




Minister's Letter

Almost as soon as Boxing Day is over the Christmas lights have been turned off, the decorations have been put away in their boxes, and bare Christmas trees lie forlornly on the roadside waiting for the local authority to take them away for recycling.

Yet ecclesiastically speaking the season for rejoicing lasts for 40 days and only ends on 2 February when we celebrate the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. This day is often called Candlemas because traditionally, during the church service, the congregation would process around the church holding candles representing the baby Christ "a light to the Gentiles and the glory of his people Israel".



Soon after Christmas, on 6 January, comes the feast of the Epiphany which marks the visit of the wise men to the baby Jesus. Where churches have a nativity crib set up, the figures of the wise men often do not get placed in the crib until 6 January. Instead, they can be seen in different places in the church, slowly making their way to the stable.



Epiphany tide is a time rich in symbolism – we too are on a faith journey; we too have been led by a 'star' – whatever vision or dream that prompts us to seek God; we too wander in a world fraught with sorrow and danger wondering whether we have taken the right path, or not.

"In this season of Epiphany", says the introduction to the Epiphany Carol Service for Church choirs across the Thames Valley, which was held on 18 January in Christ Church Cathedral, and which members of the Shelswell Choir attended -

"we celebrate the glory of God made visible in Jesus, the child of Bethlehem born to be God with us. The three Magi, guided by a star to worship the holy child, represent God drawing every nation into the family of grace. Yet this is a story in which the gift of God is rejected as well as accepted: the Magi who come from lands far away to worship Christ are juxtaposed with Herod, to seeks to cling to his own power through slaughter.

Our celebration of the Epiphany is of the revelation of God in Christ, who provokes both faith and hostility; and of the love of God, which can never be destroyed. As we consider both the pain and the joy of the Epiphany story, we know that our lives are also composed of intermingled pain and joy, and yet in these very ordinary and very human lives, God can be revealed".

This is probably my favorite season of the year because everything speaks of the mystery of God - the hymns, the carols, the readings; and of the challenge of faith - "we are called to trust that in a world peopled by tyrants, God remains with us; in a world suffused by evil, God's healing is at work". Amen, let it be so.



The party was held at Fringford Village Hall from 3.00pm till 5.00pm.



Age Group Leaders

We need a couple of extra **age group leaders** – without them we will only be able to offer 30 places this year. It is an ideal opportunity for a teacher / teaching assistant (whether currently working, taking a break or retired)

With the help of an adult helper and a couple of teenage helpers, you would lead a group of about 15 children of similar age (4-5s, 6-7s, 8-9s, 10 plus) throughout the week as they enjoy thinking about some stories from the Bible, doing some craft and drama. The Lighthouse organisation provides detailed guidance to the different sessions each day, though you would probably need to tweak these for your particular group. There would be good support in doing this from the other age group leaders.

Some experience of working with children in some capacity would be enormously helpful!

As well as the week itself, you will need to attend one planning session with the other leaders, and a training session on a Sunday afternoon shortly before the Lighthouse week. Anything else will be done by email.

At our January Meeting we had a good discussion on The Mission House by Carys Davies.

We all agreed that it was not an easy book to figure out. We found it difficult to get into as the author slowly teased out details. It was very much a character-driven book - the characters were quite naive (especially Hilary Byrd) and somewhat annoying at times! They seemed to be unaware of the historical events/unrest that were happening around them in India at that time, being in a safe haven up in the hills, and at the mission house (itself a character, and especially the room where Byrd slept).

The relationships amongst the characters (Byrd and Priscilla, the Padre and Priscilla, Priscilla and Ravi) were full of misunderstandings and lost hope. The ending was unclear why Byrd sacrificed himself. The whole story felt unpredictable, although there were some sweet moments between Ravi and Priscilla as their relationship developed over their mutual love of American country music.

