

DO NOT FEAR

Sometimes it seems as though the news - mainstream and alternative - is very negative, constantly magnifying some new threat, some new reason to fear that the sky is going to fall on our heads. The stories are very convincing; they may be repeated for emphasis, citing video proof or science. An emotional response is provoked. Many of us who get our news via social media are particularly vulnerable as the algorithms serve up a stream of exaggerated tales and fearmongering to generate clicks and interest.



How should we as Christians respond to this? We want to be informed, but we do not want to be manipulated into fear or worry that will affect our mental health and perhaps distort our judgement, turning us away from God. Fortunately God has already given us some good advice. In fact, the same advice is given to us over a hundred separate times in the Bible; **do not be afraid.**

When we are scared we are easily manipulated to neglect doing good, maybe even to harm ourselves or others, or simply waste our time cowering in fear. Every tyranny in the age of mass media has begun by manipulating people's emotions.

So let's take advice from the Bible and resist falling prey to fear and worry. We do live in a turbulent time in history as the world shifts from being dominated by the US and its fiat dollar to becoming more multipolar, and over the next months and years, there will be different people trying to scare and manipulate us as they struggle for power and influence. We can't change world events, but we can influence how we react to them.

Here is one of the most beautiful places where the Bible reminds us that trusting God protects us from falling prey to fear and manipulation:

Psalm 91

He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty.

I will say of the LORD, He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust.

Surely he shall deliver thee from the snare of the fowler, and from the noisome pestilence.

He shall cover thee with his feathers, and under his wings shalt thou trust: his truth shall be thy shield and buckler.

Thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night; nor for the arrow that flieth by day;

Nor for the pestilence that walketh in darkness; nor for the destruction that wasteth at noonday.

A thousand shall fall at thy side, and ten thousand at thy right hand; but it shall not come nigh thee.

Only with thine eyes shalt thou behold and see the reward of the wicked.

Because thou hast made the LORD, which is my refuge, even the most High, thy habitation;

No evil shall befall thee, neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling.

For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways.

They shall bear thee up in their hands, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone.

Thou shalt tread upon the lion and adder: the young lion and the dragon shalt thou trample under feet.

Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him: I will set him on high, because he hath known my name.

He shall call upon me, and I will answer him: I will be with him in trouble; I will deliver him, and honour him. With long life will I satisfy him, and shew him my salvation.



If the Bible tells us not to fear the dangers described in Psalm 91, how much more important is it not to allow ourselves to be brought down by what we see on a screen?



Midweek Communion Thursday 4th September 12.00 noon

Rev Liz began by welcoming all to the service and prayers.

The Gospel reading was from Mark chapter 6 verses 1 to 13 read by Rena Andrews. This passage is about shaking the dust from your feet. Jesus couldn't do many miracles in his hometown because of lack of faith. He changed course and went around teaching in other villages. He then sent his disciples to preach, heal and free people, instructing them to shake the dust from their feet if they didn't receive a welcome.

We then remembered St Birinus the first Bishop of Dorchester. Birinus was born mid-6th century in Northern Europe and ordained as a priest in Rome. He was called by God to be a missionary, was consecrated as a Bishop in Milan then sent to Britain by the Pope. He eventually found an open door to the kingdom of the West Saxons where he found them all to be pagans. Their king was one of his early converts.

His main focus for preaching was around Dorchester, Abingdon, Bicester, Thame and Aylesbury. He built and dedicated several churches in Dorchester and many other areas. He died in about 650 and was buried in Dorchester. His bones were moved to Winchester, then moved a couple of more times. In the 13th century the monks of Dorchester Abbey claimed to have the relics of Birinus. Whether true or not, Dorchester Abbey became a popular place of pilgrimage. A marble shrine was dedicated to St Birinus, but this was destroyed in 1536. Most of the intricately carved vaulting was found in a blocked up doorway in the 1870s. In 1960s this was incorporated in the reconstruction of the shrine in the Shrine of St Birinus at Dorchester South Aisle.

