




An Opportunity to Refocus

Pancake Day, or Shrove Tuesday, is the feast day before the start of Lent. This year it falls on Tuesday 4th March. It is apparently an ancient custom: Ælfric of Eynsham's "Ecclesiastical Institutes" from around 1000 AD states: "In the week immediately before Lent everyone shall go to his confessor and confess his deeds and the confessor shall so shrive him." Hence 'Shrove Tuesday'.

The pancake bit related to Lent traditionally being a time of fasting, prayer and almsgiving. Shrove Tuesday was the last opportunity to use up eggs and fats before embarking on the Lenten fast – and obviously pancakes are the perfect way of using up these ingredients.

The call to confession was signified by the ringing of the church bell which became known as the 'Pancake Bell'. The 'Millenium History of Finmere' quotes J.C. Bloomfield's 'History of Finmere' where he notes that in 1880 Finmere Church still rang the Pancake Bell at 11.30 am on Shrove Tuesday, but that its religious function had declined and it had become a signal for the preparation of pancakes!

The Millenium History also describes the pancake race that used to be organised by the WI from about 1959 through to 1977, when it was replaced by a pancake party in the village hall. It was a matter of fierce competition between the WIs from Ambrosden, Bucknell, Finmere and Stoke Lyne. In Finmere, the race was from the Jubilee Tree, up Mere Road to the school. The winner was presented with a shield for their WI, and something like a new frying pan or a recipe book.



Wikipedia tells me that the pancake race is credited as having begun in Olney in Buckinghamshire, when in 1445 a woman of Olney heard the shriving bell while she was making pancakes and ran to the church in her apron, still clutching her frying pan. The Olney pancake race is now world famous. Competitors have to be local housewives and they must wear an apron and a hat or scarf. Each contestant has a frying pan containing a hot pancake. She must toss it three times during the race. The first woman to complete the course and arrive at the church, serve her

pancake to the bellringer and be kissed by him, is the winner.

Father Alex was telling us how about how in Zimbabwe people empty their pantries before Lent of all the disturbances that would hinder their fasting. They bring to the church any luxuries or foods that they have in excess, any wine, and any clothing that they don't want to keep. And after Mass, they all go into the hall and feast together on the foods they have brought. The clothing is given to those in need as an act of almsgiving. This practise of feasting before the start of Lent is symbolic of emptying the heart or mind of all the events that can be a disturbance in walking or journeying with the Lord.

That got me wondering about the things in my life that are a disturbance or a distraction in my walk of faith. Lent has become for most of us something we give little thought to. We might give up something like chocolate or alcohol – possibly more for health reasons than for spiritual ones, and we might perhaps try to do something positive – give some money to charity, for example. But if we stop and think about the things that really disturb or distract us from our spiritual path, we might well come up with some rather different and probably more difficult to give up 'habits'. The constant distraction of our phones?



The tendency to fill every moment of the day with activity? Our tendency to be looking to our own needs or the needs of our family to the exclusion of all the other need and injustice in the world?

I wonder what it would be for you? For the Christian, Lent can provide a good opportunity to do something



about some of the disturbances that distract us from following Jesus and living faithfully. But whatever your world view, perhaps Lent is a good time to pause, reflect and clear out some of the unhelpful distractions or disturbances from our lives. Perhaps Lent is a good time to rebalance. Whatever you do, however you do it, whether from a faith perspective or some other, may you have a very blessed Lent, one where you can refocus on your spiritual path.

Shrove Tuesday - 4th March 2025



Simple Pancake Recipe

(adapted from the recipe in "Good Cookery" by W.G.R. Francillon and G.T.C.D.S, first published 1920. I bought this book at Mixbury Fete in 2024 - Ed.)

Break two eggs into a bowl or jug blender

Add four rounded tablespoons of flour (plain is traditional, but self-raising is also OK).


Add a 1/4 pint of milk or water (140 millilitres) and blend with an electric blender or beat with a balloon whisk.

When thoroughly blended, mix in another 1/4 pint (140 ml) of milk or water. Leave the batter in the fridge for about ten minutes.

In a frying pan on a hot stove top, melt a small piece of lard or a spoonful of vegetable oil (not olive oil).

Let the pan heat up until just before smoking and pour in enough batter to cover the bottom of the pan. It should sizzle and not stick to the pan.

Let one side brown, then turn or toss the pancake to allow the other side to cook. Turn the pancake out onto a heated plate and sprinkle with lemon juice and sugar.