Heart Defibrillators

There are now 2 Heart Defibrillators in the village. One is located outside the school and the second is on the wall of the village hall in the hall carpark. A defibrillator is a potentially life saving device that delivers a high energy shock to the heart of someone who is in cardiac arrest.

The second of two training sessions, designed to educate villagers as to the use and operation of a defibrillator, will take place at the village hall on Saturday 15th. commencing at 10.30am. The session, which takes approx.. 1.5hrs is open to all.



ST EDMUND & ST GEORGE CHURCH

The beauty and tranquillity of St Edmund & St George Church has been a greatly valued part of our village for over 900 years. It is a welcome setting for church services, weddings, baptisms and funerals for those from the village and further afield. The church is the oldest building in Hethe, is Grade 2 listed and represents our village heritage.



Over the last few decades, local communities have become responsible for the upkeep of their local church, and Hethe is no different. The church would not be what it is today without the generous support it has received from local people. This support has preserved its beauty, maintained it in good condition, and enabled the church to meet the needs of those who visit it.

The congregation is small – there were an average of seven of us at regular services last year. We would love to see

more if you were able to come along! As a small congregation, we are not able to give the amount of money needed to keep the church open - last year we had to pay out over £3,000 more than our income.

We are grateful to those people in Hethe who currently give regularly to the church, but we have lost several donors in the past four years and the cost of keeping the church open is rising every year.

We would be grateful if you could consider giving a regular donation to the church to help keep the doors

open. It needn't be too much – current donors give between £10 and £50 a month. There is a simple means of setting up a regular donation to the church through the Parish Giving Scheme – you decide how much, how often, when and whether you can allow gift aid to be claimed. Simply follow this link https://www.parishgiving.org.uk/home/, enter Hethe and select St Edmund & St George Church; then select donate and follow the instructions on the screen. Alternatively, you can access the church page through this QR Code or phone the team who are responsible for the scheme on 0333 002 1271.





Some urgent repairs were completed last Autumn to stop water entering the building from the roof. There is more work required which will enable us to fully open the church, further prevent water ingress from inadequate drainage and take away water which drains into the north aisle from the churchyard. If you would prefer to make a one-off payment towards these repairs, the Parish Giving Scheme has an option to make a single payment, or you can send a payment to the Treasurer or direct to the PCC Bank Account (note that this changed last year – new details from the Treasurer). See above for the phone number and address of the Treasurer or email hethepccsecretary@outlook.com.

The PCC will be looking at more ways to raise funds this year and we will let you know the details as they are agreed. If you wish to support or hold an event,

please let us know.

Church Services and Events

The church is open for visits and private prayer, except for the eastern end of the nave and the chancel which will not be accessible until further notice (apart from limited access during services). Unfortunately the church is not a "warm space", except during the service on the second Sunday of each month, so please dress appropriately. The lay led service on 23rd February will be held in a "warm space" – the village hall!



Remember that you will always be welcome at services in any of our churches in the benefice, or if you are away from the village, you can find a nearby service through the web site https://www.achurchnearyou.com.

The next regular PCC meeting is to be held on Wednesday 25th June, but before then all parishioners are invited to the Annual Meeting (APCM) on the evening of Monday 28th April. Further details to come.



LOCAL HISTORY Shadrack Bannister - Taken from The Bicestorian – Genealogy and Local History

Shadrach Bannister was born at Mixbury in 1800 - the son of Edward Bannister and Mary Bannister, née Loveridge.

In 1826, Shadrach married Susannah Wright, with whom he had 11 children.

Following Susannah's death in 1866, Shadrach moved briefly to Ventnor, on the Isle of Wight (roughly 125 miles away). There, he met a widow called Hannah Trent, née Cosh, and the couple married in 1867. Sadly, their marriage would be short-lived; Hannah died at their home on St Catherine's Street, Ventnor, in 1879.

Very shortly after losing his second wife, Shadrach returned to Mixbury, presumably to be closer to his children. He ultimately died at Brackley Workhouse on 15th July 1879, at the respectable age of 80. His cause of death was cited as being 'chronic bronchitis'.