Reverend Liz then held a short service of Communion assisted by Ali Miller after which we moved to the tables set for lunch which consisted of a choice of soup with bread rolls, followed by a choice of desserts then tea or coffee. As usual we kept each other up to date about what is going on in the other villages.



Uncle Peter's Story by Toddy Hoare (Resource Publications)

Many people will recognise the name of Toddy Hoare, as he has taken services in Shelswell Benefice in the past.

His new book *Uncle Peter's Story* aims to help the reader who is studying the Bible by illuminating the human story inside the divine. The short book (74 pages) presents Saint Peter of the Gospels as seen, heard, and recorded in the New Testament particularly by his nephew Saint Mark, who was also an eyewitness to Jesus' earthly ministry. Saint Peter was a key figure in the human response to Jesus as a person and as the risen Christ. He recognized who Jesus was and proclaimed it at Pentecost when Holy Spirit was poured out on all disciples. Yes, he had failings too, as the story reveals, but he overcame them and learned about the truth he was called to reveal.

Presented as a commentary mostly as if by Mark, this book aims to be an introduction to those new to reading the Bible, an aide-

memoire to those more established in their Bible reading, and a stimulant to those preaching, teaching, and using Peter's story as a way into the Gospels or as food for prayer.

The author, Toddy Hoare, trained as a sculptor and was freelance for 3 years until recession in the mid-1970s made such a living impossible so he joined the 15/19th King's Royal Hussars to pay his debts, serving in Northern Ireland. Ordination followed and after a curacy in Guisborough, he was the curate-incharge of the Hillside Parishes in North Yorkshire on the Moors near Thirsk for 25 years and chaplain to the Yorkshire Agricultural Society. When his wife, Liz, got a post teaching spiritual formation at Wycliffe Hall in Oxford, the family moved down to Wheatley where he returned to sculpture and helped out with services in the area.




Social Bridge comes to Bicester

Peter George Allen of Hethe, died on 24 June. His funeral was held at St Edmund and St George Church, Hethe, on 30th July.

Peter, with his twin brother Brian, was born at Green Farm, Hethe on 8 August 1951. His parents were Gladys and Bert Allen, and his brothers and sisters were Jean, John, Margaret, Michael, Richard, and twin brother Brian.

Peter was brought up in Hethe, but over the years has lived in Buckingham and Bicester, before eventually returning home to Hethe. As a child he attended the village school, later going on to Highfield secondary school in Bicester. When he and his brother returned home from school each day they were expected to change their clothes and help out on the farm whenever there were chores to do.

Once Peter left school however, he never worked full time on the farm, though he would help occasionally and especially with the harvest. Instead, over the years, he had a number of jobs, for example working at the Arncott Depot, or lorry driving. Indeed the last job he had before he had to retire on account of ill health was driving a concrete-making lorry.

Peter enjoyed a wide variety of activities – Barn Dances (though he never danced, but enjoyed a chat and a beer and watching others!), Wrestling, Country and Western music, nature programmes on TV (especially those presented by David Attenborough – he saw all of them!). He liked mowing the churchyard which he did until his Parkinson's prevented him from continuing.

Dogs were important to Peter; he always owned a Jack Russell, and was well known to all the Hethe dog walkers. He could be seen out with Junior even when he had to use a 'walker'.

Peter had a happy personality and smile. He was an honest man, and well liked in the village. Family was important to Peter; he loved Margaret's great grandson, "my old boy" as he called him, and he very much missed his twin brother Brian who died in 2013. He too will be greatly missed by his family and friends, but he is now at peace.