IS YOUR PHONE DISTRACTING YOU FROM WHAT'S IMPORTANT?

Can you remember life before your smartphone?

Perhaps you carried map books in your car. You probably had an alarm clock, and a camera. If you wanted to contact someone, you called them and had a conversation, or sent an abbreviation-laden message of 140 characters. If you were a child, you played with your friends or chatted to them.

Certainly, your internet activity was restricted to when you were sitting in front of your computer. When you had finished using the internet, you got up and walked away from it to do something else.

Since the advent of smartphones, that ability to disconnect has gone for most people. But society plunged into the smartphone era largely without stopping to think about the consequences. It's only now that the alarm bells are sounding about constant smartphone use.

"Most adults would support a ban on under-16-year-olds visiting social media platforms such as X and Instagram. Such are the findings of a recent survey by the More in Common think tank. It found that 75 per cent of adults favour the minimum age for accessing social media sites to be raised, from 13 to 16 years old.

Concern about the effects of social media on young people comes at a time when tech giants are facing increasi criticism about the impact their platforms can have on young people. The survey also found that 71 per cent of adults want a ban on all smartphones in school, while 14 per cent oppose the idea." (from Parish Pump)

I think that giving things up for Lent has become rather unfashionable, in the church as well as the wider world. I do try and persist with this idea though, as I think that self-denial is like a muscle which needs exercising. Giving up alcohol or chocolate might seem rather trivial and not very spiritual, but I think it does actually require a degree of self-discipline which is useful to develop and which is, I feel, transferrable to other areas of life.

I'm not sure that I could give up my smartphone for Lent as the lack of Google Maps and some other sources of information when on the move might prove rather too challenging. Perhaps one could forego social media or set a daily/weekly time limit, maybe letting social media contacts know that you're taking a bit of a break so as not to offend by failure to join in.

Most younger people access social media via their phones, which are constantly receiving new messages. Social media platforms like Facebook, Instagram, Whatsapp or X (formerly Twitter) were originally marketed as innocent sites where photos, news or opinions could be shared. We now know that they are a great deal more than that.

Anyone who uses any social media platform is having their data harvested all the time, because companies

like Google and Meta are in the business of collecting and selling data. Photos and text uploaded are analysed for content. Every time you view, like or comment on someone else's content, the link between you is noted. It's recorded how long you spend looking at each post you pause on when you are scrolling. From these raw numbers, a lot can be gleaned about your contacts, your opinions, your state of mind, even your physical health.


In order to maximise the amount of data collected, social media sites use sophisticated algorithms designed to make you use more of their products. If they can induce a dopamine hit as you get pleasure from your social media experience, then you will stay on their site for longer. So that's what they do. You are a product to them, one to be exploited for as much money as possible. Everything you see on social media is designed to get you to keep scrolling and keep interacting.

But if you are interacting with social media, how can you interact with the real world around you or listen to God? If you are getting constant dopamine hits, how will this affect your physical and mental health? If your social media usage is under control, this isn't a problem - everyone needs to unwind or learn things and catching up with news, podcasts or videos can be a good way of doing that. But the problem with smartphones is that they tend to be always close by, tempting us to go back to big tech websites just to get that dopamine hit from social media again. And again. And again.

One survey by Spanish scientists in 2016 concluded that 27.9% of young adults are addicted to their phones. New terms have been coined for aspects of phone addiction, such as "Nomophobia" - the fear of going out without one's phone and "Ringxiety" which is the feeling that a notification has come through on your phone when it hasn't. They affect older as well as young people.

Heather Tomlinson, a freelance Christian writer writing on the website Christian Today, asked the question, "What happened when a whole church ditched the digital?"

"Social media and addiction to smartphones have been blamed for many of the societal ills that have steadily got worse over the past 15 years. The possible harmful effects include: mental health problems in adolescents, especially girls; political division and polarisation; fomenting riots; racism and antisemitism; isolation and singleness – and there are many more."



Fascinating Phones

Pastor Darren Whitehead of the multi-site Church of the City in Nashville is the author of a recent book: "The Digital Fast: 40 Days to Detox Your Mind and Reclaim What Matters Most."

Heather Tomlinson continues, "Dr Whitehead ... shared how he was inspired to start the fast because his three daughters had said they wished he would be on his phone less. Speaking on the "Couple Things" podcast, he said, "It was kind of a wake-up call for me, and as a pastor I was just feeling these devices have seeped their way into our lives.

