Afterwards there was racing for all who liked to join, and varied were the prizes given to the best runners. The children were then formed into ranks and the flags given to them, when they sang several songs, and then marched two or three times round the lawn, receiving cake and buns on passing Lady Peyton. Cheers were heartily given for Sir Thomas and Lady Peyton, Miss Peyton, and Laura Lady Peyton, and the visitors; and, after giving Sir Thomas and her Ladyship "Musical honours," the children started for home, singing and cheering as they went, and accompanied by Lady Peyton and Miss Peyton to the lodge. The very enjoyable holiday was brought to a close by the children going round the village carrying the flags and singing, finishing with three hearty cheers at the school."

According to this Bicester Herald report from 24th January 1879 Lucy could play the piano well enough to accompany her daughter Elizabeth singing at local concerts:

"A CONCERT AT STOKE LYNE, the third this season, was given in the schoolroom on Monday evening, Jan. 20. The room was filled. The audience included a number of persons from neighbouring villages. The programme appeared to give satisfaction, the songs and glees being well received. Lady Peyton

accompanied Miss Peyton in the song, "Won't you buy my pretty flowers." and states that it was "Encored and two verses repeated".

In his will Sir Thomas bequeathed £500 to Lucy plus "a yearly jointure rent charge on the estates for life of £1,000, and bequeaths in trust £12,000 to pay for the income thereof to her for her life". It would appear that she used this money to set up home for herself and Elizabeth in London at 25 Egerton Gardens. She first appeared on the Kensington Electoral register at that address in 1892 and remained on it there until her death, when the following advertisement was placed in the Morning Post of 20th February 1907 by instruction of her Executors. It gives a good description of the property:

"No 25. EGERTON-GARDENS. S.W. – An attractive Modern RESIDENCE in red brick, containing eight bed and drawing rooms, box and bath rooms, four separate reception-rooms, and excellent domestic offices, with pantry and servants' hall. The property is of pleasing elevation, situate close to ethe Oratory, and being within a few minutes' of the Brompton Station of the Piccadilly and Brompton Tube and South Kensington Station, is within easy access of all fashionable parts of town and also the City. Direct Lease of nearly 70 years. Low ground rent. With possession."

Once set up in her new abode Lucy launched upon a series of annual "afternoon receptions" every July which were reported upon in periodicals such as the "Lady's Pictorial" or "The Gentlewoman". Here's the earliest I could find from 1893:

"On Tuesday last the Dowager Lady Peyton gave an afternoon reception at her residence in Egerton-gardens, which was largely attended. The hostess was attired in black and grey, and was ably assisted in receiving the numerous guests by her daughter, Miss Peyton, who wore an exceedingly becoming blue silk dress, trimmed with guipure lace. Mr. Godfrey Holbrach played several very attractive pieces, and there was also singing. Amongst those present were noticed the Countess Amherst, who brought her sister, Miss Probyn, Lady Marriott, Lady Robinson, Lady Peyton, Mrs. Burnside, Miss Wittington, Lady and the Misses du Cane, Miss and Miss Jane Karslake, Mr. and Mrs. Slater-Harrison, and many others too numerous to mention. The rooms were very prettily decorated with flowers."

All the reports are in much the same vein with a description of Lucy and Elizabeth's costumes, the floral decorations, who provided the musical entertainment and a list of principal attendees.

When Lucy died in 1906, the Bicester Herald published the following:

"DEATH AND FUNERAL OF THE DOWAGER LADY PEYTON. The death occurred on Wednesday, Nov. 28, at 25, Egerton Gardens, London, of the Dowager lady Peyton, widow of the later Major-General Sir Thomas Peyton, and the mother of the present Baronet, Sir Algernon Peyton, of Swift's House, Bicester. The funeral took place on Monday morning at Brompton Parish, church, the large and beautiful church being crowded with mourners. A most impressive choral service was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. A. Gough, assisted by the Rev. C. Hicks. Amongst the congregation were noticed Viscount Valentia, M.P., Mrs. Slater-Harrison ... (list of names).

