

How Long is a Piece of String or a Vacancy?

To meet the early deadline, I am submitting this shortly before Alice Goodall's farewell service and wondering what lies ahead. How long will it be until we get a

new Team Rector? Around 30 years ago appointments used to be made quite quickly, perhaps within three months. Now the average length of a vacancy is over a year.

- Q. Why are vacancies so long these days?
- a. Because there are more posts than available clergy
- b. To save money
- c. To give time for the Rectory to be refurbished
- d. To give space for reflection between one Rector and the next
- A. Probably a combination of the above.
 - Q. How many Anglicans does it take to change a lightbulb?

A. Six. One to change the bulb and five to form a society to remember how good the old one was. However long the vacancy, we will still remember Alice and Joe and the light and love they shared in the Shelswell Benefice.

Keeping the show on the road in a vacancy requires a great deal of effort. The danger is people can become tired and discouraged. It is important to remember how vital it is to get the right person as priest for the parish. This can take time.

Above all, pray. Pray more together than you were doing before. God is at work during the vacancy. He may

be working on bringing things to the surface, strengthening unity, or the confidence and discipleship of individual members of the congregation.

The co-operative model of ministry is the one that usually bears fruit during a vacancy, where people are empowered and feel involved.

Some factors to help a Vacancy to run well

- Stay united as a team and deal with conflict where there is disagreement over anything.
- Where staff are employed, value them, but don't expect them to compensate for the Rector; be clear on roles and responsibilities.
- Review the programme, maintain what is essential, let go of peripheral things.
- Spread the load: most people underestimate the amount of work involved; so trust them with tasks and responsibility.
- Don't stop changing. Resist the old advice of never changing during a vacancy: otherwise, it could lead to stagnation and shrinkage.
- Organise pastoral care: make sure that 'everyone has someone' so that no one drifts away unnoticed.
- Welcome newcomers.
- Communicate, communicate, communicate: listen and talk to congregations all the time, don't let them become demoralised or feel out of the loop.
- Pray for the health of the church during the vacancy: for leaders, churchwardens, PCCs, the community and the appointment process itself.
- Pray that God will send you the person who he is calling to serve your community.



Q. During the vacancy will it be business as usual?

A. As much as possible. The Churches in the Benefice will continue to serve their local communities. There is still a Ministry Team and baptisms, weddings and funerals will still take place, along with Sunday and midweek services of worship and other activities. And we would love to welcome newcomers to join us on the journey of faith.




Liz had set out sheets with a quiz, to do while lunch was being prepared. She gave us a talk on St Richard of Chichester. He was born in 1197 at Droitwych and died April 3rd, 1253. He is known for a well-known prayer (right)

St Richard is also the patron saint of coachman, due to the time spent caring for his brother's farm, where he skillfully handled the horse drawn wagons. He was known for his compassion and charity, particularly towards the poor and sick. He even worked tirelessly during a famine, giving away all he had to help those in need. He died at a hospice called Maison Dieu on April 3rd 1253 in Dover. He was a very interesting man and it is worth reading about his life story.

We sat for lunch, with a choice of cold drinks or wine, followed by a lovely lunch of salads with bread and a variety of quiche, followed by a choice of puddings. We then had the answers to the quiz. Later in the afternoon we had tea/coffee with cake or biscuits.

On Day 2, we had another lovely lunch of salads, quiches and jacket potatoes.





As it was St Swithin's

day, after lunch Penny, gave a talk on St Swithin. He was born around 800 in Winchester and died 862. He was an advisor to King Egbert of the West Saxons, he had requested that when he died to be buried outside the old Minster in a simple grave so that people would walk over him.

In the year 971 his remains were moved to a shrine inside the Cathedral by order of Bishop Ethelwold. The event was associated with miraculous cures and violent storms that lasted 40 days. The legend of an old proverb was said to be because Swithun was displeased at having his remains moved from his humble grave, to a shrine inside the Cathedral.

We finished off the afternoon with more tea and cake. Thank you to Penny and all the Ministry team and helpers for arranging the two days, providing and cooking the lovely food and arranging lifts.