The image depicts Ventnor, Isle of Wight c.1837. I've visited myself, and it really is a lovely part of the world, so it was a shame that Shadrach wasn't able to remain there. It is possible that he was not entitled to receive Poor Relief due to not being a 'native' of Ventnor, and that he was therefore forced to return, in order to receive medical treatment at the Brackley Workhouse infirmary.


Carol service - Friday, 22nd December 2024 at 6pm

A LOOK AT THE PEYTON MEMORIALS WITHIN THE CHURCH – PART 2, SIR HENRY PEYTON, 3RD BARONET (1804-1866) AND HIS WIFE GEORGINA ELIZABETH

For Part 1 which was about the 2nd Baronet and his wife, please see the October 2024 edition of "Shelswell News".



This Sir Henry was born in Grafton Street in London, now a very desirable address (properties there were said to be the most expensive in the country in 2019 fetching about £700 million).

Oracle and the Daily Advertiser, 4th July 1804 BIRTHS

Saturday morning, at his house in Grafton-street, the Lady of Sir Henry Peyton, Bart. of a son.

He was educated at Harrow followed by Christ Church, Oxford and it was here where he acquired the nickname "Young Peyton". After university he became an officer in the 1st Life Guards but left after his marriage on 18th April 1827 to Miss Georgina Codrington, of Dodington, in Gloucestershire – not be confused with the Doddington in Cambridgeshire with which the Peytons were associated. Georgina was the second of three daughters of Sir Christopher Bethell-Codrington and was baptised at Dodington in 1799. She also had two younger brothers. Wikipedia says this of her family home: "The house was built by James Wyatt for Christopher Bethell Codrington (of the Codrington baronets). The family had made their fortune from sugar plantations in the Caribbean and were significant owners of slaves. It remained in the Codrington family until 1980; it is now owned by the British businessman James Dyson".

At some point before his marriage Henry must have set up his own household in Stratton Audley as the 1827 marriage entry describes him as being "of the parish of Stratton Audley". However, Henry and Georgina were at Tusmore for the birth of their first son, Henry, in 1828 as his baptism entry in the Hardwick cum Tusmore parish register gives their abode as "Tusmore". The Oxford Journal of 9th August 1828 reported the birth as follows:

BIRTHS. - On Tuesday last, at Tusmore, the Lady of Henry Peyton, Esq. of a son.

In Pigot's 1830 Directory of Oxfordshire he is listed as living at Stratton Audley whilst his father is at Tusmore.

Peyton Henry, esq. Stratton Audley Peyton Sir Henry, bart. Tusmore Sir Thomas Mostyn was still listed at Swift's House.

The family then relocated to Woodstock as their second son, Algernon William, was baptised there on 14th May 1833. Both sons were baptised again at St Georges, Hanover Square, London on 1st July 1833. Henry and Georgina's residence is given as "Grosvenor Place" and father's occupation "Esquire".

He was elected M.P. for Woodstock on 25th July 1837 for the Conservatives but he resigned on 11th May 1838 when he accepted the "Chiltern Hundreds". He appears to have returned to Stratton Audley as the next family event I have noted is the death of their eldest son there in 1841. He is commemorated by a plaque in Stratton Audley Church. The inscription reads:

Near this spot are interred the earthly remains of Henry Peyton son of Henry Peyton Esq^{re} and grandson of Sir Henry Peyton Bar^t who died on the 23 of October 1841 at the early age of 13 years. By his amiable disposition he had endeared himself to all who knew him and as he lived beloved so he died lamented.