"I feel like sometimes we're so overloaded with information we can know more about what's happening in the conflict in the Middle East than we know about what's going on in the hearts of our kids."

Often over the years I have given up things for Lent more often than not chocolate, sometimes successfully sometimes not.

However, as a young teenager I decided to give up sugar in my tea and coffee. I may be giving my age away somewhat as I'm not sure many teenagers now days drink these beverages. I had two spoonfuls of sugar in my tea or coffee probably because that's what my parents did. So for whatever reason that's what I gave up and believe it or not from the first day of that particular day of Lent to the current day I've not had even a hint of sugar in my tea or coffee. I don't know why that particular year had this effect but it did. Sometimes although it maybe hard we can give up those things that sometimes we do without even thinking about it, so this year reducing my screen time will be my aim. Let's see, how I do.

Writing on [Dr Whitehead's Substack] After Babel, he describes the positive effects on the church and its members: "What could have been a mere exercise in self-discipline turned into a shared transformative journey of spiritual renewal and collective freedom."

He argues that people often get on social media because they're afraid of missing out on something. This pressure can be relieved if people abstain as a group: "By engaging in the Digital Fast as a community, we collectively resisted the societal pressures of digital overuse and helped each other discover a healthier rhythm of life."

The congregation first pledged to remove all the apps from their phone and only use their device for calls and text. "Many rediscovered hobbies, rekindled relationships, and engaged in deeper prayer and meditation," he wrote.

"Families reported having more meaningful meals together, small groups found themselves more engaged in discussions... The ultimate goal was to cultivate a deeper hunger for God's presence."

He gave a few tips to the Aro podcast for doing a digital fast: firstly to buy an alarm clock. If phones are used to wake us up, the notifications are the first thing that someone will look at in the morning.

"Ultimately, the Digital Fast was about more than technology; it was about reclaiming the sacredness of presence and attentiveness," concludes Whitehead.

"It was a modern-day spiritual pilgrimage through the wilderness of the digital age. And for [our church] it was a journey worth taking—a journey that led us not away from life, but into its fullest expression."

As we stand on the brink of an internet dominated by artificial intelligence - who can argue with that?

Wulu, South Sudan - Latest News

A huge thank you to all those who so generously donated cakes, soup and money for the Soup Lunch on Saturday 1st February. There was a variety of warming soups and an impressive array of delicious cakes at the lunch, which was also an enjoyable social occasion. As a result of this wonderful open-heartedness, £469 was raised for the Teachers' Incentive Scheme at the Girls' Primary School in Wulu, South Sudan.



In January Bishop Zechariah sent a report of the workshops held to resolve the conflict between flooding displacement victims, farmers and cattle keepers and communities. These workshops have:

- * fostered better understanding and cooperation between farmers and cattle keepers.
- * reduced the frequency and intensity of conflicts over resources.
- * enhanced community resilience to flooding through sustainable land and water management practices.
- * established channels for ongoing feedback from community members to adapt strategies as needed.





Pictures of the workshops which were attended by local leaders, police, local government officials, women, local youth, religious leaders, farmers and cattle keepers.

Good News - the water has gone down in and around Wulu and all the people have returned to their homes.

Bishop Zechariah says, 'I want to seize this golden chance to register my heartfelt appreciation to Shelswell Parish for your support to our Diocese and the School'. A 'Daniel fast' involves going without meat, dairy foods, alcohol and luxury foods. It is sometimes done as a way to save money that is then donated to a particular cause. The idea comes from the story of Daniel in the Bible:

"I ate no pleasant food, no meat or wine came into my mouth ... till three whole weeks were fulfilled". Dan 10.3

If a digital detox doesn't appeal, why not do a 'Daniel fast' in Lent – for three weeks or for the whole six weeks - and give the money you save to Wulu?

SHELSWELL GARDEN CLUB



PLEASE NOTE: Club Secretary, Corrine Mitchell, was sad to report that the current committee have decided to step down from their positions in the summer of 2025. We are all most grateful that this committee have worked tirelessly over many years providing us with speakers and outings for our enjoyment and to enhance our gardening skills.

We still hope that a new committee will form and take the Garden Club forward with renewed vigour and ideas. Please do consider becoming a member of this new committee.

The Club will be forced to close if a committee cannot be formed.

On **February 11th** Adam Pasco gave another excellent talk to members on Zoom. This time it was entitled 'Growing the Best Glorious Plants'. Using beautiful photos, he took us for a tour of his garden showing the ericaceous border, perennial border, and shady border. Also, we saw the green house, raised beds, pergola and patio pots. He then talked about the plants in these areas which inspired him.