Our September book was 'How Steeple Sinderby Wanderers Won the F.A. Cup" by JL Carr. This book was picked up in a bookstop in Bicester by one of our members who was drawn in by the romance of non league football. The author managed to put so much life into his characters and they all seemed so recognisable from village life. We enjoyed the way it built up to the crescendo of the final, then the next day everyone returned to their daily lives. It was a book that had made us laugh out loud

We thought it very cleverly written and quite sparely, so that, for example, the narrator talks about "his trouble", but this is never expanded upon. The quirky touches included the fact that the narrator makes his living by writing the couplets for greeting cards. Characters are described with their idiosyncrasies, for example, Mr. Fangfoss with his two wives, and Biddy, the vicar's atheist sister who accuses people of not having a purpose, a theme that threads through.

We also felt the book had charm, lightness of touch and humour, reminding us somewhat of the Vicar of Dibley in the way different eccentric characters populated it. It had this ephemeral concept of the right people in the right place at the right time coming together to achieve wonders, then melting away to live their own lives.

In one sense, this book, and 'A Month in the Country by the same author, had the same theme; a golden summer, a golden period where you can find yourself. Quintessentially English, we all found it surprising that no one had made a film of it!

The consensus was: a great little book full of gentle humour leaving you feeling that you had been right there.

SHELSWELL POETRY APPRECIATION GROUP

After our August break our September meeting was based on the topic of Clocks and Watches. The idea of timepieces marking a person's progress through life was one common to several of the poems, and metaphors to do with the brevity of life abounded.

Poems about physical clocks – whether alarms or grandfathers, were *The Old Clock by Eliza Cook (1818-89)*; My Alarm Clock by Amos Russel Wells (1862-1933); Sonnet 12 by Shakespeare; an extract from *The Waste Land by T S Eliot (1883-1968)*; A Clock Stopped by Emily Dickinson; The Old Clock on the Stairs by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow (1807-82); My Grandfather's Clock by Henry Clay Work (1832-84); Rock Around the Clock by Max C Freedman (1893-1962) and James E Myers (1919-2001); The Dumb Old Clock by Mary Stevenson (1896-1985); A Watched Clock by Kathryn Evans (1969-) and an anonymous poem , Ticking Melodies. In Clocks by Sinead Morrissey (1972-) they are symbolic of time passing painfully slowly in a bereaved household.

Poems about watches were *The Watch by Danusha Lameris* (1971-); Wristwatch by Ron Padgett (1942-); The Watch by Francis Darwin Cornford (1886-1960); Wrist Watch by Jeff Keyser (1956-98) and To My Pocket Watch by Christian Morgenstern (1871-1914).

A universal truth about the passage of time and our perception of it is found in what is, on the surface, the simplest of the poems we discussed: *The Clock Man by Shel Silverstein (1930-99).*

All the above poems can be found online. Just enter into your search engine (eg Google) 'Text of poem......by.........' to read the poem on screen.

Hethe Post Office




The "Old Shop" in Main Street, which was the village Post Office for many years, has now been sold. The Post Office was run by members of the local Morgan family, except for a period between 1869 and 1887 when the "receiver" was Miss Lucy Watts. Records show that Joseph Morgan was the "receiver" in 1891.

Joseph was the receiver/sub-postmaster up to 1920. He was born in 1855 in Hethe and was also a tailor (as were his male ancestors). In 1881 Joseph married Eliza Mary Frances who was born in 1861 in Juniper Hill. In 1881 they were living with her mother at the Fox Inn, Juniper Hill (her mother, Frances Harris, being the publican). Joseph and Eliza had ten children by 1911. Joseph died in 1921 and is buried in Hethe Churchyard. Eliza died in 1938.

In 1920, Miss Elizabeth Morgan became the sub-postmistress. In 1939 Fraser Edward Morgan was in charge and in 1967 Charles F Morgan up to its closure in 1974.

The earliest Hethe Parish record for the Morgan family is for the marriage in 1742 of Edward (a tailor from Fringford) to Joanna Hall. They lived in Hethe where their daughter Hannah was baptised in 1748, followed by Mary, Joseph, William, Joanna, Benjamin and Thomas. Unfortunately, there are entries for the burials of two of their children in Hethe Churchyard – in 1750 of Mary "a child" and in 1761 Thomas "an infant".