There were over ninety beautiful wreaths and crosses sent by the following: - Sir Algernon and Lady, Peyton, Miss Peyton, the Rev. T. T. Peyton, Mrs. and Miss Peyton, Mr. A., Mr. H., and Miss D. Peyton, Viscountess Valentia (another list of names) ... the Farm Tenants at Stoke Lyne, the Servants at 25 Egerton Gardens. The Dowager Lady Peyton lived at Swift's House from 1872 to 1888, and was much respected in the neighbourhood."



17th August - Jeanne Delanoue, caring for the poor

Jeanne Delanoue was born at Saumur in Anjou, north western France in 1666. At the age of twenty-five she took charge of the family shop which sold drapery and pious articles. It is said that she had a reputation for being bossy (a successful businesswoman, perhaps?) and even a little bit greedy, as she kept the shop open on Sundays and holy days which are days of rest.

When she was twenty-six, she met a visionary called Francoise Fouchet who predicted that Jeanne Delanoue would abandon her business to care for the poor. The businesswoman found this hard to believe, but in time, she did start visiting the poor near where she lived. Her work helping them grew gradually. Jeanne eventually gave most of her goods away to the poor and transformed the caves and cellars of her home by the River Loire into a guest-house for the homeless.



An earthquake in 1703 destroyed the caves, but it took more than that to stop Jeanne. She founded the Sisters of St Anne of Providence of Saumur, with the help of two other young women to carry on the work. When famine hit in 1709, she and her two friends cared for 100 desperate people in Providence House.

Jeanne was always driven; she rose at 3am and spent her days looking after the distressed, the abandoned, single mothers and prostitutes. Her work was deeply appreciated by the town, especially during the years of war and hunger. By the time she died in 1736, Jeanne Delanoue had founded and inspired 12 communities to serve the poor and needy throughout France. Her particular talents of a shrewd business head and a certain pushiness had been put to use in the service of God through her life. She was canonised in 1982 by Pope John Paul II.

---NEWS ROUND---

Bishop Sarah Mullally comments on two controversial Bills that passed through the House of Commons recently

The Bishop of London, Sarah Mullally, recently urged MPs to halt the passage of a bill to legalise assisted suicide in England and Wales. Bishop Sarah – the former Chief Nursing Officer and the Church's Lead Bishop for Health and Social Care – called instead on parliamentarians to ask themselves some searching questions "about the kind of society we want to live in", before the Third Reading vote in the Terminally III Adults (End of Life) Bill in the Commons took place.

She said: "If enacted, this Bill would arrive amidst hugely inequitable access to palliative care and an NHS on life support. The potential for abuse and uninformed or coerced decisions is enormous.



"This is not about so-called progressivism v conservatism, or atheism v religion. This is about the kind of society we want to live in.

"The vision that this Bill presents is one in which the disabled and vulnerable are made to feel like they are a burden, as if their lives are worth less.

"This is, and has always been, an unsafe and unworkable bill. The promise that Committee stage would

'iron out' major concerns with the Bill has not been forthcoming. Instead, it has presented more unanswered questions, left more doubts, and seen so-called protections crumble away before even coming into law."



Silent Prayer

On the Crime and Policing Bill amendment that proposes decriminalising abortion up to birth, Bishop Mullally said "Women facing unwanted pregnancies are confronted with the hardest of choices. Ultimately, they require compassion and care, to support them fully in the heart-wrenching decision they must take. They should not be prosecuted.

"However, decriminalising abortion can at the same time undermine the value of unborn life. The amendment passed to the Crime and Policing Bill may not change the 24-week abortion limit, but it undoubtedly risks eroding the safeguards and

enforcement of those legal limits. Women suffering from coercion, or those who are victims of sexual or domestic abuse, would be the most vulnerable to the proposed change, which does not consider improvements to abortion care, nor address the inadequacies of the 'pills by post' assessments. These concerns are well set out in the recent letter signed by over 200 clergy and published in the Telegraph."






Abortion up to birth was decriminalised in Germany in 2024 and an attempt in 2025 to appoint a judge to the German supreme court (*Bundesverfassungsgericht*) who is explicitly pro abortion up to birth has recently been defeated amid strong protests from the churches.

Worldwide, abortion providing is estimated by the World Health Organisation to be worth more than 30 billion dollars each year. Human fetal tissue is used in a wide range of industries, including pharmaceutical research and testing and the research and development of food additives and of beauty products.




















The Crystal Crypt By Fiona Veitch Smith. SPCK £9.99