He gave us tips for successful gardening including using February and March to consider where to place new plants, choose plants that are known to perform well, think about plants that last through the year e.g. Euphorbias. Some summer plants that last a long time include Speedwell, Salvia 'Amistad', Campanula, Rudbeckia 'Goldstrum' and Clematis. For shady areas choose Brunnera, Japanese anemones and Solomon seal and try to layer colours. Many plants are successful in pots or raised beds, e.g. Alstroemeria, Eucomis, Hostas and herbs. Adam also changes his pots up to three times a year according to what's growing well! Right now, we could be getting organised about what to sow, where and when, prune relevant shrubs, clean and top up bird feeders. Many members made long lists of what to buy, they were so inspired by his talk.

We will not be having a meeting in March, although some members will be going on a visit. On **April 8**th Duncan Coombs will be talking to us in Hethe Village Hall about 'Colour & Texture in the Garden'.

We welcome visitors to our club and meet at Hethe Village Hall at 7.30 pm on the second Tuesday of the month (apart from August). During winter months, some meetings may be held via Zoom. Meetings and outings are open to members and visitors. Your membership card gives you a discount at Swallows Nursery, Mixbury. Club membership fee is now £15 per year. This covers all speakers, zoom meetings, as well as entry to *some* evening garden visits. The visitor fee is now £5, which will be refunded if the visitor decides to join the Club that evening.

SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

Our February 2025 session was on the theme of Fear.

In *Song:Fear no more the heat o' the sun*, from *Shakespeare's* play *Cymbeline*, fear of death is allayed by an appreciation that it is the natural end of life, coming to all things and all people. In *Our Deepest Fear* by *Marianne Moore* (b 1952), the idea is that fear inhibits us and those around us, and that we need to free ourselves of our fear to live a good life, accepting 'the glory of God that is within us'. Similarly, in *Fear-Doubt-Insecurity-Uncertainty* by *Sri Chinnoy* (1931-2007), feeling at one with a higher being cures the fearful and timid. *Kahlil Gibran* (1883-1931), in *Fear*, uses the metaphor of a river entering the ocean to illustrate our life, whilst *Mewlana Jalaluddin Rumi* (1207-73), a Mediaeval Afghan poet, in *A Stone I Died*, uses the idea of reincarnation to comfort those afraid of death.

In Act 2 Scene3 of *Shakespeare's* play *Henry IV Part 1*, Hotspur (Henry Percy) is scornful when one of the aristocratic conspirators cries off joining the rebellion because of the dangers it poses and his fears that preparations have not been thorough.

In *Life Doesn't Frighten Me at All*, the black American poet *Maya Angelou* (1928-2014) makes a bold statement of all the things that might be supposed to frighten her, making it clear that they do not. She is making a strong positive statement, as is *Ella Wheeler Wilcox* (1850-1919) in *Fear*, where she presents the feeling as being allied with 'Failure and Defeat'.

With inspiration from the Book of Daniel, *Elizabeth Hedge Webster (1822-97)* pictures heaven protecting us and taking away the need to fear, in her poem *The Angel's Word*. Confusion and fear being overcome by an appreciation of life are described in *Being But Men* by *Dylan Thomas* (1914-53).

Charlotte Perkins Gilman (1860-1935), an early feminist, in the poem For Fear blames our fears on men and how they have run the world, asking us to 'Make it a woman's world; safe, fair'. An unusual angle is taken by Emily Dickinson (1830-86), in The Inevitable, a poem in which she argues that feeling fear of the future prepares us for terrible events.

Some very real reasons for fear are given by *W H Auden* (1907-1973) in *September 1st 1939*. His fears are based on what had happened during the 30s in Europe and America up to that point. He hopes for the moral strength to fight the darkness with the 'affirming flame' of his knowledge of right and wrong. *Ballad*, by the same poet, was published earlier, in 1934, and presents his fears about the rise of fascism in a traditional ballad form. *Wilfred Owen* (1893-1918), writes of a soldier so beset by fear that he shoots himself, in *S I W* (*Self-Inflicted Wound*).

In *Boat Stealing*, an extract from his long poem *The Prelude*, *William Wordsworth* (1770-1850) reminisces about 'borrowing' a boat and rowing across a lake until fear of the looming mountains around him sent him home to have nightmares. The reader can empathise with his fear, whereas in *The Raven* by *Edgar Allan Poe*, the effect is that of a director creating a feeling of unease at the start of a horror film.