A little bit extra on WW2 evacuees in Stoke Lyne

Please see p34 of the March 2025 issue on the Shelswell News archive for my original article on the subject (http://www.shelswellparishes.info/documents/archive/2025/mar25.pdf).

Usually when I search on Google for items on Stoke Lyne I put inverted commas round "Stoke Lyne" so that the whole phrase is searched for and not individual words. However, recently I deliberately tried misspellings of the second part of the village name to see what would come up and using the phrase "Stoke Lynn" I found a further testimony on the BBC "WW2 People's War" website from a former WW2 evacuee to the village which had used that spelling.

The evacuee's name was Audrey Meek (nee Crockford) and she was another one of the evacuees from Walthamstow, coincidentally with the same first name as the evacuee whose letter to the Rev. Ricky Yates was quoted in the original article. This is what she says:

"I was 4 years old in 1939 and was evacuated during the war, sent to a village called Stoke Lynn, near Bicester, Oxford. I was an only child and was sent to stay with an elderly couple. He was an army captain in the First World War and very strict. It was a small village, everyone knowing everyone. I went to school in the village — 20 in the infants, 20 in the juniors, all in one building. It was a farming community and I used to collect the milk from the farm in a silver churn, it was still warm from the cow."

This got me thinking as to who the WW1 army captain might be and of course Sir Algernon Peyton, the 7th Baronet immediately came to mind. In 1939 he would have been 50 and his wife Joan 47. I would hardly call that "elderly" but I expect to a 4-year old 50 would seem pretty ancient! Sir Algernon certainly did serve in WW1, in the 11th Hussars, and at one point he was sent back to the UK to recover from wounds received in 1914. In February 1939 Sir Algernon's name appeared as "Capt. Sir Algernon T. Peyton, Bt" in the London Gazette on a list of Regular Army Reserve officers "having attained the age limit of liability to recall, to cease to belong to the Res. Of Offrs." ie he was deemed too old for active service.

Unfortunately Audrey does not give any further information on the couple or where they lived. However, Judy, another evacuee quoted in the March 2025 article, indicated that Sir Algernon and his wife were living in "The Lodge" while Swift's House itself was home to an Order of Nuns evacuated from Cromer.

We get a picture of what Audrey and the other evacuees were escaping from in the rest of her testimony:

"In 1945 aged 10 I came home because we were told the war was over. I got a cab to Bicester and a train to London where my parents met me. There were houses with no roofs hit by bombs and caught fire something I had not seen in Oxford. After about a week of being home a flying bomb dropped in our road, I was running for the shelter and was blown off my feet. My mother who was pregnant with my sister didn't get to the shelter. She was kept in hospital for a few days, luckily not badly hurt. A few months later we had a street party at the end of the war."



Corporal Desmond Doss of Hacksaw Ridge



Eighty years ago, on 12th October 1945, US Army combat medic Desmond Doss became the first conscientious objector in US history to receive a Medal of Honour for heroic actions. He saved the lives of 75 men during the Battle of Okinawa. The film *Hacksaw Ridge* told his story.

Doss was born in Virginia in 1919, and became a strong believer in the Bible, especially the Ten Commandments. As a devout Seventh Day Adventist and conscientious objector, he determined to join the Army after Pearl Harbour – his goal being to save as many lives as possible, and to kill no-one.

He enlisted in the medical corps and refused to carry a rifle, despite receiving some abuse at first from his fellow soldiers and officers.

He served in combat on the islands of Guam, Leyte, and Okinawa – but it was the last that was most remarkable, because the fighting took place on the top of a sheer 400ft cliff with booby traps and hidden machine gun nests. Doss refused to retreat with his battalion and kept on returning to the battlefield before lowering injured comrades down the cliff (known as Hacksaw Ridge). He thought he had saved 50 men – praying aloud each time "Lord, please help me get one more". His comrades thought he had saved 100: the official report split the difference.