His mum and dad were married in Stratton Audley Church, and Aaron and his brother were baptized there. His grandfather and great grandparents are buried in the churchyard. Aaron himself lived for two years in his grandparents' house in Stratton Audley before moving to Bure Park. So although Steph was born in Liverpool, moving to Milton Keynes when she was 1 year old, and to Bicester when she was 13 years old, the couple very much wanted to be married in St Mary and St Edburga's.

The service was conducted by Father Alex Mahlava with Rev Alice giving the address and leading the prayers. Aaron and Steph had chosen three hymns for their service: 'Give me joy in my heart', 'Lord of the dance' and 'One more step along the world I go'. They had two Bible readings: Ruth 1:16-17 read by Connor Baker and 1 Corinthians 13:4-7 read by Ben Knight. During the signing of the marriage document, we listened to Benson Boone's 'Beautiful Things' and at the end of the service the newly weds left the church to Drax Project Six60's Catching Feelings. There was a retiring collection which was divided between the church and the British Heart Foundation.

During the wedding rehearsal, Father Alex explained that in African culture, when the priest gets to the bit 'those whom God has joined together, let no one put asunder', he doesn't just wrap his stole around their joined hands – instead he gets them to stand so close together that there is no gap between them for anyone to slip into, and then ties his stole right around their waists. Our prayers are with Aaron and Steph that they may know that deep closeness throughout their marriage, and that it will bring many blessings for them, their family and friends, and all those around them.

The September poems for readers are *Last Lesson of the Afternoon* and *The Best of School* (*left*) - both by DH Lawrence (1885-1930), and a reminder, in the month when children go back to school, of the highs and lows of teaching. They can both be read online.

Our July meeting began with the poem *Moon-Marketing* by Richard Le Gallienne (1866-1947) and continued with *The Cat and the Moon* by W B Yeats. Two very different poems about the Armada followed. Both were titled *The Armada*. The poem written by Thomas Babington Macaulay (1800-59) was a typically Victorian patriotic and rousing narrative, and still has power as an evocation of British ingenuity and derring-do when faced with a threat. Brian Patten (b 1946) remembers an incident from his childhood and relates a personal memory of his own twig and paper armada on a pond in the park and how his memory of it is linked with his dead mother.



Follow up to my April 2025 "Look at" on Sir Algernon William Peyton (4th Baronet)

I have got into the habit of every Thursday searching on FindMyPast website for any new stories about Stoke Lyne added to their newspaper database during the past week. Most weeks there is nothing new mentioning Stoke Lyne but when I looked one Thursday in July I found an obituary for Sir Algernon on newly released pages from the Oxford University and City Herald and I was shocked to read that before he married Laura Webb in 1870 he had married an unnamed daughter of a J. Sherwood Esq:. I had not included this marriage in my "Look at". How could I have missed it?

Here's the article with the sentence in question in bold:

Oxford University and City Herald, 30th March 1872

SUDDEN DEATH OF THE EX-HIGH SHERIFF OF OXFORDSHIRE. – Great gloom has been cast over the neighbourhood of Bicester by the sudden death of Sir Algernon William Peyton, Bart., which melancholy event took place at Bicester on Monday evening. Sir Algernon, who was master of the Bicester Hunt, had been out with the hounds on Monday, and on his return to Bicester he went into the King's Arms Hotel, and while there was seized with a fit and died a few minutes afterwards. He was highly respected by all classes, and his loss will be greatly felt. He was the fourth baronet, and born in 1833; he succeeded his father in 1866; was educated at Eton, and entered the 1st Life Guards in 1851; he became a captain in 1856 and retired in 1869. He was a magistrate for Oxfordshire, of

which he was high sheriff in 1871. **He married in 1864 the daughter of J. Sherwood, Esq., who died in 1866,** and he married in 1870 Laura, daughter of D. Webb., Esq. – The inquest was held on Tuesday afternoon at Bicester. Mr. Aubrey Wicks, surgeon, who was called in, deposed that the death had resulted from disease of the heart, and a verdict to that effect was returned.

Further searches revealed that the same obituary was reprinted almost word for word in a number of regional newspapers all around the country such as the Bury and Norwich Post, the Bucks Herald, the Hampshire Chronicle, the North Wilts Herald, the Taunton Courier and Western Advertiser, the Bromley Journal and West Kent Herald, the Manchester Weekly Times, and the Hastings and St Leonard's Observer.