John Keats (1795-1821) expressed his distress at dying (of tuberculosis) before he had produced all the poems that were in his head in When I Have Fears that I may Cease to Be, whereas in Storm on the Island by Seamus Heaney (1939-2013) the fear is felt by islanders in stormy weather. Fear of dying from thirst felt in animals in India is given voice by Rudyard Kipling (1865-1936) in How Fear Came. Shakespeare (1564-1616) in Sonnet 23, compares his fears and insecurities as a lover with those of an 'unperfect actor'. Perhaps the last word on fear should be given to Spike Milligan (1918-2002) in his limerick Bump. Written for children, it is a breezy, semi-serious bit of advice!

It looks increasingly likely that our church will close in the next two years. We are truly grateful to all of you who have supported the church through the years, but regular income is falling while expenditure increases. Last year we had a deficit of over £3,000 and this year we already have a deficit of over £600.

It is sad that a church that has existed for over 800 years will cease to be used during our lifetimes.

If you can join in regular giving to give the church a chance of survival, the details are below. If the church does close, the Church Council (PCC) who currently maintain the church will no longer exist. I understand that the Parish Council will be legally bound to take over responsibility for the graveyard, but not the church building, hence my suggestion below for a group of friends. Such a group could continue to maintain the church when it is closed and at least prevent it from falling down.

We need your help

We believe that most people value the church as a heritage asset, although they may not wish to support the day-to-day running of the church or the arrangements for worship.

The church belongs to the whole parish of Hethe and not just to those who worship there. It belongs to everyone who passes by, borrows a book, makes use of the food donations or who has experienced a special moment involving the church. It is always open for the benefit of all those who would like to visit.

Would you be interested in raising funds to support the maintenance of the church?

We could start a "Friends of St Edmund & St George Church" with the aim of raising funds to support the maintenance of the church's fabric, its fittings and its churchyard. This would be independent of the PCC.

Regular Giving





Senior Citizens' Lunch

A Look at WW2 Evacuees in Stoke Lyne

With the VE day 80th anniversary celebrations coming up in May this year, I thought I would look at the stories I've discovered of evacuees who spent time in the village. The first account below was originally published in the June 2005 issue of Shelswell News from a letter sent to the Revd Ricky Yates and as we probably have many new readers since then I thought it would bear repetition, especially as it pre-dates the magazine archive now on the Benefice website:

"In this year of commemoration of the end of the Second World War 60 years ago I thought it may be of interest to some in Stoke Lyne to hear about, and perhaps remember, the evacuees that were sent there from London around July 1940.

I was one of them. My name then was Audrey Turner and I came from Walthamstow in East London sometime before my 5th birthday.

I was lined up outside the School and ladies from the village came along and selected the child (or children) they would take into their homes. Together with my very old friend Beryl Vint we were the last to be chosen. Mrs G Taylor who was the wife of the landlord at the Peyton Arms took us both. She had two girls Iris and Mary and we lived very happily with the family for over a year. Iris and Mary were a little older than Beril and I but we all got along famously.

I quote from a postcard showing the Peyton Arms dated August 1940 that Mrs Taylor sent to my mother.

"Audrey arrived safely this afternoon and seems quite happy and plays with our little girls. I will get her to write to you later but am not saying too much at present. This is her new home."

We were not allowed inside the Pub of course, but to this day I can remember the warm smell of hops coming from the open door in summer and the day of deliveries when the huge cellar door was open. Mr Taylor would shout at us to keep away from the steps! We played also with the boys from the farm next door to the Peyton Arms, David and Michael (?) Curtis. We helped or hindered in the fields with them at Harvest time.

We went to the school and of course Sunday School at St Peters. Such memories I have of those days. The noise of the pigs as they were being slaughtered at the Blacksmiths, dancing around the May Pole on May Day, skating on the pond just down from the Peyton Arms. Watching the hares run from the combine-harvester. Being given chocolate from some American servicemen who were for some reason outside the school.

We were moved on from the Peyton Arms to a cottage near the School, but stayed only a short while. I seem to recall the lady was on her own and did not look after us very well. We were taken from there when it was discovered we had huge scabs in our heads!

Mrs Denny and her family took us in. They lived right opposite the School. Mr and Mrs Denny also had two daughters but they appeared to be much older than us. Mr Denny kept bees and it was Mrs Denny who encouraged me to play her piano. I carried on when I returned to London and became quite good at it.