According to the Oxford University and City Herald of 30th October 1841 he died "after a few days' illness, at Stratton Hall". Henry's occupation on the burial record is given as "Gentleman and a Magistrate in the County of Oxford". I was unable to locate the family on the 1841 census but for the 1851 census Henry and Georgina have moved again and are to be found at Middleton Stoney together with 6 live-in servants. Henry was already there by1849 as he is listed there on the county Game List as having obtained a Game Certificate for that year. They were still there when his father "Old Sir Henry" the 2nd Baronet died in 1854 as the Oxford Journal of 4th March 1854 in their obituary states ".... He is succeeded in his title and estates by his son, Henry Peyton, Esq., of Middleton Stoney." He would therefore have been aged 50 when he became 3rd Baronet. I have not discovered when he moved into Swift's House other than his being listed at that location on the Oxfordshire Game List published in the Oxford Chronicle and Reading Gazette of 22nd September 1855. I could not pinpoint Henry and Georgina on the 1861 census. They are not listed at Swift's House, only a staff of 9 servants appear.

Henry continued to be a local magistrate after he became baronet, his name appearing as "Sir Henry Peyton, Bart" as an officiating magistrate in press reports of the Bicester Division Petty Sessions. Prior to that he was listed as either "Henry Peyton, Esq." or "H. Peyton, Esq". His obituary in the Bicester Herald of 23rd February 1866 states that additionally he "was chairman of the guardians of the Bicester Union, and of the Bicester Highway Board."

As far as Stoke Lyne is concerned, he was the Peyton who bought "The Manor of Stoke Lyne" in 1860 from Mr Cole in whose hands it then was. He and his wife seem to have taken the welfare of their new tenants seriously. For example, Jackson's Oxford Journal of 9th February 1861 reported:

"SEASONABLE BENEVOLENCE. – During the late severe weather Sir Henry and Lady Peyton have kindly distributed blankets to 80 houses in the parish of Stoke Lyne, and have also given 4 cwt. of coal to every person in the village in receipt of parochial relief."

He was also involved in the establishment of the village school as reported in an article in Bicester Herald of 23rd September 1864 which states "*The site for the school was very liberally given by Sir Henry Peyton, Bart*".

Like his father Sir Henry enjoyed equine pursuits. The obituary for him Bells Life in London and Sport of 24th February 1866 says this:

"Young Peyton" was more distinguished as a horseman, either over a country or a course. He could do a bit of coaching, too, and drove until lately a very neat pair of short-tailed phaeton horses about town; was a capital companion, and thoroughly enjoyed a good story, as no one perhaps

every enjoyed life more. But the pace told, and it was rather a sad sight to notice him stealing away from the sale of Mr. Drake's Hounds, when his own son took the country, evidently even then unequal to the fatigues of the day. He had, moreover, become very short sighted, and latterly quite unable to take part in those pursuits in which he had once so signally excelled."

These are the circumstances of Sir Henry's death as reported in the Bicester Herald of 23rd February 1866:

"The illness which led to Sir Henry's death arose from a disaster on the 23rd. of January, on which day he, when in a chair, and about to towel himself, after having a bath, overbalanced, and fell, whereby his thigh was broken. Professional aid was obtained and the limb strapped up, but the shock to the system was so serious that human aid proved unavailing, and Sir Henry who had been for some days unconscious, died on Sunday afternoon at about 2 o'clock. His remains were on Thursday interred in the family valut, in Stoke churchyard. Sir Henry is succeeded in the title and estates by his son Algernon, a captain of the Life Guards."

Details of his will appeared in the Illustrated London News of 7th April 1866

The will of Sir Henry Peyton, Bart., of Swift's House, Bicester, Oxon, was proved in London, on the 23^{rd} ult., by the son, Sir Algernon William Peyton, Bart. (Captain 1^{st} Life Guards), the sole executor. The personality was sworn under £16,000. Sir Henry, who was an only child, succeeded to the title and estates on the death of his father, in 1854, having married, in 1827, Georgiana Elizabeth, daughter of Sir C. B. Codrington, Bart., who, he states, is amply provided for by marriage settlement. Sir Henry executed his will Jan. 11, 1861, and died Feb. 18, 1866, at the age of sixty-two. He has bequeathed the whole of his estates, real and personal, to his son, the present Baronet, with the exception of an immediate legacy of £500 to his relict.