Of the 16 million Americans in uniform during World War Two, only 431 received the Congressional Medal of Honour. Before leaving the Army Doss had contracted tuberculosis, and eventually he had to have a lung and five ribs removed. He lived with one lung to the age of 87.



Time to make your Will?

Have you been putting off writing or updating your Will? Next month the charity Will Aid's 'Make a Will Month' will offer you the opportunity to put your affairs in order, secure your loved ones' future and give to charities helping those in need.

Participating solicitors are inviting people to contact them to book appointments for November, when they will prepare basic Wills without charging their normal fee. All that they will ask in return is that clients consider making a voluntary donation to Will Aid. The suggested donation is just £120 for a single Will, or £200 for a pair of mirror Wills.

The money raised will be shared by nine UK charities: namely ActionAid, Age UK, British Red Cross, Christian Aid, Crisis, NSPCC, SCIAF (Scotland) and Trocaire (Northern Ireland).

As many as half of all UK adults in the UK don't have a Will. They have not made any legally valid provision for what they would like to happen after their death. This can lead to a great deal of stress and uncertainty, as well as financial hardship, for those left behind.

Even if you have a Will, it is important to keep it up to date. Experts recommend routinely reviewing a Will every three to five years, and making a new Will as soon as significant family changes occur.

Plastic Carrier Bags


This year marks ten years since England introduced the 5p charge for single-use plastic carrier bags. The charge has had a dramatic effect – with a reduction of 98% in sales.

In 2014, 7.6 billion single-use plastic bags were sold in the UK. By 2023, 133 million single-use bags had been sold in the major supermarkets.


The average person in the UK now buys only about two single-use plastic bags per year.

He Gave Us Eyes To See Them: Lucas Cranach's painting 'Adam and Eve'

Lucas Cranach, this month's artist, was born in 1472 in what is now Bavaria. He became a court painter to the Electors of Saxony until his death in 1553. Cranach was a close friend of Martin Luther, but also had Catholic patrons.

In this painting we are invited into the garden to look on all the beauty and wonder there. Among the animals we can see a hog, a lion (although Cranach would never have seen a lion in the flesh), a sheep, and a stag, a symbol of Christ. There are birds as well, including a pair of partridges, who traditionally represent the power of love, but also deceit. The roe deer drinking from the pool in the foreground is a reminder of Psalm 42 and the soul thirsting for God.

But dominating the scene is that moment of turning from God: there is a glorious tree, laden with fruit, and in front Adam and Eve, whose hands clutch an apple, while the serpent slithers down the trunk in a moment of triumph.

The painting is reminiscent of medieval tapestries and, like them, has a beguiling quality. All is beautiful and harmonious: it is Isaiah's vision of the lion lying down with the lamb amid the fruitfulness of nature and the oneness of creation. As we look on, we know that the defiance of God and the temptation to eat will lose this paradise. But we also know that creation will be redeemed by another fruit. Around Adam and Eve are the vine and grapes: they represent the Eucharist, the gift of Christ's body and blood.

The fruit of the tree in the painting leads to a fall from grace, but the fruit from that other tree, the vine, will redeem and lift humanity again to share in the bread and wine, the gifts of creation given at harvest and shared at every Holy Communion.

'The Bereavement Journey' Course

A church-run bereavement course is having a "profound and wide-reaching impact on adults of all ages," according to a recent independent evaluation.


The Bereavement Journey, run by the Christian charity AtaLoss, is "addressing a national need for bereavement support", and is "ideal for the significant majority — 85-90 per cent — of bereaved people who do not require or will not benefit from a clinical intervention".

AtaLoss was founded in 2016 by the Revd Yvonne Tulloch, a former Canon for Mission at Coventry Cathedral, whose husband died suddenly in 2008. She says: "We are a society where people have grown up not expecting death and where we have lost the art of support."


No Visible Scars is based on the 'Always Hopeful' recovery programme for groups of Christian women who have experienced domestic abuse.


Kingdom Buildings – Your Church and Churchyard as Assets for Mission By Kenneth Padley, Canterbury Press, £20