I was taken back to Walthamstow after 2 ½ years and in that time I only saw my parents twice. I returned to the wrath of the V1 and V2s, bomb damage and shelters.

So many memories, some good, others sad but the effect hey had upon me and others like me was enormous. After all these years I recall everything so clearly. When I tell my three children that I was only 4 ¾ years old when I was sent away, they look at me aghast. I have a few photographs and have copied them to give them all a reminder of what it was like all those years ago."

I do appreciate you reading this and hope you found it interesting. There may be just someone in the village that remembers those days! I would be very happy for anyone interested to be in touch."

I've not included Audrey's contact details as this was 20 years ago nor have I included her photos as my scan of the original article is too grainy but they show Audrey and her friend Beryl as Well as Iris and Mary Taylor.

A certificate of appreciation was issued to those who hosted evacuees. This one was issued to Pedro Collins' grandmother. At the time of the 1939 register his grandparents were living in Hardwick.

My next story is also connected with the Walthamstow evacuees and comes from the "Oxford Mail and Times, 11th April 1975:

BACK TO VILLAGE LONDONERS Bert and Gert Beazley couldn't get enough of the tiny village of Stoke Lyne, near Bicester.

Not satisfied with their brief stay there during the war to care for the evacuees, the cockney couple came straight back to the village as soon as Bert retired and today celebrate their golden wedding at their home, 7 The Close.



Gert,77, first met Bert, who is 81, as she was getting off a train in Walthamstow. They were married a year later in Islington.

After a stay of five years, the couple returned to London but sadly missed village life. So as soon as Bert retired as a French-polisher, the couple came back to the country.

Gert has played the organ at Stoke Lyne Church for the past 16 years.

Their photo and the accompanying newspaper story appears on Oxfordshire's Heritage search website https://heritagesearch.oxfordshire.gov.uk/images/POX0390721

Bert (Albert) was born in 1894 and Gert (Gertrude) was born in 1898. They married in 1925 and from the records it looks like they had two children Rex and David born in 1932 and 1936 so presumably they too came to the village with their parents during the war. Presumably part of Bert and Gert's role was to escort the evacuees to the village from Walthamstow and perhaps it was they who were responsible for moving Audrey and Beryl on from their second placement when things did not seem to be going well there. Bert died in 1980 and Gert in 1975 and both are buried in our churchyard.

My last evacuee story comes from a project on the BBC website called "WW2 People's War" which invited members of the public to contribute their memories. It was submitted by a Phil Sealey of the Somerset County Museum Team on behalf of evacuee Judy O'Malley. Judy says that her family had moved to Winchester and:

"I was sent off to a convent, which although the base of the convent was in Upper Norwood in London, had been evacuated to Oxfordshire, just outside Bicester. To get there we had to go by train to Reading, change at Reading, Reading to Oxford, change at Oxford, off the train there and then get a bus from Oxford to Bicester. At Bicester the milk van from the village of Fringford, where we were actually evacuated to, came to pick us up. That is how we got there all during the war, backwards and forwards. The van used to deliver everything; beside milk it delivered bread, the post and carried people. In fact in Fringford village itself they still had girls with yokes who delivered milk."

"My sisters were at the same Order of Nuns at Cromer, which closed down at the beginning of the war because it was a dangerous area to be in. So we were all evacuated, the convent itself was divided into two houses, one in Fringford and the other in Stoke Lyne. The younger ones, like me at seven, went to the one at Fringford, and my sisters, who were older than I was, went to Stoke Lyne. So I was left there, a child of seven, in this stately home."

And this where I think things get a bit muddled up as Judy continues:

"The house belonged to Lord and Lady Eyles, they had two daughters and a son Algernon. He went off to war, and the two daughters and Lord and Lady Eyles lived in the Lodge. They were very much a presence, very loud, very posh — "hello, Delia" — that sort of thing, quite amusing!"

The first names Algernon and Delia are of course the same as those of the 7th Baronet, Sir Algernon Peyton and his daughter Delia Peyton so they imply that Judy was at Swift's House rather than Fringford Manor as originally stated, and Swift's House did indeed have a Lodge. The mention of there being two daughters and a son who had gone off to war also fits with the Peytons. Delia's sister was called Elizabeth, and the brother who went off to war was John. He was sadly killed in that conflict and is commemorated on the plaque in St Peter's Church. But from where did Judy recall the names "Lord and Lady Eyles"?