The relict, of course, was Georgina but she died only a few months later as reported in the Bicester Herald of 23rd November 1866:

FUNERAL OF THE LATE LADY PEYTON. – The remains of the late Georgina Elizabeth Peyton, widow of the late Sir Henry Peyton, Bart., of Swift's House, Bicester, were interred on the 10th inst., in the family vault in Stoke Lyne Churchyard. Captain Sir Algernon W. Peyton, Bart., Captain Codrington, H. Hunter, Esq, and G. Fitzhugh, Esq., attended the funeral.



1st February - Seiriol, the Saint of Puffin Island

You can find traces of old saints in most corners of the British Isles, but Seiriol is one of the only two saints connected to Anglesey, and certainly the ONLY saint connected to Puffin Island.

It was back in the 6 th century that this gentle abbot first settled in Penmon, and built a little church. His ruined beehive cell still survives there today, as does the well from which he drew water, both for his own use, and also for baptising local people.





Like many other Celtic saints, Seiriol would have travelled by sea. So he felt comfortable near the coast on Anglesey, on low-lying land. Although he lived as a simple hermit, Seiriol soon attracted followers, and eventually he decided to establish a small monastery. He chose to build it on nearby Ynys Seiriol, now called Puffin Island.

That little monastery on Puffin Island saw some scary action in 632, when Edwin of Northumbria was chasing the Welsh king, Cadwallon, and ended up besieging him on the island. Cadwallon was finally conquered, and history moved on, but the monastic ruins of Seiriol's little monastery are still there today.

Seiriol seems to have been a purely local saint who never attracted a very great number of followers. The only known dedications to him are at Penmon and Puffin Island. But Seiriol's life and work are still a testimony today. He is a gentle and encouraging reminder of what an impact even a simple local Christian can achieve, by simply being faithful to Jesus Christ in the place where he is.


Marriage – 6 Gospel Commitments Every Couple Needs to Make By Paul Tripp, 10Publishing, £17.15

Easter Inside Out – the story as if you were there By David Kitchen, BRF, £12.99





My First Sermon

This month's painting is *My First Sermon* by John Everett Millais. It hangs in the Guildhall Art Gallery in London. The Gallery was only completed in 1999, having replaced a building that was destroyed in the blitz of 1941. It has over 4000 works, many of them from the Victorian and Pre-Raphaelite period.

Among them is this painting by Millais which depicts Effie, his 5-year-old daughter sitting in Kingston Church. She is dressed properly and sensibly for the occasion with feathered hat, muff and a cloak of vivid red. Her mother's prayer book and gloves are by her side. Effie is listening with great concentration.



When the painting was exhibited in 1863, it was a great success. In the following year Millais produced My Second Sermon – a very different occasion, for Effie has now fallen asleep with her hat by her side.

Millais was often criticised for his sentimental portraits of children. But in 1864 the Archbishop of Canterbury, Charles Longley, praised this second painting for reminding us of 'the evil of lengthy sermons and drowsy discourses.'

As we look at Effie alert one Sunday, asleep the next, we can smile. But we might also ask how we respond to the Word that comes to us through the medium of words in the weekly sermon. The preacher has the daunting task of using this everyday coinage of words to draw us into that mysterious, life-giving realm of the Word, Jesus. The words spoken must make a straight path for the Lord to reach each human heart.

The two paintings of Millais depict the reality and fragility of this endeavour. Sometimes our attention is engaged; at others, drowsiness closes our eyes and

even our hearts to the good news of salvation. On occasions the sermon sows seeds, which can bear fruit. At other times, all kinds of factors mitigate against the sermon's success.

Let us pray that as listener or as preacher, we may be aware of the dynamic power of the Word, which, as Karl Rahner wrote, calls us 'out of the little house of our homely, close-hugged truths into the strangeness of the mystery of God that is our real home.'