I then looked at Sir Algernon's obituaries in the other local Oxfordshire newspapers. The Oxford Chronicle and Reading Gazette also mentioned a first wife. "He was twice married, in 1864 to a daughter of J. Sherwood Esq., who died in 1866, and in 1870 to Laura Sarah, daughter of Daniel H. Webb, Esq., of Wykeham Park, who is now his widow." The Oxford Times and the Oxfordshire Weekly News in identical articles said "In 1864 he married the daughter of J. Sherwood, Esq., who died in 1866, and four years after, in 1870, he married Laura Sarah, daughter of D. H. Webb, Esq., of Wykham Park"

From where did these local papers obtain their information? Did they all use the same source? Other local papers omit any mention of a first wife, namely the Banbury Guardian, the Bicester Herald, the Oxford Journal and the Banbury Advertiser. The latter quoted from Sir Algernon's entry in Debrett's Illustrated Baronetage: no wife other than Laura was mentioned.

"SIR ALGERNON WILLIAM PEYTON, BARONET. – Debrett's Illustrated Baronetage for this year, states that the late Baronet was born 1823, and succeeded his father, Sir Henry, 1866. He was educated at Eton; entered the 1st Life Guards1851, became Captain 1856, and retired 1869; was High Sheriff of Oxfordshire 1871, and a Magistrate of that county. He married, 1870, Laura, daughter of the late D. H. Webb, Esq., but having no issue, the baronetcy becomes extinct."

(Of course we now know that the baronetcy did not become extinct as it passed to his first cousin once removed, Sir Thomas).

The Internet Archive website has the full text of the 1915 edition of Burke's Peerage and Baronetage from which the following summary comes:

Sir Algernon William Peyton, 4th Bart., capt. 1st Life Guards, high sheriff of Oxfordshire in 1870, b. 13 April, 1833; m. 24 Nov. 1870, • Laura Sarah, youngest dau. of Daniel Hale Webb, of Wykham Park, co. Oxford, and d. 25 March, 1872, having by her (who m. 2ndly, 30 Jan. 1878, Viscount Valentia) had no issue. He was s. by his cousin,

Both Debrett's and their rival Burke's are deemed to be authoritative sources on the British aristocracy so it is unlikely that both would be wrong and I am sure there would have been a complaint by the time of the 1915 edition of Burke's if there was a mistake.

Separately I searched for any reports anywhere in the press in 1864 about the marriage (such as the ones I found when Sir Algernon married Laura Webb) but found none and nor did I find any about the lady's untimely death in 1866.

I looked on the FreeBMD website for any marriages for a Peyton/Sherwood surname combination in the marriage indexes but the only one I could find was for a couple in 1970! Where would the deceased first wife have been buried? She is certainly not named on any memorials in St Peter's church or the churchyard.

Fortunately from my previous researches into Sir Algernon I had found on the Ancestry website an image of his marriage entry to Laura in 1870 at St Mary Abbots Church, Kensington and it clearly gives his "condition" as "bachelor" ie he is not described as a "widower" which he would have been had there been a deceased first wife.

So the evidence (unless anyone reading this knows any different) seems to point to the mystery first wife being the result of some sort of mix up by an anonymous newspaper reporter or informant whose information was subsequently taken at face value and repeated all round the country - not unlike what we hear happens today on social media!



Ancient Anglo-Saxon video sparks 538% rise in Church of England social media followers

"Hlyst nu!" (That's Old English for "Listen up!")


A video of Church of England Everyday Faith Editor Alexandra Zhirnova reading the Nicene Creed in Old English has gone viral on the internet racking up nearly half a million impressions and sparking a global wave of engagement. The video can be viewed on the Church of England's social media sites including Instagram and TikTok.

In the year 992 the Nicene Creed was translated by a monk named Ælfric along with parts of the Bible, from Latin into his native tongue; what we now call Old English. While much of the language is unfamiliar to modern ears, some words remain recognisable.

The response to the video has been nothing short of extraordinary. Since its release, it has generated over 400,000 impressions across the Church of England's social media channels, with over 37,000 interactions. The Church saw a 583 % increase in new followers during the week after the video was released. German, Dutch, and Scandinavian language speakers were among those who responded, commenting how similar Old English sounds to their native languages.


